Put that question to any one of the 22 families who hold membership in the Woodridge Garden Club, and they will probably answer that the best gardening tools are enthusiasm, a knowledge of ingredients, zeal, a love for flowers and fervor.

The importance of ardor midst the arbor cannot be minimized because what s enthusiastically planted in May, may wilt and die by mid-July if interest wanes.

The idea for a garden club was cultivated to maturity by a group of hobbyists, which included Flo Benckendorf, Lois Demmin and Jo Landgraf who eventually became the club's first president, treasurer and secretary, respectively They felt with a community of new homes needing landscaping from scratch, an organization could help immeasurably in rganzation would be gardeners from preventing would-be gardeners from oing their mistak a forng to

Without the helpul counsel of the
Without the helpful counsel of the group's mentor, Fred Brolin, gardening editor of the Lisle Advertiser, the club's germination probably would not have occurred as early as Dec. 7, 1960, the date of its first meeting.

Scene of the gathering was the basement of the Benckendorf home. It has been the club's practice since to hold meetings in members' homes on a voluneer basis. Two co-hostesses are assign ed to each hostess to assist with refresh ments.

Programs are scheduled for their timeliness and seasonal usefulness. Pro fessionals in the field appear to speak on all phases of gardening; such as: landscaping, fertilizing, insect control, pruning, flower arranging, preparation and arrangement of dried flowers and weeds, and Christmas decorations.

Here again Mr. Brolin has proved in aluable in helping the club secure speakers well qualified in their subjects.

1961 Fourth of July picnic, proceeds from which enabled them to pay their speakers. Some receive a fee, others a gift, and often those affiliated with commercial enterprises speak without charge.

Garden clubbers realize the nature of their group precludes universal appeal but they welcome newcomers to join heir ranks. Gardening can be a highly atisfying and productive venture-especally when one has the confidence that omes with knowledge.

Family membership is $\$ 2.00$ per year and allows any grown member of a family to attend meetings. Larger membership would resolve the one rather thorny problem the club faces - an adequate meeting place. Current membership is not large enough to support a rented ocation, and basements are too confin ing for extensive work-shop activities.

When Woodridge lawns and gardens flourish and become well-established, the Garden club hopes to sponsor a flower show. Several Woodridge-ites won awards at the 1961 Lisle Flower Show. Mrs. Benckendorf won a major award for flower arranging while Mrs. Nancy O'Connell received a prize for spring flowers. Mrs. Demmin was recognized for a bush and Bob Wendt for his "Father Hugo"rose.

The Garden club is proud of the fact that it was through its efforts that Mr. Al Kaufman of Surety Builders last year donated 100 Weigela bushes to the village. They were distributed by the Garden club to the first 100 persons who wrote request ing a bush. Described as a spectacular red-flowering bush, the Weigela attains a height of about to 4 to 5 feet.

Garden clubbers feel it would be lyrical as well as scenic for the community to become, "Woodridge the Weigela Village", just as Lombard is renowned for its lilacs.

## Crowd Attends Budget Hearing

A proposed Woodridge village budget of $\$ 25,000$ was presented for public hearing at a special meeting May 1. About 50 people attended the meeting in the Woodridge school gym. The $\$ 25,000$ figure includes $\$ 12,960$ for general administration and $\$ 12,040$ for the police department. Also proposed at this time was $\$ 9,465$ for the streets and alleys fund.

These proposals represent some change from the first budget as proposed at a previous village board meeting. The primary change was to increase the amount for the police department and decrease the amount in the general administration fund.

The proposed amount in the streets and alleys fund was increased $\$ 77$-the amount for '61-' 62 was $\$ 9,000$, a difference of $\$ 465$. The proposed budget for the '62-'63 fiscal year represents an increase of $\$ 10,380$ from the '61-' 62 budget. Official action in the form of an appropration ordinance is necessary before any of these expenditures can be made.
