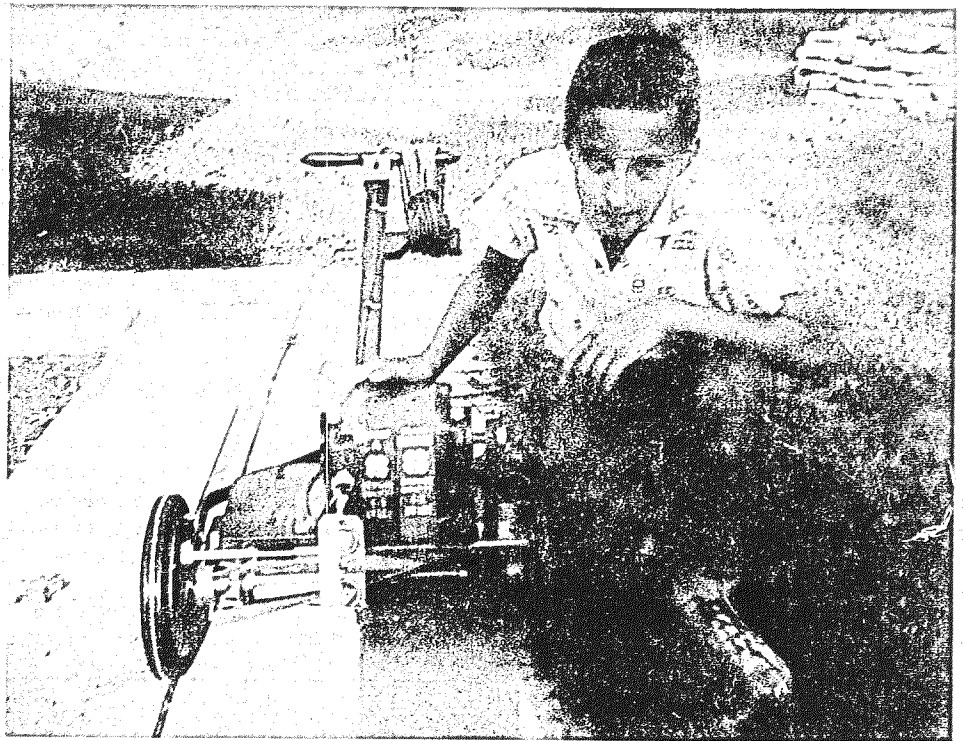
He has had no previous little league training and claims his only interest in the sports field is baseball.

An old hand lawn mower, an electric motor and a boy's imagination and ingenuity combined to make an electric lawn mower which gave Woodridge a First Prize winner at the Illinois State Fair.

Using the chassis of an old hand lawn mower, given to the family when they moved into their new home, and an electric motor given him by his uncle, Willard went to work.

Some difficulties were encountered when the old chassis had to be cut down. After breaking several hack saw blades, an acetylene torch was borrowed from a neighbor, and that obstacle was overcome. From there on it was a question of time and effort.

The project, begun early in June, was completed by July 18, in time to be entered in the DuPage County Fair where he won a first place blue ribbon and a class champion purple ribbon.

Willard estimates that about thirty hours work went into the project.

Berg was sworn in on Friday, August 11, by Clarence Wagemann, County Clerk, in the Wheaton County Court House.

Berg was first asked to discuss the questions most frequently asked him during the campaign for election.

Question: "Could you be influenced by any person or persons?"
Answer: "Inasmuch as I filed a petition on my own initiative, I have no obligations other than those required of me as a citizen and as a police magistrate."

Question: "Would it be possible to control the excessive speed of private vehicles and heavy construction equipment in the village?"

Answer: "With the posting of signs regulating traffic control and the enforcement of the new traffic ordinance we can eliminate the danger that we may now have."

Woodridge School Opens September 5th

School bells ring for the first time this fall Sept. 5. Both Goodrich and Woodridge school children will attend at 9 a. m. and go directly to their rooms where they may register and pay the required fees for the first semester. All checks should be made payable to School Dist. 68 and should not bear the name of the school.

All new students are to enroll at the office and will then be assigned to a room.

After a short meeting with their respective teachers all children will return home. The first full day of school will be Sept. 6. School hours are from 9-12 and 12:45-3:15 for all classes.

Any student desiring to return home for lunch must have a written request from a parent and permission from the office.

The teachers must arrive early to prepare their days work and consequently have no time for supervision. Walking or riding time should be gauged to meet this requirement.

As yet, no bicycle racks have been purchased, but children may ride if the parents feel the child will conform to all the safety rules. At the present all bikes are to be parked across School

Area Points Of Interest

Get Acquainted With The Morton Arboretum

Here in Woodridge we are living near a unique garden—a spot many people drive miles to visit.

Just north of the Illinois Tollway on route 53 lay 1,375 acres of land designated as the Morton Arboretum.

Most of us have heard of the Arboretum and have a vague idea of what it is and where it is.

Many of us, I'm sure, are not fully aware of the natural gold mine of beauty and information available to us almost on our doorstep. The natural beauty of hills, glades, streams, lakes, animals and birds are protected here for our enjoyment.

The Arboretum, a privately endowed educational foundation was founded in 1921 by Joy Morton son of J. Sterling Morton the founder of Arbor Day and Secretary of Agriculture under President Grover Cleveland.

At that time a portion of the Morton estate was set aside to be used for scientific arboricultural and horticultural research.

It is administered by a self-perpetuating board of trustees and was Morton's wish that it forever remain a privately endowed foundation.

The Arboretum is not therefore a public picnic ground, playground or park, but an outdoor museum of living plants supplemented by an educational program. It also acts as a proving ground for hardy timber trees from all over the world which may be used for reforestation.

As in a museum, specimens must not be removed from their location.

A good starting point for your first visit is the Arboretum Center, just inside the east gate.

The Center houses the information bureau, a reference library, and a herbarium (which may be entered only with special permission).

In the herbarium are pressed specimens of the plants on the grounds.

The Thornhill building, which is on the site of the Joy Morton residence, "Thornhill", is the educational center. It contains offices, classrooms, an exhibition hall, a laboratory and a lecture room--all the necessary facilities for the Arboretum's extensive educational program. Summer and winter courses are scheduled each year.

The unusual and attractive group of buildings seen from the route 53 tollway exit compose Arbordale, housing for Arboretum employees. These buildings are the result of an architectural contest of international competition held by the Arboretum four years ago.

Available for your inspection grounds are all of the trees, shrubs and vines native to northern Illinois, as well as other species which have been found winter hardy.

The ultimate goal of the Arboretum is to grow every living tree, vine and shrub that will survive here.

Since we Woodridge people are all involved in landscaping our homes, a trip to the Arboretum for information concerning the hardiness of plants we intend to use might well save us the expense of planting something that is not hardy in this climate.

Also helpful would be the monthly publication, "The Bulletin of Popular Information," which reports the results of experimental studies of plant materials and the ways in which they may be used. It is available for \$1 a year.

At present there are 4,800 species, varieties and hybrids of plantings which are designated at the Arboretum by 1)

systematical groups defined by botanical relationships, 2) geographical groups according to native habitats and 3) ornamental planting for landscape effects.

The Arboretum, open daily from 8 a.m. to sunset, invites us to see spring wild flowers from April through June, lilacs and flowering crabapples in May, and the old fashioned rose garden in June.

In July, August and September, a trip could include a visit to the formal and informal hedge gardens, a look at the many ground covers (we're all looking for something to choke out the weeds), or a hike along one or all of the three nature trails.

In October, the fall foliage art is beautiful.

The forest nature trail, longest of three trails, features wild flowers, trees, rocks, etc., with everything in its natural state.

The second trail is an evergreen trail Thornhill trail, the third one, starts from the Thornhill building and emphasizes plant identification of trees; shrubs, evergreens and ferns.

A guidebook, map and worksheets (for self-testing) may be obtained at the information bureau in the Center building to make these hikes both more enjoyable and educational. The guide book gives detailed information on plants and animals that may be seen as well as sketches of specimens.

Plants along these trails are labeled with botanical and common names, and numbers which refer to the card catalog in the administration building.

Beginning Sept. 1, there will be a 50¢ fee for the use of cars on the drives. Free parking will be continued, still making the trails and grounds available to pedestrian visitors free of charge.

Mary Ann O'Neill, village clerk, or Shirley West, deputy clerk, will be available during this time for assistance on vehicle stickers, dog licenses, registration for voting, solicitors' permits, etc.

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Review Of Dog Ordinance

Every owner or keeper of any dog above the age of six months within the corporate limits of the village must apply for a license from the village clerk within 5 days after the acquisition of the dog.

Each application must be in writing, signed by the applicant and contain, among other things: name, breed, color and sex, the name of the owner, the address at which the dog will be kept and a certificate signed by a registered veterinarian stating that the dog has been inoculated within the last 12 months with a serum to prevent rabies. This inoculation to prevent rabies must be done annually and must take place at least six weeks prior to the date application is made for a license.

The fee for a dog license, set by village ordinance, is either \$2 or \$3 depending on whether the dog is male or female.

Application for a dog license should be made to the village clerk. (More next issue on dangerous dogs and dogs running at large)

The conclusion was that the oath had been witnessed and attested and that any contesting of an election has to be done within 30 days of the election.

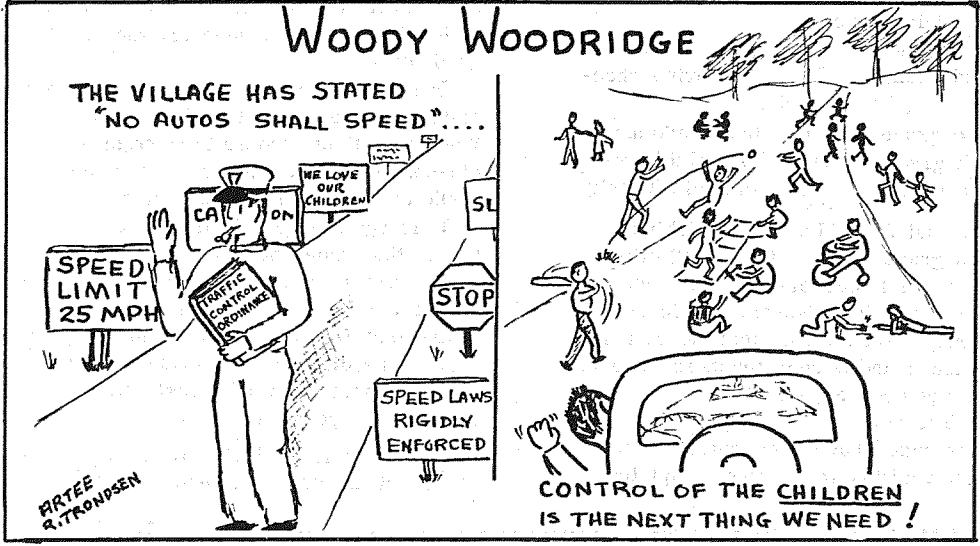
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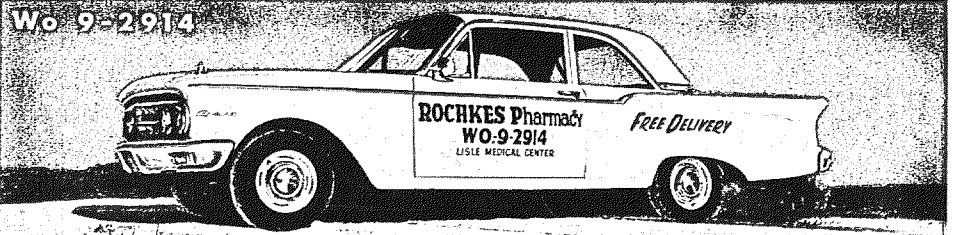

It is again emphasized by Mrs. Crane that under no consideration should a student attend when ill or with a cold, but parents should be aware that every day lost is money lost to the district. Absences other than illnesses should be restricted as much as possible.

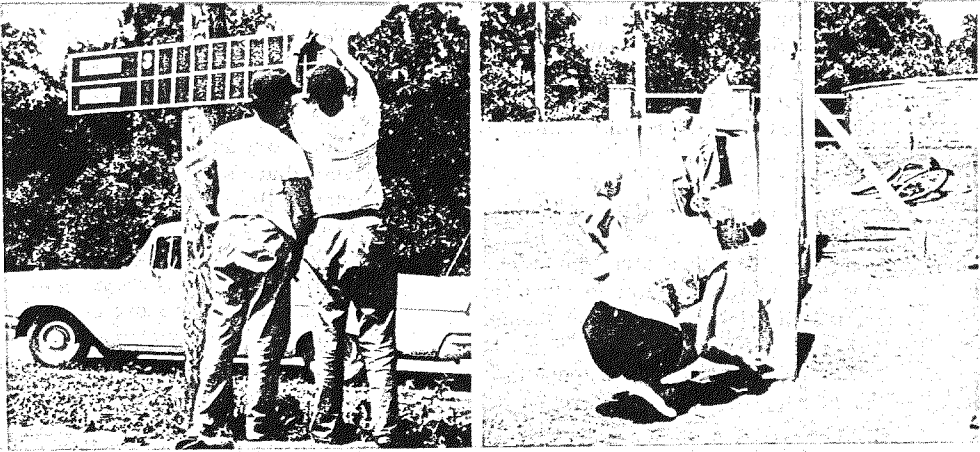

children playing in the streets and the leaving of tricycles and toy cars in the street?"

Answer: "I feel this can initially be controlled by the parents in teaching their children the respect of moving vehicles, and they should be allowed to play in the yard areas made available for them. In the future when additional play areas are made available, no doubt this situation will be eliminated."

Question: "Would radar make a speed trap of 75th Street?"

Answer: "I said then and still strongly feel that speed traps are not necessarily made by radar alone, and I don't feel that we should think that we have or would put into effect any so-called speed trap. The position we should hold is the enforcement of the existing speed regulations and strong enforcements can never be deemed a speed trap."

Question: "What would be your feelings about the suggestion of a \$50.00 speeding fine posted on signs at entrance to the Village?"

Answer: "In Illinois revised statutes and the acts and ordinances adopted by the Village set forth the penalties. The court is governed by these laws. I shall take into consideration the rights and respect for the condition of every individual case."

After bringing out some of the questions asked at campaign "coffee" the following questions were then asked by the interviewer.

Question: "What information had he been compiling since his election?"
