472 Vote In School Race

Unofficial results of the April 13 School District 68 election indicate that a total of 472 voters elected three incumbents and one new member to the Board of Education. Re-elected to a full threeyear term were John Dahlberg, now serving as president of the board, and Alfred Olsen. Arthur Thuerk of Woodridge will serve his first three-year term. and Charles Smeeth will fill an unexpired one-year term. A breakdown of the voting follows:

The village board approved the plat for Woodridge Woods #2 at the Apr. 4 board meeting. The board's approval, first given at the Mar. 7 meeting, was rescinded at a special meeting Mar. 21 because of points not conforming with the Woodridge subdivision control ordinance. The plat, submitted by Surety Development Corp., is for the development of an area of 50 homes in the southwestern corner of the village.

Action on this plat on the part of the plan commission in Nov., '62 had been to

'63-'64 Budget **Approved**

The budget for the village for the '63-'64 fiscal year was read and approved by the village board Apr. 4. It was passed as an appropriation ordinance which establishes by law the maximum amounts that can be paid for particular departments. The amounts budgeted in this manner do not represent committments but legal maximums. This budget establishes the total maximum in the general fund of \$84,075.00 and a maximum of \$19,000.00 in the streets and alleys fund for a complete total of \$103,075.00. The general fund figure, \$84,075.00, includes \$59,155 for general operation of the village and

\$24,920 for the police department. This budget reflects the expected needs. of a growing Woodridge including the anticipated annexation of the Winston Hills area. The anticipated income also reflects these factors.

In the general administrative fund \$17,780.00 has been budgeted for salaries: for president, \$2,400; clerk and staff, \$2,880; police magistrate, \$180; treasurer and staff, \$600; building commissioner and staff, \$6000; purchasing agent, \$120; trustees - 6 @ \$780 each, \$4,680; Turn to page 2

reject the plat on 17 points. Of the 17 points, 12 were considered sufficiently at variance with the subdivision control ordinance to warrant rejection. Changes were made. Four points, unresolved, however resulted in the Mar. 21 board action to rescind approval. These points were the clerk's certification, a half street, the storm drainage system and the subdivider's agreement to install improvements. The wording of the clerk's certification was corrected. The storm drainage system will not be underground, but the subdivider said, according to President William Roberts, that at one point he (the developer) will make a change. A lot which was to have served as an open drainage way is now to have a covered sewer to the back of the lot, and then, the water is to flow down a natural water course.

The half street remains part of the plat. However, the village board felt that by the time the street is actually to be built, Surety Development Corp. could gain ownership of the necessary property to complete the other half of the street. The subdivider's agreement to install improvements was submitted in a letter.

Nees Receives NSF Scholarship

George Nees, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Balogh, 2807 Forest Glen, has received a National Science Foundation scholarship which will enable him to attend a six week engineering institute at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Okla. from June 9 through July 20.

George, a junior at Downers Grove high school, became aware of the possibilities of obtaining a scholarship through his physics teacher, Mr. H. Kross, and inquired into 10 possible summer institutes. He completed 4 applications that interested him and with the encouragement and backing of Kross and his chemistry teacher, Mr. Wheeler, sent his scholarship ratings, school transcript and personal data sheet in hopes to hear from one of his applications by May 1. He received an acceptance for the institute at Oklahoma State Mar. 15. The scholarship recipients are chosen mainly on the basis of high scholarship. The scholarship will pay for his room and board as

George will attend class 5-1/2 days a week and his main concentration of study will be energy conversion. The course will also include research and lab work. At present George is the only DGHS student that has received a scholarship from the Foundation. The purpose of the institute is to instill an interest in engineering and science as well as give the student an idea of what college life is like, although no college credit will be given.

public works, \$400 and \$520 for contingencies.

The balance of the general fund, \$41,375, covers various phases of village operation: supplies, rent, legal and engineering services, insurance, etc.

The police department budget provides for the possibility of another full time officer.

The largest single figure in the streets and alleys fund is \$5,400 for rental and purchase of equipment.

New WNR Directors



3 Brush Fire **Calls Answered**

The Woodridge fire department answered a total of 5 calls in the early part of April, three of which were grass or brush fires. The department would like to point out the hazard created by open trash burners, particularly at this time of year. They noted the village ordinance.

The ordinance states: "Paper and other burnable material, but not including garbage...leaves, brush, tree trimmings, weeds and other similar materials...may be burned only in suitable type containers in instances where ashes and the burning material will not be blown away.'

"And that any person, firm or corp. violating...this ordinance shall be fined up to \$200 for each offense."

The department would appreciate cooperation of residents so that grass and brush fires might be less readily ignited.

In addition to the grass fires, the department received a smoke scare call resulting from a burned out washing machine Answering a call from Willow, the firemen opened a locked house for a woman whose child, locked inside, could not open

Mr. Purchess from the Illinois fire inspection department recently inspected water facilities and equipment and indicated that the Woodridge area qualifies for a fire insurance rating of 8 rather than the current 9. When effected, the insurance rate will be dropped accordingly. Chief Long accompanied Purchess and the firemen on the inspection, and the group found that the water source is good and that the pressure measures above the required level.

New blue revolving lights have been purchased by the Firemen's Association from monies received from dances and benefits. They replace the old blue flashing lights.

The department has acquired a new hose drying rack from the Lisle Fire protection district.

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

Board Defers Annexation

The April 4 village board action on the Winston-Muss annexation request was to defer until Tues., Apr. 9, for consideration with the plan commission at a special executive meeting. With the withdrawal of the one objection of a property owner in the area to be annexed (the Nadelhoffer objection), the Winston-Muss annexation request is now ready for action by the village board. The Nadelhoffer property is a vital connecting link between Wood-ridge and the Winston Hills area.

A 2/3 vote of the village Loard is required now



This bid from Egizio Chevrolet, Naperville was submitted for a 1963 Chevrolet dump truck with a snow plow on a lease-purchase plan for a total of \$9,217.

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





Township Levy Passed

Nearly 100 people attended the Lisle township meeting Apr. 2 when a '63-'64 tax levy of \$50,000 for the town fund and \$24,000 for the general assistance fund was passed.

A special tax of .05 per \$100 assessed valuation for maintenance and improvement of approximately 60 miles of township gravel roads was also passed. The levy was requested by petition from township residents.

The budget for the '63-'64 fiscal year was presented, and objections were raised regarding increases over last year's budget

Objection was made to the proposed appropriation of \$500 for a thistle conmissioner. The objection was made on the grounds that \$500 could not effect a complete weed control program, and residents voted to drop the appropriation.


The proposed increase in the deputy assessor and clerk's salaries from \$16,000 to \$18,000 was questioned. Township Assessor, D. Saylor, explained that since the entire township was being reassessed this year, added staff would be needed to complete the job for this year's tax roles.

A motion was made from the floor to cut, rather than raise, the road commissioner's salary. Patrick Riedy, township supervisor, explained that statute recently changed this payment from a per diem basis to a salary with an \$8,000 maximum. The salary is to be set by the township board in advance of the April budget appropriation meeting. They raised the road commissioner's salary from \$5,840 to \$6,500.

After these explanations from the township board, the budget was passed as amended.


