The DuPage county zoning board of appeals will hold a public hearing Thurs., June 13, to consider a request for re-zoning of the Winston Hills area. The petitioners are requesting the county to consider re-zoning from R-2 single family to R-3 single family. Also requested is a special use permit for planned development and consideration of variations in minimum front, side and rear yard requirements. This area is that which has been under consideration for annexation to Woodridge by both the previous village board and the newly-elected trustees. The hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the Lisle Community high school, Center st., Lisle.

dent and board from the law offices of Chapman and Cutler, Chicago, representatives for the Woodridge Sewer and Water Co.

In 1960 the village granted exclusive franchises by ordinance to the W.S.&W. Co. to provide sewer and water service to the area within the corporate limits of the village, including any future areas. These franchises are now being considered as possible roadblocks to the annexation to Woodridge of the Winston Hills area.

In January the Illinois Commerce Commission granted the Lisle Utility Co. a certificate to provide water to the Winston Hills area. The board has been informed by Chapman and Cutler that the granting of a franchise to the Lisle Utility Co. would constitute an unlawful and unwarranted invasion of the franchised territory.

The pre-annexation agreement of the previous village board included a statement to the effect that the trustees acknowledged the existence of the Lisle Utility Co. whose purpose is the distribution of water, that they acknowledged the certificate granting them the right to do so and that the developer (Winston-Muss Corp.) agreed to defend and hold harmless the village from any claim resulting from such franchise ordinance by reason of this agreement.

James McClure, legal counsel for the village board, told the WNR in an interview that any annexation agreement made by the village with the Winston-Muss Corp. will specially exclude the village from any position of risk. He added that in his opinion the previously proposed annexation agreement did not provide sufficient protection for the village in the event of a suit.

Roberts Files Protest On May 6 Board Action

President William T. Roberts has filed with the village clerk a statement of protest against actions taken by five of the village trustees. Roberts returned to the board "without the signature of the Village President and without his approval" the resolutions voted upon by the trustees at their May 6 meeting.

Roberts' statement lists seven board actions which he terms "illegal, null and void" and the reasons for his objections. Both the removal of Douglas F. Comstock as village attorney and the appointment of James E. McClure to fill that position are objected to by Roberts as constituting "an illegal usurpation of the privileges and prerogatives of the Village President as conferred by statute." Because of his objection to McClure's appointment, Roberts also protests as "out of order" the trustees' direction to McClure "to investigate and act as necessary with reference to the leases on the village hall and fire barn."

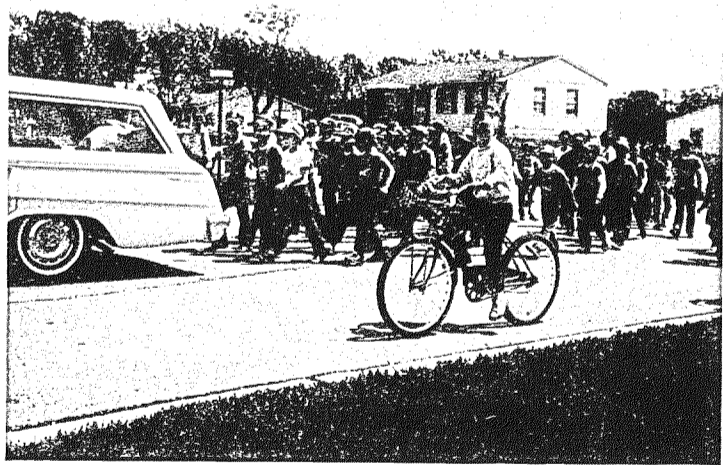
Roberts' statement lists as a violation of public rights and of the statutes of Illinois the exclusion of village residents from the meeting and the trustees' refusal to move the meeting to the school gym in order to afford adequate facilities for everyone desiring to attend. The statement also objects to the refusal of the majority of the board to abide by the procedural rulings of the president. This refusal, according to Roberts, makes null and void all actions attempted by the majority of the board.

Roberts' final objection was directed to the actions of the village clerk in "deliberately ignoring the directions and rulings of the village president" and "acting outside the scope of her authority". According to his statement, Roberts claims "the voting conducted in such unlawful manner was, itself, unlawful, null and void."

James McClure was contacted by the WNR to obtain his comments on the president's actions. He said this protest had

We are not anonymous,

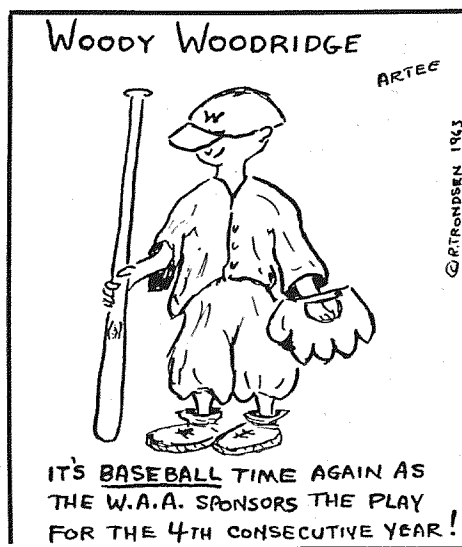

no legal effect at all and added that the president's signature on the resolutions passed is not necessary. Concerning the legality of the prior village attorney's removal and his own appointment by the board, he said this was done legally. He commented that the president does not have the authority to thwart the board, although he can use harassment. The courts, he continued, have interpreted the statutes on this matter to mean that the appointment is made jointly by the president and the board and that the board does have the authority to make a motion and act upon it.

As far as the validity of the meeting and the other protests made by the president were concerned, he said the meeting and all the actions taken by the board and the clerk were valid. He emphasized that the president is merely the presiding officer, and according to Robert's Rules of Order, which the village has adopted, it is possible to over-rule the president, despite his objections.

School Building Bonds Issued

At the regular meeting May 13 the District 68 school board unanimously adopted a resolution issuing \$30,000 in building bonds and providing for the levy of a tax to retire the bonds by 1970. These bonds represent the remainder of the \$180,000 bonding power authorized by voters in the December, 1961 referendum for the purpose of adding to Woodridge and Goodrich schools. Interest on the \$30,000 loan has been set at 2-3/4% per annum payable to the Downers Grove National Bank, lowest bidder.

School board president John Dahlberg reported that bids are already out for the proposed construction work at Goodrich school. The bids were to have been opened at the May 27 board meeting, but a motion was passed to reschedule both the meeting and the opening of the bids for June 3 because of the 8th graders' dinner at Goodrich school on May 27.

Carl Finkbeiner, 71st st., of the Naperville National Bank, has again been appointed treasurer of school district 68 and Alan C. Hultman will continue in his position as attorney for the district.

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Plan Commission Holds Hearing

A public hearing by the plan commission Apr. 29 was held to take testimony on a proposed ordinance amending ordinance 62-3 (Woodridge Zoning Ordinance). The members of the plan commission present were: Chairman (temporary) Wayne Bryant, Thomas Church, Nick Lung and Reverend Swanson. In the audience were: John Trask, Albert Zettler, Horace Thoresen, Ralph Kennell, Chief Joel Kagann, Bill Miller, and for the press, Mike Peary, Ramona Kinser and Bob Murphy. Ed Levin, attorney, represented Winston-Muss Corp.

Present sections of the zoning ordinance were read and then the proposed changes, one at a time. After each section, old and new, was read, the chairman asked for testimony from the floor.

John Trask stated that the references to block sizes should not be deleted... Section 1, para. 2. Mr. Levin said these references belong only in the subdivision control ordinance which already covers them. Murphy said that changes should be made in the zoning ordinance to correct the side yard requirements in R-1. Chairman Bryant agreed but said this change was not in the present proposed ordinance and could not be covered at this hearing as no notice of this point was given. Zettler pointed out that although certain

requirements for rear yards and set-backs were being proposed to be reduced this did not affect the minimum lot size (8200 sq. ft.). Murphy said he felt points 4 and 6 in the present zoning ordinance under R-3 should be maintained. These are minimum area for development 1-1/2 acres and minimum frontage 200 feet. Mr. Levin said that although these would not affect the Winston development, he did not feel they were necessary as other requirements protect the village. He also stated these points might penalize a small developer.

Trask suggested one other change be made to the present ordinance... page 4, definition of auto wrecking yard should read, one or more vehicles not actively being restored and not in running condition would constitute an auto-wrecking yard.

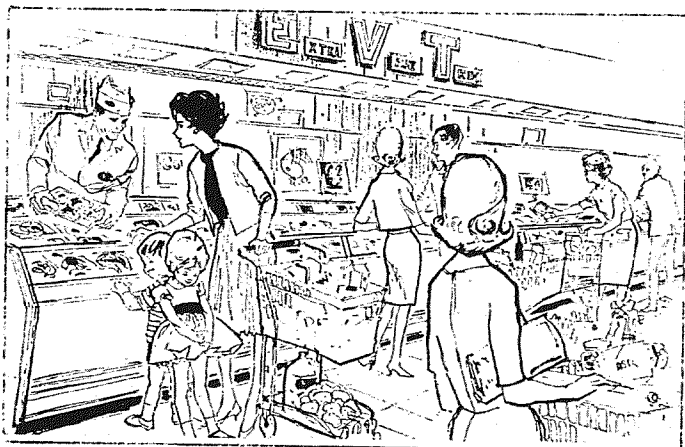
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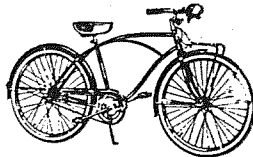
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Police News

Chief Joel Kagann announced that the Woodridge police color guard would be used with the V. F. W. in connection with Memorial Day services in Lisle and would also participate in the LaGrange (Ill.) Pet Parade to be held June 8.

The period between May 8-22 found the Woodridge police department answering a variety of calls ranging from a prowler in the ditch behind a Crabtree residence to a 12'x2' street cave-in on Catalpa ave. that was approximately 1 1/2' deep.

On May 22, Mary Daugherty, 12, was injured at the Woodridge school while she was playing and was taken home with a possible sprain; Rebecca Carter, 6, 7660 Catalpa ave., was knocked down by a bicycle while she was on her way to school and was taken to the Lisle medical center for treatment of a severe cut on her leg; on May 15, Scott White, 7625 Woodview dr., fell into the creek and suffered a severe cut on his hand. Mrs. Lillian Russell, 7518 Westview lane, was burned on the face and neck when a gas stove she was lighting exploded. Three Woodridge children were bitten by dogs---two on May 16 and one on May 14.

A girl's 16" bicycle was recovered from the creek and anyone having information as to the owner is asked to please contact the station.

Three fire calls were answered by the police department and on May 18 a call was received reporting a high tension power line which broke and fell onto a cyclone fence at Everglade ave., causing a short. The Woodridge police stood by to prevent any injuries until the power company arrived on the scene.

Ten boys were involved in a fight on Boundary Hill rd. and the information was turned over to DuPage county juvenile authorities. Other juveniles were reported causing disturbances on Willow ct., Sprucewood ave., at the Woodridge school and outside the village limits when they caused damage to an electrified fence.

A reckless driver was reported on Westview ln. on May 13 and advised that if he was seen racing his car again, a summons would be issued.

Automobile accidents involving property damage were in the fore. On May 10 a New Lenox driver and a Downers Grove resident were involved in an accident at 75th st. and Woodridge dr.; two Woodridge residents were involved in an accident at 75th st. and Westview ln.; and on May 21 Woodridge police handled an accident for the county.

Dog Registration

Before a dog may be registered, the owner must present a veterinarian's certificate indicating that the dog has been inoculated against rabies within the preceding 12-month period. The schedule of license fees is: male, \$2; spayed female, \$3; unspayed female, \$5. Registration of dogs under 6 months of age is not required.

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

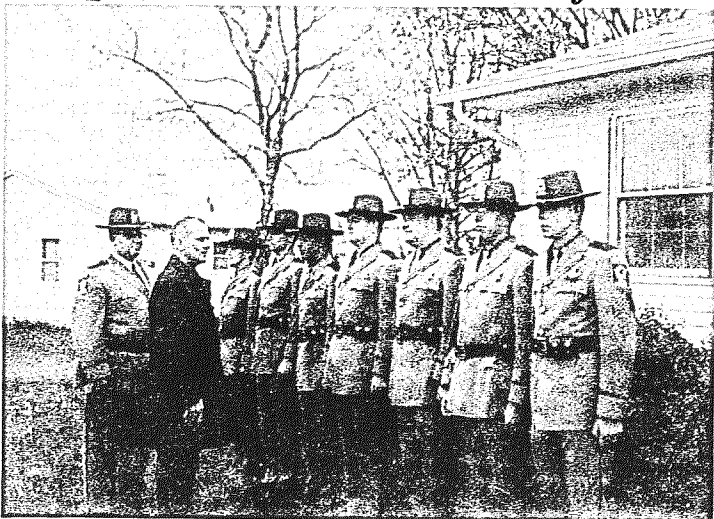
