

Bad Weather Hampers Turnout

The District #68 school bond referendum was passed on Dec. 9, by an unofficial total of 235 to 139. Balloting took place in both Woodridge and Goodrich schools. Totals at Woodridge were 170 for and 73 against; at Goodrich they were 65 for and 66 against. Inclement weather kept down the turnout of eligible voters.

The bond issue is to provide funds for additional classrooms for both Woodridge and Goodrich schools and other required facilities. The Citizens Advisary Council had held open meetings on Dec. 4 and 5 to answer questions about the referendum. Attendance at both meetings was light.

ICC Denies Utilities Request For Rate Increase

WHOA Comments On Decision

Dan Hollowell, vice president of the Woodridge Home Owners Association said the Illinois Commerce Commission decision is but the first in a series of cases involving water and sewer rates to come up before the Commerce Commission.

Hollowell said that Woodridge residents should continue to write the I.C.C., as the decisions the commission will make in these cases will probably affect rates throughout the state. He asks the people to write the Illinois Commerce Commission, 160 N. LaSalle, Chicago.

Hollowell said, "our rates (in Woodridge) are not as high as some of the communities now involved in the I.C.C. cases but we feel they could be lower, particularly the sewer rates.

"MEADOWS" DEVELOPER AND SCHOOL BOARD DISCUSSIONS PLANNED

The District 68 School Board will meet again with the developers of "The Meadows" and the Lisle Elementary School Board to discuss how the developers and school districts can cooperate in accommodating the influx of students expected in the subdivision. Rehearing Requested

Two weeks ago the Illinois Commerce Commission denied the rate increase request of three suburban utility companies owned by Citizens Utility of Stamford, Connecticut. The companies had asked the I. C. C. to almost double

The companies denied rate raises are Citizens Utility of Illinois, which serves Hoffman Estates; Suburban Utility which handles sewer service to Hoffman Estates and Country Club Highlands Water and Sewer Company serving that subdivision.

Twelve other utilities also owned by Citizens Utility are expected to be affected by the commission's order.

The commission found that the Connecticut firm that has been buying up water companies in the suburbs is not subject to its jurisdiction, but the Illinois subsidiaries are.

The commission made note that Citizens Utility Company of Illinois, a subsidiary of the Connecticut firm, handles all the affairs of 14 other utilities through the office in Schaumberg Center, that it has a common bank account and that many of the officers in the company are the same.

The commission further said it had not been consulted when the Citizens Utility of Connecticut and Illinois went into business in the area, buying stock of the utilities formed by housing developers at low prices.

The commission said that until contractual arrangements and relationships have been explained in detail, consented to and approved by the commission, they cannot arrive at a fair value or determine water and sewer rates.

Citizens Utility had asked for an in crease from \$3.00 to \$6.00 per 4,000 gallons of water. Suburban Utility, which handled sewer service, asked for a \$6.00 rate, an increase of \$2.50.

John Vander Vries, attorney for the Citizens Utility Company, has said that he would ask for a rehearing.

More cases involving Citizens Utility remain to be heard.

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NOW IS THE TIME TO SPEAK UP

Two important public hearings will be held in Woodridge next Wednesday and Thursday evenings. The plan and zoning commissions will present the proposed zoning and subdivision control ordinances to the public.

A zoning ordinance is necessary to establish regulations and to zone districts which govern the use of land and the location, height, use and land coverage of buildings.

The purpose of the subdivision control ordinance is to provide standards for land development by requiring adequate lot sizes and arrangements, utilities and street improvements.

The hearings are being held to give all interested citizens a chance to air their views and make recommendations concerning the ordinances to insure that these ordinances conform to their wishes.

Remember, our community will only be as good as we want it to be.

Now is the time to speak up.

St. Joan Church Celebrates 37th Birthday Today

A borrowed altar installed in the hall above Albert Riedy's Hardware store provided the setting for the first service in St. Joan of Arc parish.

261 adults attended the two masses on Sunday. Dec. 14, 1924.

Several years of efforts on the part of Lisle area citizens preceded the begining of this "then new parish."

Some of those instrumental in the creation and development of St. Joan of Arc are: Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Riedy, August Riedy, the Misses Lorene and Henrietta Riedy, A. J. Meadel, Adam Kohley Sr., Joseph Long and Hubert Schumacher.

The clergy who were instrumental were: Bishop E. F. Hoban, His Emminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Rev. Aloysius Keclik, O.S.B., the parish's first pastor.

The cost of the entire building, water works, sewers and septic system, side walks, 2000 feet of road and 7200 square feet of parking space totaled \$92,057.40. Five years after the parish was formed, the debt had been reduced to \$36,000.

Services were held in the new church for the first time on June 27, 1927; the occasion, a wedding.

Grade School sessions began that fall with five graduation members.

Construction began on the present school in the summer of 1955. In February of 1957, 320 pupils attended classes in the new school for the first time.

There are 623 children attending St. Joan now and approximately an additional 400 grade school pupils attending the Saturday catechism classes. There are about 130 high school students who attend similar classes on Sunday.

St. Joan of Arc is a part of the Diocese of Joliet which was created in 1949.

The Rev. Frederic J. Beller, O.S.B. is the pastor of St. Joan and was assigned to this post in July, 1950.

Plans Drawn For St. Joan Convent

Chicago architects, Gaul and Voosen have drawn up the plans for the new convent in St. Joan of Arc parish, Lisle.

During the five week fund drive, parishioners pledged approximately \$300,000 for the new convent and reduction of the parish debt on St. Joan of Arc School.

The new convent, to be located on Division St., east of St. Joan of Arc School, can house 16 nuns.

Cake Co. for police equipment; \$26.72, mileage and membership fees in the DuPage County Juvenile Officers Association; \$50, typing and binding of the zoning and subdivision control ordinances; \$17.15, Illinois Bell Telephone Co.; \$10.40, Amlings for flowers; \$26.04, Reidy's Hardware, supplies; \$4.62, Hankinson; \$65, Ken's Reloading and Repair for ammunition; \$42.82, Lang's stationery; \$117.12, Suburban Life for publication of two ordinances; \$31.02, Bobs Standard Service Station; \$8.08, Jim & Jeff Repair Service; \$50, Woodridge Homes for rental of the village hall; \$16.13 to reimburse petty cash fund; \$470, Douglas F. Comstock, attorney; \$3 to the secretary of state for transfer of title and license for the squad car; \$25, establishment of a petty cash fund out of the Streets and Alleys fund for the public works department and \$17.20, chargeable to the streets and alleys fund.

Of the \$470 approved for payment to the village attorney, \$430 is the retainer fee for November, 1961, through January, 1962, and \$40 is for consultation given Nov. 2 to the plan and zoning commission.

Molloy Speaks Friday



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
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Tattle Tales

hearing on December 20.

The Subdivision Control Regulations and Design Standard for the Village of Woodridge will be presented for a hearing on December 21.

Both hearings will be held at the Woodridge School at 8:00 p.m.

According to the State Statutes it is the job of the plan commission to prepare and recommend to the corporate authorities a comprehensive plan of public improvements looking to the present and future development of the municipality.

After its adoption by the corporate authorities, this plan is known as the official plan of the municipality.

Thereafter from time to time the plan commission may recommend changes in the official plan.

This plan may include reasonable requirements with reference to streets. alleys, and public grounds in unsubdivided lands situated within the corporate limits or in contiguous territory not more than one and one-half miles beyond the corporate limits and not included in any other municipality. It is the job of the zoning commission to recommend the boundaries of the districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced.

The commission prepares a tentative report and a proposed zoning ordinance for the entire municipality.

After the preparation of a tentative zoning and control ordinance, the commission must hold a public hearing giving a chance to be heard to all interested per-

The hearing may be adjourned from time to time.

Within 30 days after the final adjournment of the hearing, the commission must make a final report and submit the proposed ordinances for the entire village to the village board.

The board may then enact the ordinances with or without change, or may refer it back to the commission for further consideration.

The five man board of the planningzoning commission will preside over the hearings, which are open to all persons residing in or around Woodridge.

Copies of the proposed ordinances are available for inspection at the village hall, at the residence of John Trask, 3000 Forest Glen Pkwy. and from the village

If a copy of the proposed ordinance is to be removed from the location at which it is officially lodged, a five dollar deposit is required.

DuPage County Government Studied

All the DuPage chapters of the League of Women Voters have combined efforts to conduct a cooperative study of county government in DuPage.

The report is expected to be released early next year.

Referendum Authorized For High School Site

A record high of 2,421 students enrolled at Downers Grove High School in September.

This represents an increase for the 15th consecutive year.

Authorization was recently voted by the High School Board of Education to take the necessary steps for a referendum in February on the purchase of 50 acres for a second high school in the southern section of the district.

The fall of 1962 will bring a partial shift system until more classrooms are available.

Three times in the past six years (twice with small margins) the voters turned down acquisition of land for a

DuPage County Receives Record State Aid

DuPage school districts received \$6,155,609.50 in annual state aid reimbursement for the 1960-61 school year.

George T. Wilkins, state superintendent of public instruction states this is the largest reimbursement to DuPage County in the history of Illinois.

This is the state aid based on average daily attendance of pupils.

State reimbursement to local districts is made possible by an appropriation of each General Assembly to the common school fund of Illinois.

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Warn Of Carbon Monoxide

DuPage County Police officers warn of the danger of carbon monoxide.

This colorless, odorless, tasteless, gas is a killer even in very small doses. One part of carbon monoxide in 1700 parts of air is sufficient to cause nausea. One part in 700 parts of air can be fatal.

Even a small dose can cause an accident by slowing down driver reaction.

Warning symptoms of the presence of carbon monoxide are nausea, drowsiness, headache, faulty coordination and poor

These reactions should prompt the car occupants to inhale immediately deep breaths of fresh air.

Imperfectly burned motor fuel produces carbon monoxide. Faulty engine adjustment is generally the culprit in the production of an excess.

Police recommend the following precautions to prevent being overcome by carbon monoxide.

- --NEVER run a motor in an unventilated enclosure. Open the garage door before starting the engine. ---KEEP one car window partially open.
- ---DON'T sit in a parked car with the engine running.
- --- CHECK the car's engine for proper combustion.
- ---CHECK the exhaust system for both leaks and stoppages - clogging could be caused by backing into a snow bank.

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




Wankowski Joins Police Department



The Reverend Don Ehlers was installed as Trinity's pastor in June, 1960.



A Cub fan, Mrs. Miley manages to attend quite a few games. In winter, hockey is her favorite.







4000 Senior Citizens May Reside In Downer Grove

Plans for a senior citizen housing proiect in DuPage county were presented at the Downers Grove council meeting.

The president of Transcon Construction Co. of Phoenix, Arizona explained that the project, which would eventually house 4,000 is part of the Federal Housing Authority (FHA) Senior Citizen Building Pro-

There are similar projects in California and Arizona.

Plans are to locate the project on 27 acres of land north of 63rd street between Blodgett and Lyman in Downers Grove. A 10 acre site immediately south of this area would be used for the heating plant and for a hospital specializing in diseases of the aged.

Applicants would have to be 63 or older without children. Rent would be between \$110 and \$150 per month.

The F.H.A. offices in Chicago have already received 20,000 applications for housing in the project. Another 20,000 are expected to apply by next summer.

High School Certificates Made Available By The State

An Illinois law signed by the Governor on July 25, 1961, has authorized a new program for the issuance of High School Equivalency Certificates.

The county superintendent of schools is to administer the testing program under rules established by the state superintendent of public instruction.

This program is being established to provide adults with an opportunity to secure an evaluation of their educational maturity and competence which should prove of value in meeting high school graduation requirements for employment, entry into training, promotion in industry
