5 CENT GRAVEL TAX
A levy of $5 \neq$ per $\$ 100$ assessed valuation for gravel for Lisle Township roads was authorized by the township board by resoling. The tax was levied for year only although the original petition requested a four year levy. Money from this tax is to be used for gravel only and not for maintenance expenditures which arespaid from the road and bridge taxes.

Trustee Lewis Benckendorf seconded the motion saying that he thought it was a good idea because of the change of administration.


1962 Budget Approved
A $\$ 23,620$ budget wes unanimously approved by the village board at the April meeting. This was $\$ 1,000$ more than Committee keaded by Trustee O'Connell. President Werch asked for the additional amount in the Streets and Alleys Fund which brings the total to be applied for this purpose to $\$ 9,000$. The balance Generai Fund $\$ 14,0$ comprises the General Fund budget. $\$ 8,720$ has been earmarked for general 5,900 for public protection

General Fund revenues, not including Streets and Aileys funds, were estimated to be $\$ 11,120$ from sources other than property taxes. A $\$ 3,500$ tax levy will make up the balance. Werch asked the present Finance Committee to present an appropriation ordinance for passage at the May board meet ing based on this budget.
