The intent of the ordinance is to promote the public health, safety, morals, comfort and general welfare and to conserve property values and avoid congesion of the streets.
The length of this ordinance is the result of very specifically regulating height and bulk of buildings, building set back lines, intensity of use of lot areas, re gulating and restricting the location of business and industry and dividing the entire municipal area into districts ac cording to use of land and buildings. The possible zoning districts are R-1 residential, $R-2$, residential and $R-3$, residential $-R-1$ and $R-2$ are single family dwelling and $\mathrm{R}-3$ is multiple family dwelling; B-1, local retail, B-2, general retail and $B-3$, regional shopping center and M-1, restricted manufactur
ing and $\mathrm{M}-2$, general manufacturing. The zoning district map, a part of the rdinance, shows R-1 in units 1 and 2 and the balance of the residential area in Woodridge is $\mathrm{R}-2$. That area east of Larchwood $\ln$., which was to allow for apartments to serve as a screen for the business area at the corner of Janes rd. and 75 th st., is now zoned $\mathrm{R}-2$ - single ammy awening. Continued from page one 63 rd street and west of the DuPage river would be added to the Naperville system, and bring in an additional 38 students. The largest area, that east of the river and south of 63 rd street, would become part of the Downers Grove district, and would involve 435 pupils. The latter district would also "inherit" both Goodrich and Woodridge schools with a total of 18 class rooms valued at $\$ 495,000$, and 11 classrooms currently under construction to be completed by September 1 .

The plan to dissolve District 68, and add its territory to adjoining districts, is in keeping with a State-suggested program to combine smaller districts into larger ones.

Also, according to Miller, under the proposed plan, grade school and high school boundaries would coincide. At present, District 68 students, after leaving grade schools, are sent either to Naperville, Lisle or Downers Grove high schools, depending where they
