MESSER RESIGNATION ACCEPT

Roberts Assumes Police Administrative Duties MOTHER'S BAKE SALE

BOARD AGREES TO 3 OTHER RESIGNATIONS

At the May 4 meeting of the board of trustees, President William T. Roberts announced the receipt of 4 resignations.

Elmer Messer, Chief of Police, and Marion Messer, 2911 West-ridge tendered their resignations. Marion Messer was a policewoman and a police radio operator.

Both Robert Bell and Thomas White, special policemen, resigned to devote more time to their individual professions. The board of trustees accepted the resignations.

In an interview with a WNR reporter, President Roberts explained that the position of Chief of Police as a functioning duty job was abolished, and President William Roberts, under state statute, assumed the po-sition of Chief of Police in an administrative capacity only. The actual leg work and day to day operation within the force will be conducted by the officers themselves.

As reported in the May 4 issue of the woodridge News Review, resignations were submitted by special policemen, Charles Hague, LeRoy Radtke, Jerome Szczepaniak and John

In letters read by President Roberts at the board meeting, Charles Hague requested that his "resignation not be acted upon until the force can be brought up to full strength." Officer Hague is now the acting duty sergeant. Jerome Szczepaniak requested that "he be put on active duty until "he be put on active duty until a suitable replacement can be found." The job of reorganizing & supervising the Police Boys Club is now back with Officer Szczepaniak. John Russo asked that his resignation be withdrawn and that he be put on active duty. 
Attorney Retained By Board

The law firm of Douglas F. Comstock, attorney at law. Downers Grove, was retained by the village at the May board meeting.

The yearly retainer of \$1000 can be paid either monthly or quarterly. This fee will include the preparation and review of ordinances and levies and appropriations, advising the board and the president and conducting other business in their office.

The village attorney will not be required to attend any board meeting or any appearance in court. For any such appearance and any additional duties, the village will be charged at the rate of approximately \$20 per

The firm was recommended by President Roberts and Gene C. O'Connell, former trustee who had served on a committee formed to make such a recommendation.

Dear Editor:

Many individual opinions concerning the maintenance of Lisle Township roads and streets have appeared in this newspaper in recent weeks. Everyone is entitled to voice his opinion but the manner in which some of the opinions have been slanted would make one believe they are unchallengeable fact. True information about road maintenance printed in the Woodridge News Review has been ignored by a group of people who replied with a retort which questions the competance of the Lisle Township Road Commission (Highway Commission), and because this was done under the banner of civic pride, no one should dare to refute it. There is no justifiable reason for the creation of such confusion.

Maintaining Township roads is not left up to the whim of the Commissioner. It is provided for under Illinois law. The Supervisor of Lisle Township, Mr. Patrick Riedy, was kind enough to answer my written request for correct information on this matter in a letter dated May 4, 1961. I am enclosing a copy of that letter for your files. It explains that Chapter 8, Section 138 of Fourth Edition Illinois Township Manual states as follows:

"The Highway Commissioner can be compelled to repair and maintain any township road. If he fails or refuses to repair any road or section of road, and three (3) land owners in the township may notify him of the neglect of said road. If he fails to repair they may contact the County Supervisor of Highways who after hearing complaint and reasons of non maintenance of said road may order repair and maintenance. Failure of Commissioner to comply with said order would result in a fine not to exceed \$200 and removal from office."

This should erase any doubt concerning the question of maintaining Township (unincorporated area) roads.





(Continued from page 1, col. 1) letter from Radtke stated that he would be willing to serve in an emergency.

In a further move, which was effective May 5, all of the patrols were changed to a more effective system, eliminating any patterns of patrol within the village. The police car will be used less but there will actually be more patrols through the use of un-marked cars.

Another change now in effect is a single police telephone number. This is a 24 hour phone answering service through an extension network. The police number is Wo 9-2191.

Beginning May 13 all officers were to start receiving training courses, field and classroom, in the whole area of public pro tection. The subjects covered will be: defensive fire arms, given by the FBI, village ordinance interpretation, given by President Roberts, first aid, given by a state instructor.

The village will presently have a new application and testing procedure for all potential policemen, and these will be used until the present force is brought up to full strength.

The total force will number 10 men and 2 women. At present, the force consists of 6 officers and 1 policewoman, Mrs. Horace Thoresen.

In a statement to WNR, President Roberts said that, "should any occasion arise for police service in the un-incorporated area, the residents should feel free to call upon the village, and we will assist in any way without legally jeopardizing the village or interfering with the county police."
