WHOA TO SPONSOR OPEN FORUM

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES INTERVIEWED

In an interview with the presidential candidates the following statements were made to the Woodridge News Review in answer to indicated questions.

Question: Do you believe in a village sponsored youth program? To what extent?

Edmund Gilbert - "I believe it is a village responsibility to provide area pools and like facilities, ball parks, and to provide the land. I would be in favor of setting up a recreation board with a representative of the village on the board, with the village not dictating what can be played or how. The WAA is an interim measure because of lack of capital."

William Roberts - "Yes - My interest in a youth program has been apparent for some time. This is evident by my efforts in originally organizing the Woodridge Athletic Association.

If elected, I will endeavor to establish a park board and subsequently attempt to obtain adequate park areas and develop plans for recreational usage, in cooperation with the WAA.

Question: How soon do you think it will be economically possible to pay policemen's salaries?

William Roberts - "At the present time our village will be imperative within the next year to employ at least one full time police officer and also to continue a volunteer police organization.

O'NEILL REPORTS ON ROADS

According to Superintendent of Public Works O'Neill the school access roads have received several loads of gravel, but the thaws cause the mud to rise through the gravel creating the condition that have brought complaints from mothers picking up their children.

O'Neill states that he and Assistant Superintendent Lenz have been in contact with the builder regarding the road, but until the ground is completely thawed, the streets cannot be paved.

Petition For Village Police Magistrate

Douglas Weikel
(candidate for police magistrate)

A veteran of WW II, Weikel served in the U.S. Navy. After military service, he attended Taylor University in Indiana. He also attended Wesleyan College in Bloomington and graduated from that school with a Bachelor of Music degree in 1950. After a short stint as a commercial photographer, he taught music in private and public schools and in college. He is now teaching at the Bensenville Junior High School. Weikel resided in Downers Grove for five years before moving to Woodridge.

Reserve Next Monday Night To Hear Village Candidates

Vice President Jim Brian of the Woodridge Home Owners' Association has announced to the WNR that the WHOA will sponsor an open forum in the Woodridge School on Monday, March 27, so that the residents can meet and question the candidates in the coming village election.

Brian stated that the WHOA board felt that "there is a need for such a forum to better acquaint people in the community with the candidates". He said the WHOA, having a policy of impartiality in village governmental affairs, would be able to conduct the forum in a manner fair to all candidates. He also stated that all the candidates have been contacted and all expressed interest in the forum and would attend if able.

100 NEW HOMES EXPECTED IN SUMMER

Woodridge will have more than 100 new homes for certain this summer and more than 200 if the present rate of sales continues, Al and Jack Kaufman, president and vice president of Surety Development Corp., builders here, have announced.

"We attribute a good deal of our success this year to the manner in which the residents and made a real community here. The organization of civic and other groups and the enthusiasm which has been shown in creating a real community spirit has been very helpful.

Referrals this year have been much more enthusiastic than last year", Kaufman added.

The builder also said that the new homes should attract the additional tenants necessary to build a shopping center and that he hoped it could be started this summer.

Introduction of Space-O-Rama homes in four different models was announced by the builders the weekend of March 10-12. The models range in price from \$14,990 to \$20,950.

TAGGART TO MODERATE SCHOOL FORUM

A meeting to introduce the five Woodridge candidates for the District 68 school board will be held at Woodridge School April 5, at 8 p.m. according to Eleanor Murphy, press representative for the Woodridge Mother's Club. The meeting is sponsored by the Woodridge Mothers Club, the Community Club and the Goodrich Womens Club, with Phil Taggart serving as moderator.

The annual school board report will be presented after which each candidate will have five minutes to discuss the following: 1. Problems of influx of population in this school district, 2. Methods of financing school expansion and operating expenses, 3. Physical facilities necessary for elementary school education, 4. Time required for school board service, 5. Communications between school, parents and community, 6. Measurement of curriculum of this school district, and 7. Treatment and selection of teachers.

A general question and answer session will follow the candidates' opening remarks.

The forum will be moderated by the WHOA board consisting of Vice President Jim Brian and trustees Ray Landgraf, Walter Henk, Don Jeffrey and Carl Warner. Another trustee, Joe Mc Grath, will not assist the board as he is a candidate for village trustee. McGrath plans to attend the meeting.

Questions relevant to the candidacy will be accepted from the floor. Answers will be limited to two minutes, and equal time will be given any candidate wishing to speak on an issue.

The forum is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. and will last later than 10 p.m.

WAA's St. Patrick's Dance A Success

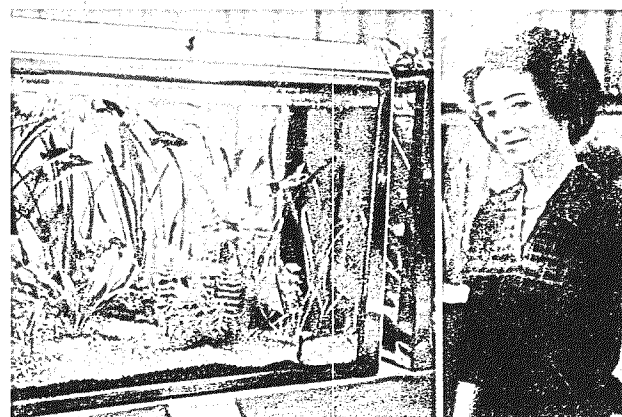

Mrs. Cooling, a member of the C.A.S. for seven years, is now serving her third year as a board member. For two years she was secretary of the Society and chairman of the board for one year.

Her fish have previously been exhibited for the C.A.S., International Amphitheatre, and Garfield Park Conservatory during the Tri-Club Yearly Exhibit.

In 1956 at the World Pet Show, at the Amphitheatre, she entered a tank of Siamese Fighting Fish and won a trophy. In "fishy" circles she is noted for her breeding of the Cambodia Siamese Fighting Fish.

We strongly urge all to attend the Forum as it will probably be your only opportunity before the election to see and hear all the candidates at one time.

I also think we will require a paid village clerk within the near future as these duties are becoming more demanding daily.

The revenue for salaries and costs will have to come from building permits, license fees and gasoline fuel tax refunds. It may also be necessary, to avoid additional personal taxation, to license the numerous sub-contractors and other businesses operating within the village.

In the near future there will be a shopping center within the village and under State Statutes a village may collect a 1/2% of 1% retail use tax on sales.

Edmund Gilbert - "The policemen and firemen should be given salaries and the sooner the better. However, I feel the village should not go into the red to do this. As I understand it, they would rather have equipment they're not afraid to use than to be paid, right now.

I believe the village clerk and police magistrate should be paid, if only a token payment is made. The village clerk will be handling a lot of work -- we will have to pay her."

Question: Do you have any plans for the annexation of the unincorporated areas?

Edmund Gilbert - "I was initially and am still in favor of bringing them in, for this would lead to a happier village with more continuity. We would be better off with a unified village as there is too much bickering going on. I feel that most of these people do want to come in, that there are just a few that don't want to. I am in favor of bringing them in."

William Roberts - "All families residing in this area have common problems and responsibilities. I feel it is imperative that we have a mutually cooperative attitude and respect between all persons residing in the area if we are to keep pace with our growing economy. It is only by good planning and mutual effort that the area continue to progress. Subsequently we all will derive greater personal benefits in the form of a better community in which to live and raise our families and from the resulting increase in the valuation of our personal property.

If elected, I will work toward the settlement of personal differences and misunderstandings that exist so that the families residing in the unincorporated area can gain the benefits from

local government, police protection and other village facilities. It is only by joining the village that these people could have a voice in the government and its programs."

Question: What is your platform?
William Roberts - "First of all the general development and planning of the present village government has been highly efficient and has done a very thoughtful job of basic planning of a new village. I would certainly continue along the same basic lines of operations that presently exist. There are certain functions that need refinement or expanding and new needs are always developing.

Basically I would work toward:
A. Establishing a park system and recreation program, B. Development of a permanent community center to house offices, police department, fire department, and a general purpose meeting area, C. Expanding or refining village services such as building inspection, street marking and maintenance, police and fire protection, D. Establish more adequate village office hours, consistent with the needs of the public, E. Assist in the further development of the school system including efforts to obtain parochial school systems and a financially feasible method for starting kindergarten classes, F. Create better communication between village government and residents. This will enable the people to gain a better understanding of village government functions and actions, also it will give the village officials a better understanding of the public's desires and needs.

Edmund Gilbert - A. To explore the possibility of light industry, B. To have planned recreation areas, C. A sales tax ordinance, D. Cooperation with school board, E. Improved communication through a press secretary, F. Greeting committee brochure for new residents on where to go and what to do, G. Village attorney to be available at all times, H. A committee to compare and see what can be done to improve water rates, I. To pursue again mosquito abatement.
