WHOA, WAA To Sponsor Annual Family Event

The second annual Woodridge Independence Day Celebration will be held on 12 acres of land located at the west end of Everglade, July 4.

This celebration is jointly sponsored by the Woodridge Home Owners' Association and the Woodridge Athletic Association with the V.F.W., Cub Scouts and the Woodridge Garden Club participating.

Representatives of the WHOA, WAA and V.F.W will call on families of the community June 3 and 4 to sell tickets at \$1.50 per family to help defray the cost of fireworks, insurance and door prizes.

Booths will be erected for the convenience of serving a variety of food and ice cream to complete the picnic, and for the playing of games of skill and chance.

Adults softball and boys baseball will be played during the day. Childrens games are also on the agenda with prizes to be given to the winners.

A large display of fireworks is planned for this year. This gala display will finish off the day.

2 FIRES, SAME STREET, SAME WEEK

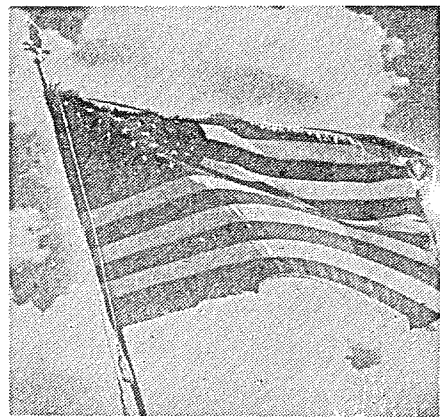

HOSPITAL TO BE BUILT IN LISLE

From dreams to plans to reality is the story of a proposed Arboretum Hospital in Lisle. The structure known as the Lisle Medical Center located on Route 53 and Lacy has been in operation for the past three years, and this July will see the beginning of construction for four additional floors.

The hospital, designed by Dr. Frederick Sinkovits, as was the medical center, will have a 250 bed capacity with a potential expansion of double that amount. The second floor which is already in use, will be incorporated into the hospital plans.

These plans include an emergency room with doctor and nurse in attendance; two operating rooms and one delivery room. A

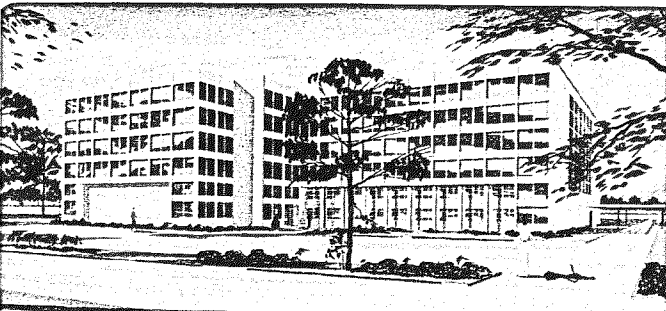
On May 22, the Braves took the Sox 14 to 9. On May 24, the Cubs beat the Braves 10 to 5.

(Continued from page 1, column 3) kitchen, cafeteria and business office will be located in a building added to the south end of the present structure.

Bids on construction are soon to be let according to

Donald Wronski, member of the board of directors for Arboretum Hospital which will be a not-for-profit organization.

When the building is ready for use, Wronski estimates that about 30 to 40 non-technical persons will be employed. With completion and operation of the hospital, there will be an even greater number of job openings.

He does not expect any shortage or difficulty in staffing the hospital with registered nurses and technicians. To date approximately 35 doctors have been approached in connection with affiliating with the hospital.

An auxiliary electrical unit will be installed for use in the event of a power failure.

Additional land has been purchased to be used for parking lots and emergency ramps.

The Woodridge Fire Department arrived at the scene and quickly got control of the fire. Several minutes later Lisle Fire Department arrived. Captain Larson said it was too early to estimate damages as we went to press. There is smoke damage throughout the house while many things that were in the basement are charred.

Mrs. Lincoln was shopping at the time the fire broke out and the other Lincoln children, Craig, 7, and David, 3, were outside playing.

In the other fire on Sprucewood which occurred May 23, Mrs. William Blecher with the aid of her husband extinguished a grease fire in the kitchen of their home at 7654 Sprucewood.

Mrs. Blecher had turned the burner on to melt some grease and then went to answer the door. Within a short time smoke hung halfway down from the ceiling. A plastic clock and radio located above the stove was melting and oven mitts were flaming when she returned.

A neighbor phoned the Lisle Fire Department. Ordinarily the alarm would then have been given to the Woodridge Fire Department. The regular fire alarm operator was on vacation and the relief operator did not realize, until the Lisle firemen had left, that Woodridge Fire Department should have been called.

By the time the Lisle Fire Department arrived, the fire was extinguished.

Two of the Blecher children, Sharon, 13 months and Bruce, 4 years, were asleep in the bedrooms behind closed doors which held the smoke back. William, Jr., 6, was attending school.
