District 68 Asks \$226,650 Levy

The district 68 board of education has entered a certificate of tax levy in the amount of \$226,650. Request was made for \$89,000 for the educational fund, \$28,200 for the building fund, \$1,950 for the municipal retirement fund and \$7,500 for the working cash fund.

The amount requested in the levy is expected to be required for the 1964-65 fiscal year for the operation of the school system.

According to John Dahlberg, president of the school board, with only a moderate growth in students, the levy requested will reduce the amount of tax anticipation warrants (TAW) which have been needed in the past. "However," Dahlberg added, "substantial building by either Surety Builders, Winston-Muss, or other developers will increase enrollment and thus costs, and cause continued need for TAW."

The amounts levied will be received if the school district's assessed valuation reaches \$15 million. The equalized assessed valuation for the 1962 tax year was about \$12.3 million. The loss of The Meadows will reduce the evaluation by about \$400,000. In the past three years, valuation has averaged an increase of about 2.3 million per year.

If the \$15 million assessed valuation is reached, said Dahlberg, the total tax rate will be about 1.86 or \$18.60 per \$10,000 assessed valuation. If the valuation does not reach the \$15 million mark, less money than requested will be levied, although the tax rate will be about the same.

Thuerk Resigns

The first action of the board of education of school district 68 at their Sept. 21 meeting was to accept the resignation of Arthur Thuerk, 2565 Crabtree, Woodridge. In a letter to the board, Thuerk requested that his resignation be effective immediately, stating that his personal responsibilities would not allow him the necessary time to continue as a board member.

Thuerk was elected in the April 13, 1963 general election to serve for a 3 year term.

The board then moved to seek a replacement for the vacancy, which is to be filled by board appointment within the next 30 days. The appointed member will serve until the next general election. The position will then be filled by election to the unexpired 2 year term.

Citizens Bank Sound-Hacklander

C. E. Hacklander, president of the Citizens National Bank, Downers Grove, when contacted by the WNR regarding the \$246,000 bank fund manipulation disclosed last week, stated that the bank is sound. Hacklander, who was elected to the presidency of the bank Sept. 17, said that the manipulation of funds will effect no financial loss to depositors. He said that the Citizens National, which has the reputation of being a highly conservative bank, is protected up to \$1,250,000 by fidelity bonds. He added that normal banking business has continued since the embezzlement was discovered, and that Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 23 and 24 (the days the missing funds became public knowledge), total deposits exceeded total withdrawals.

The shortage, uncovered Sept. 21, during a routine audit by federal bank examiners, was admitted to by Reino P. Makela, 51, who was a vice president and had been with the bank since it was formed in 1940. Makela used his position as treasurer of several school districts to cover the shortage created 6 years ago. He said that he did not gain from the money.

According to Hacklander, a thorough investigation shows that the money was received by Sidney Goldberg, former operator of the DuPage pet shop, Downers Grove, and that Goldberg has a record of embezzlement.

Many Half Truths About Annexation-Muss

In a statement to the WNR Joshua Muss said, "there have been many half truths and untruths spread regarding the implications of our annexation. To set the record straight:

1. Our development will in no way affect the rates being charged for sewer and water by Woodridge Sewer & Water Company. This area is serviced by a different utility company.
2. This project will serve to lower the municipal taxes, not raise them.
3. The project will have no adverse effect on the Village residents." Muss stated the following: "1. The annexation agreement which was signed by the Developer and Village assures the Village that the Developer will perform his obligations. In the event that the Developer did not perform, the Village would have legal recourse.
2. The Village is getting \$25,000 cash for a civic center.
3. The School Board will receive \$37,500 on Mar. 1, 1964 in addition to the \$37,500 that they have already received from Winston.
4. The Village will receive approximately \$200,000 in building permit fees.
5. The Village will get approximately 32 acres of park site... graded, seeded and free from taxes, (12.5 wooded acres will be given immediately).
6. The Village will receive the benefit of added sales tax and motor fuel tax income.
7. The Village will have control of the development of this area.

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land annexed is owned by Carleton Nedlehofer. The developers of Winston Hills plan to build about 1800 homes within the next three years. The agreement provides for a referendum, which will take place this Saturday, Oct. 5, giving the citizens of Woodridge the opportunity to vote on the annexation.

The polling place for the referendum will be at the village hall, 2909 Forest Glen Pkwy. Polls will open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. No registration is necessary, but qualified voters must be a resident of the village for 30 days, of the county, 90 days and the state of Illinois, 1 year; must be 21 years of age and a citizen of the United States.

Editorial

This Saturday the citizens of Woodridge are being asked to approve or disapprove the annexation agreement signed Sept. 12 between the village of Woodridge and the Winston-Muss Corp. The present village trustees as well as the previous trustees (See their letter to the editor on page 2) have strongly urged the citizens to approve this agreement. They both feel the agreement is a good one and will insure the proper growth of the village. We agree with them and urge the citizens to turn out en masse to approve the agreement.

As we went to press, however, we learned that opposition was being mustered to oppose the agreement. The exact reasons for this opposition are not clear to us because this opposition group has not chosen to make their views public through this newspaper, but no doubt the Woodridge Sewer & Water Company's failure to reach a satisfactory agreement with Winston-Muss over water company rights has influenced this group. The details of this battle have never been made public, but it is no secret that this problem more than any other factor has prevented the annexation from being signed long ago. Now at the eleventh hour it has come up again. There is always a risk involved even in a good agreement, but our public officials have assured us that every possible precaution has been taken in the agreement to minimize the risk.

Whether approving this agreement will mean that our water rates will increase is questionable. An increase in our water rates must be approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission. Justification for any increase must be shown. In addition, the Woodridge Sewer and Water Company is in business to make money for its stockholders, and we have no guarantee that the rates won't be increased whether or not the annexation is approved.

We have also heard the argument that two water companies should not be permitted in the village because in the event the village wants to purchase these utilities, it will cost more to buy two companies than to buy only one company. This argument assumes it would be desirable for Woodridge to buy these utilities. We do not at this time think it is desirable. Du Page county is developing rapidly, and we do not think it would be efficient to have each village owning its own company. We feel centralized county control over these utilities would be clearly more efficient and cheaper to all in the long run.

We again urge all to vote for the annexation.
