

Protection Committee Weighs Curfew

Ten adults and five teenage girls attended the special public hearing held Tues., Aug. 14, in the village hall to offer testimony on the proposed curfew ordinance to the public protection committee. The committee, under chairman Trustee Robert Murphy, includes Trustees Ralph Kennell and Walter Larson. Police Chief Joel Kagann was also present.

As drafted now, (subject to revision by the P. P. C. after weighing testimony) section one of the ordinance would make it unlawful for any child, under 18 years of age to be or remain on the streets or alleys or other public place after 10:30 p.m. unless in the company of parent, guardian, or authorized adult; unless in the performance of a parental duty; or unless lawful employment makes it necessary to be out after that time.

An initial recommendation was made by Village President William Roberts to extend the curfew to 11:30 p.m. on Saturdays. This was further amended to include Friday nights by several persons including a teenager, who said Friday evening teen club sessions lasting till 11 p.m. were the only socials presently conducted for the youngsters.

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Record Number Of Students Expected By DG High

Downers Grove High School is preparing for its largest student body on record, an estimated 2,600 boys and girls, when classes resume Sept. 4.

In order to take care of the overflow, a two classroom portable unit is scheduled for erection the last week in August. This will be near the Main st. entrance. In addition, one of the large study halls has been partitioned into three classrooms. Next year's enrollment projections indicate another portable unit will be needed as well as rental of outside church space.

School officials hope the new school at 63rd and Dunham will be ready by the opening of the fall term in 1964. Plans are now on the architect's drawing boards and tentative layouts on display in the Board of Education offices in the Lincoln School building. Community approval of the expansion project has been slated for Sat., Nov. 17, when a bond issue to finance the cost will be submitted to voters.

Police Department Seeking Applicants

Henry Wilgus that arson was suspected. A can of lighter fluid found at the scene apparently was used to ignite the flames in a front room closet. Extensive fire damage occurred in 3 bedrooms, and dining area, kitchen and bathroom sustained damage from smoke.

Questioning of neighbors by police brought out the fact that small boys had been seen earlier playing near the house and that the previous evening lights in the house were observed being turned on and off.

Juvenile Officer Jerry Szczepaniak's investigation elicited the name of a boy as a possible suspect. Police report that when they confronted the boy with the evidence in the presence of his parents and told him they wanted his fingerprints to compare with prints found on the lighter fluid can, the boy confessed starting the fire. Further interrogation, Chief Kagann said, pointed to the boy's responsibility for two other recent fires, both in houses under construction, one at Walnut and Forest Glen pkwy., the other, a model home on Forest Glen near Larchwood.

Delinquency charges were filed against the child with DuPage Family Court Judge Atten. A hearing held Aug. 10 in Wheaton was continued pending psychiatric examination of the boy.

21 Cent Increase Asked

At the July 6 school board meeting, the board agreed unanimously to ask for a 21 cents per hundred educational fund increase on Sept. 15. Based on a \$10,000 equalized assessed valuation, this will mean a \$21.00 per year increase for school district 68 residents.

A report published by the county showing the latest known figures of costs per pupil on a county wide basis showed this district to be lowest. Out of 44 elementary school districts in DuPage County, district 68 was rock bottom with a figure of \$347.28 per pupil, per year. The next lowest figure was \$12.08 more than district 68.

The board discussed and approved the budget, with one possible exception. Marvin Wiggins questioned Al Olsen, chairman, building and grounds committee, as to whether or not adequate funds were available for grounds improvement and maintenance. Olsen replied that it was doubtful, but that monies could probably be borrowed from another fund.

No questions were raised from the floor regarding the budget.

There was also some discussion concerning the use of school facilities. Increased demand and other causes have made it necessary for the board to revise their policy concerning such use. Lew Benkendorf, Olga Redfield, and Marvin Wiggins, as members of the public relations committee, were instructed to meet to revise the policy and set new fees, regardless of past policy and fees. It is the board's understanding that it is to provide a custodian for each activity using school facilities. This will be strictly adhered to in the future.

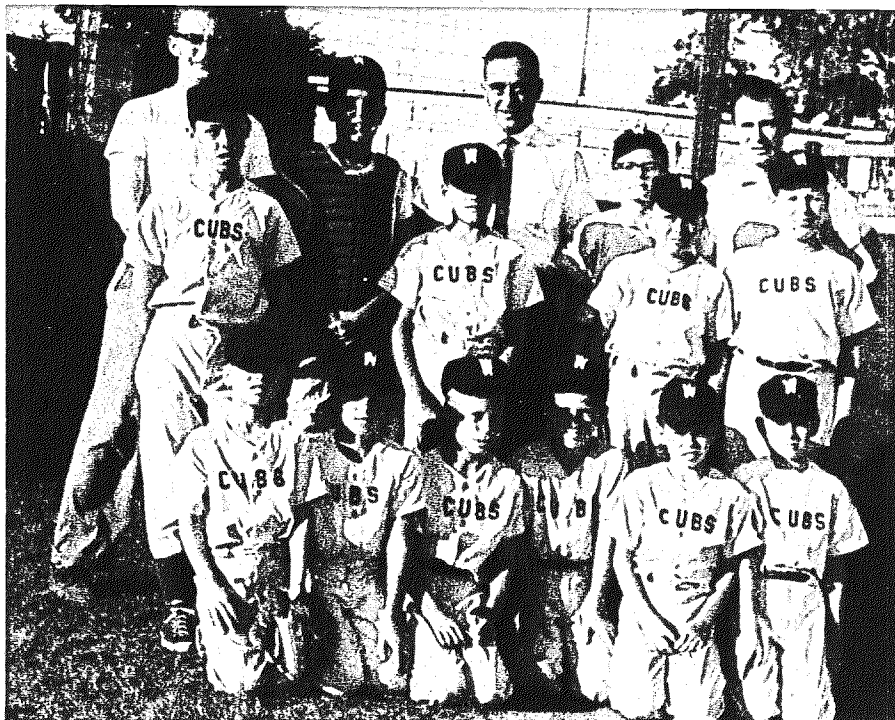
Parents Urged To Register Children

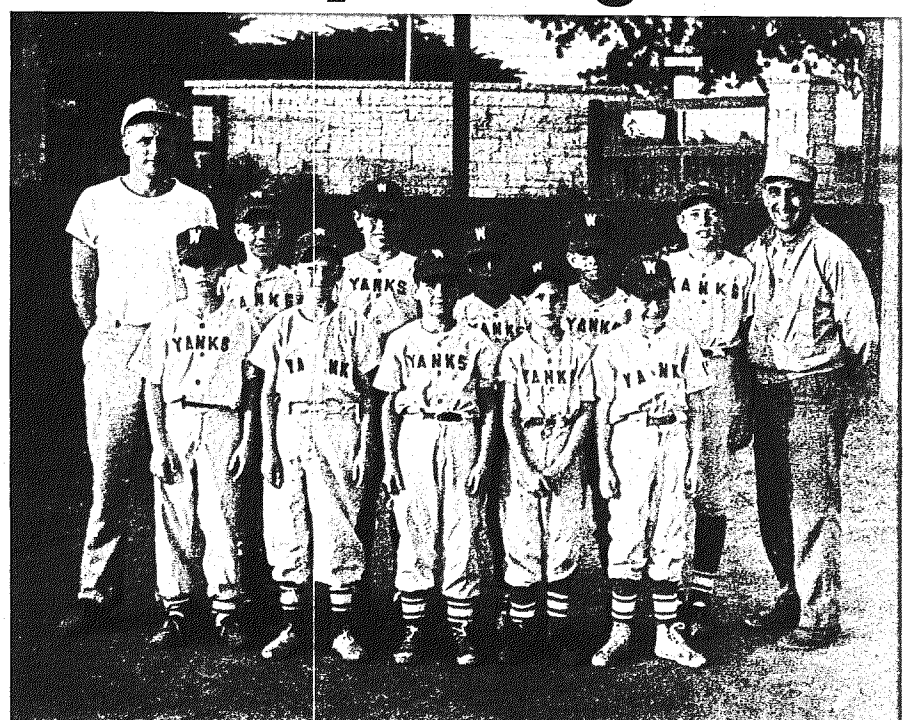
Optional insurance may be purchased for \$1.25 per year. Milk for the first semester amounts to \$2.82 and \$2.58 for the second semester.

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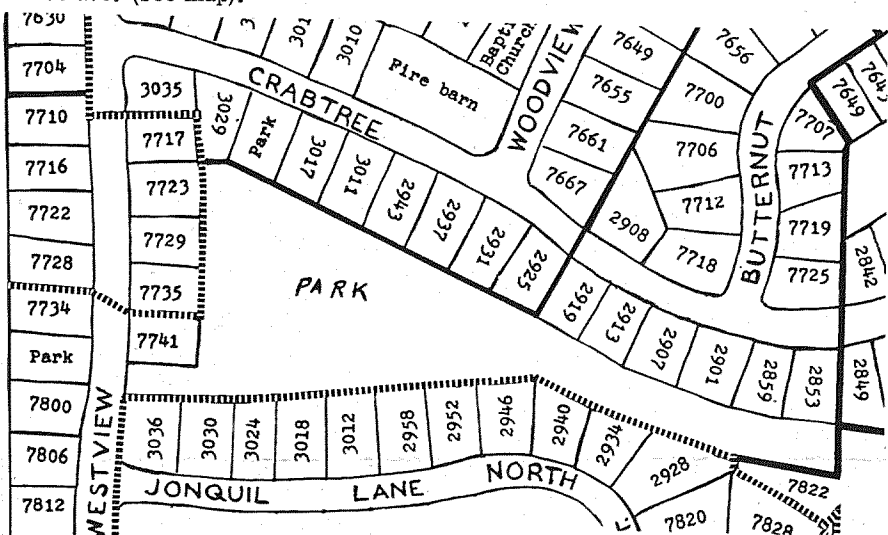
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EDITORIAL

The outstanding job that the community's organizations have done in providing activities for the children is a good example of what can be accomplished in a community when people work together. As the number of children here continues to increase, however, the task of promoting future activities will become increasingly difficult unless recreational areas are provided.

The only land now being used for community recreational purposes is the Woodridge Athletic Association baseball field on 75th place. This is presently being leased from Surety Development Corp. by the WAA. Additional space is needed, and preferably it should be permanent.

There is an area which is probably unknown to many Woodridge residents, that if developed could be used to provide permanent space for a picnic area, a playground and general game area. This is a site consisting of about 2 acres of usable land located on the north side of the village creek between Jonquil lane north and Crabtree ave. (see map).



The main advantage of this location is that it has already been designated as a park site. To make this park usable will not be easy, but anyone using a little imagination upon visiting this site will see the possibilities that exist for its use.

Now is the time to begin planning the development of this park. At times, in the past, attempts on the part of some individuals and organizations to obtain recreational facilities for the community have been met with negativism and apathy. The fact is that the community can no longer afford this attitude.

No one who moves into a newly formed community can rightly expect to have all the facilities of an older established community, but he has a right to expect that serious plans are being made for the future attainment of them.

Sir:

The Little League season has come to a close and I feel that now this letter can be written.

As one of several arbiters assigned to umpire the games, I was under the "misguided?" impression that the primary purpose of the Little League program was to teach these youngsters the true meaning of sportsmanship and team effort.

However, it has been my personal experience on several occasions to find, not only team managers but, even more important, the parents, seated on the sidelines, hurling insults at the umpires because a close decision would go against their favorite team. Even more distasteful and shocking would be to hear them deride a youngster for a bad play --- a situation brought on solely because of extreme youth and inexperience - a factor too many adults surprisingly overlook.

No umpire, from the Major Leagues on down, claims infallibility, nor does he claim an insensibility to the feelings of the players but it borders on the disastrous to see these young lads exposed to the example set by their managers and parents. Perhaps too late will these lads learn that all decisions in their later lives will not always be in their favor.

It is sincerely hoped that the adults connected with this program will awaken to the damage they can inflict upon the makeup that will eventually turn these young men into adults --- It calls to mind a famous quote that might very well be taken to heart by all concerned---"When your life's work is done and the great Scorer comes to write before your name, He writes not if you won or lost but how you played the game."

I do not say that the lads should not play their hardest to win but should also be taught to respect authority and learn to graciously accept adverse decisions. They can learn this only from the example shown them by the adults concerned most closely with them.

Please, Managers and Parents, remember the key word in Little League is "FAIR PLAY".

Another teenager pointed out that Chicago's curfew pertains to youngsters under 17 years old and suggested Woodridge's curfew might follow suit, while yet another cited the Illinois law which makes it possible for 16 year olds to drive automobiles a privilege carrying great responsibility, and yet youngsters under 18 are apparently not considered responsible enough to walk home at night without adult escort.

Chief Kagann said that embodied in the ordinance would be a provision calling for a written warning to parents of a child detained for the first offense under section I. A subsequent violation would be followed by legal action against the parents through family court.

A question was put to the committee concerning the attitude of the village toward teenagers and whether the fact that they might be considered "troublesome" makes it necessary to adopt a curfew ordinance. Chief Kagann answered that in July of 28 calls handled by the police department, 8 involved juveniles, the majority being those out late at night.

Trustee Kennell stressed that the curfew is not designed to punish the orderly cooperative youngsters, but rather to provide a means of restricting purposeless youth and preventing them from getting into trouble. He called them exceptions to the rule that the village must be capable of handling.

The committee will consider the recommendations at its next meeting and present a revised draft of the ordinance for approval at the next regular village board meeting.

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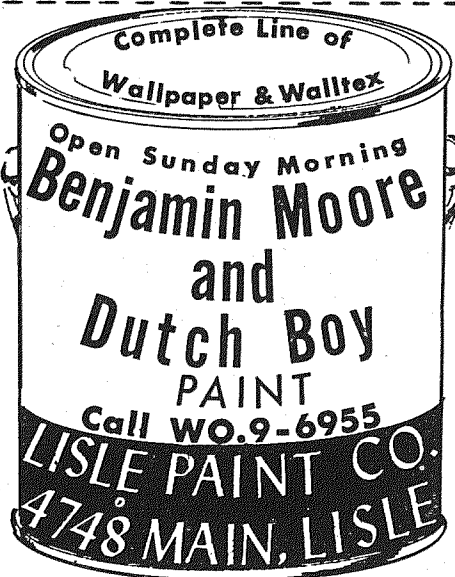


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ODD & ENDS

To continue from the last issue with our cluster of eleven forest preserves, we have:

Number 20 - McDowell Woods

Features two lovely islands. Portions of the islands may be reserved by large picnic groups. Rowboating, especially by the teen-ager, is popular here. Charge is one dollar an hour for the boat. Some crappie and bullhead fishing is done from the shore. Quaint is the word for this preserve.

Number 10 - Warrenville Grove

Lovely waterfall. Picnic areas. Watch the little ones at this preserve as there are several areas where close supervision of the very young is wise. Considerably fished for reasons not well understood.

Number 4 - Maple Grove

This preserve is very popular with organized Girl Scout groups. Such groups are the major users of this preserve.

Number 12 - Herrick Lake

The lake is 17 acres; the preserve is 190 acres. The lake is beautiful from the distance and attracts camera fans for this reason. (The main body of the lake loses some of its charm close-up; a smaller adjunct to the west fares much better.) Carp, bullhead, and catfish are caught regularly.

Let Junior fish from the shore as the family picnics. He will have a reasonable chance of catching something "Big".

A concession stand exists, as well as many picnic sites. Boats (no motors allowed) for fishing or pleasure are rented for 75¢ an hour. Fifteen minutes drive from Woodridge.

Number 2 - West DuPage Park

Children of scouting age enjoy this park very much. The park is a maze of criss-crossed trails and lanes, and the youngster is soon "lost". The size of the park is small enough, however, that no

search party is ever needed; the "lost" will soon find his way. Used extensively by the scouts. Resident caretaker.

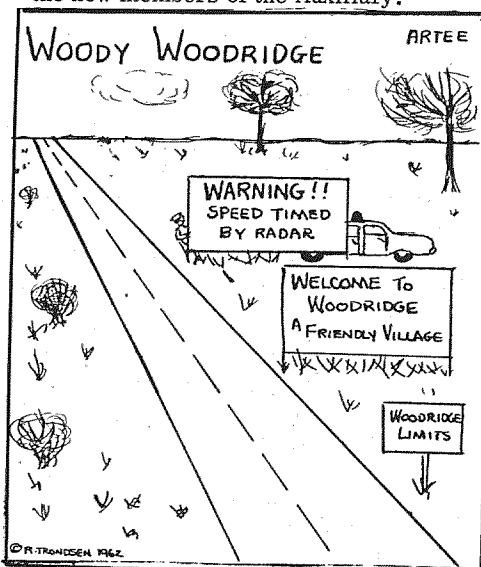
Number 9 - Churchill

The forest preserve headquarters is here. Very well kept preserve. Excellent picnic facilities. Some serious fishing is done, pre-dawn. Crappies, bluegills, bullheads, pickerel and bass have been caught. The parking off St. Charles Road is very crowded on week-ends; the Crescent St. parking lot less so.

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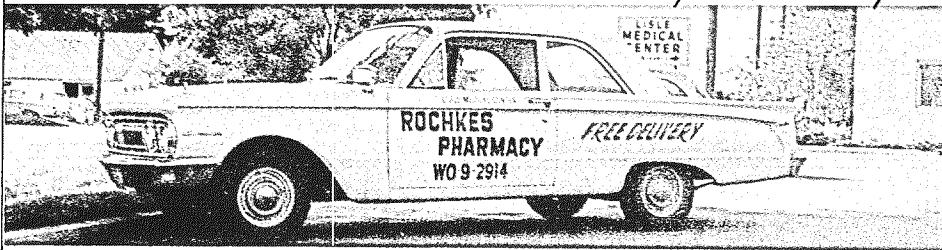

Woodridge-Goodrich Schools To Start Sept. 4

School bells will ring Tues., Sept. 4, for an estimated 425 pupils, heralding the 2nd full year of classes at Woodridge school, and 160, who will mark the present Goodrich school's 36th year. The opening session will be abbreviated, lasting about 1 hour for students, while teachers will remain all day.

Full-time classes will resume the 5th in 16 of the 20 classrooms at Woodridge. Two vacant rooms in the new north wing will be used as a central library for 1st to 4th grades and as a movie/music room. In the west wing two new rooms will serve as a library for 5th to 8th grades and as a science room. If increased enrollment necessitates, these rooms will be converted to classrooms.

There will be no combined classes at Goodrich school this year. Three classroom additions make it possible for each grade to have its own room, with a vacant room to be utilized as a central library.

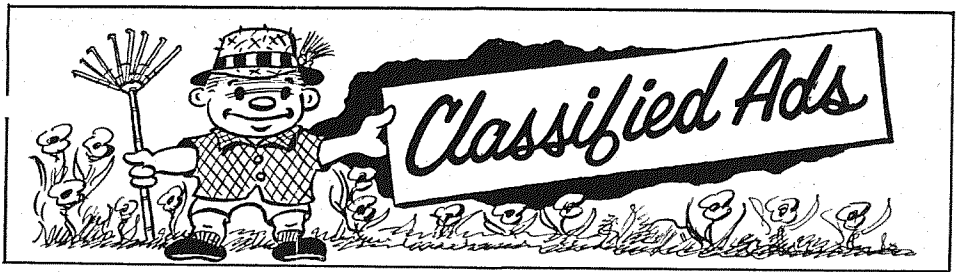

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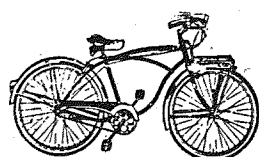
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
