

Woodridge Mourns President's Death

To honor the memory of our late President, John F. Kennedy, Mayor William T. Roberts issued a proclamation declaring Sunday, Nov. 24, 1963, through Tuesday, Nov. 26, 1963, to be an official period of mourning for the Village of Woodridge. He asked the people of Woodridge to join him in prayer by attending the church of their choice on Sunday, Nov. 24. Roberts said,

"We join the nation and the world in expressing to Mrs. Kennedy, the children, and the entire Kennedy family, our profound sympathy on the sudden and tragic death of our courageous President."

A special service was held at Woodridge school Nov. 25, 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. Prayers were offered by clergymen from each local church.

The following words by the Rev. John L. Siple, pastor of the Woodridge Methodist church, speaks for all Americans who joined in prayer to pay tribute to the late John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

"This nation, in a state of shock, has proven in its hour of tragedy to be Christian by nature. All over the nation, churches filled with citizens who turned immediately to God for comfort, courage and strength in this hour. That John F. Kennedy, the late President, did not die in vain, it behooves us as a nation to show the concern he did for the underprivileged and under-nourished. By continuing that show of concern, in the spirit of brotherhood for all mankind, would be the greatest memorial we could offer to his memory."

St. Scholastica parish joined with the whole world in the passing of a great leader and statesman by offering a special Requiem Mass for the repose of the soul of John F. Kennedy.

Prince of Peace Lutheran church offered special prayers for the family and the new President, Lyndon B. Johnson, and the work of our government during these times. A brief memorial service was held at the parsonage on Monday.

Pastor Roop of the Woodridge Baptist church agreed with the new president when he designated Monday as a day of mourning and dedication. He said, "It is a time to recognize God. Our country needs to pray for our future." A special memorial service was held during the regular Sunday worship.

Jonquil Residents File Petition

The residents of Jonquil In. north filed a petition with the village board concerning the board's plan to change Jonquil lane north to Jonquil court. The village board is attempting to correct a situation in which a court which is not a court is so named and a street in two sections running east and west has the names Jonquil land north and Jonquil lane south.

The board has deferred action for some time to allow response from the residents who would be affected by a name change.

Being considered now is a change which would affect eight homes instead of 19. These are the homes which have Jonquil court addresses and north and south numbering (7800 block). The board discussed the possibility of deferring any action until the people who would be affected by this change could sign the petition or voice an opinion on the matter.

Village Hall Architect Hired

The village board has hired an architect for the proposed village hall. Lambert J. Soucek, Jr., architect-engineer of Hinsdale, was hired by action of the village board at the Nov. 21 adjourned meeting. This action is pending the signing of a mutually agreed upon contract. Lambert said he will submit preliminary drawings to the board after the exact needs of each department to be housed in the building are determined.

When pressed, he estimated roughly that the building would require 4000 sq. ft. of space on one floor and the same amount in the basement plus a fire garage that could be converted for future expansion. It was made clear at the meeting that Soucek's duties will involve architectural service and general supervision of the construction of the building. The general contracting of the building is to be handled through sealed bids to be submitted to the board and opened at a public meeting.

In the event of an unfavorable referendum, Soucek is to receive a token fee for the sketches submitted. This fee could, in the future, then be applied to a completed project.

Under consideration for a site for the village hall is lot 21 which is on the corner of 75th st. and Woodridge dr.

H.S. Board Plans Referendum

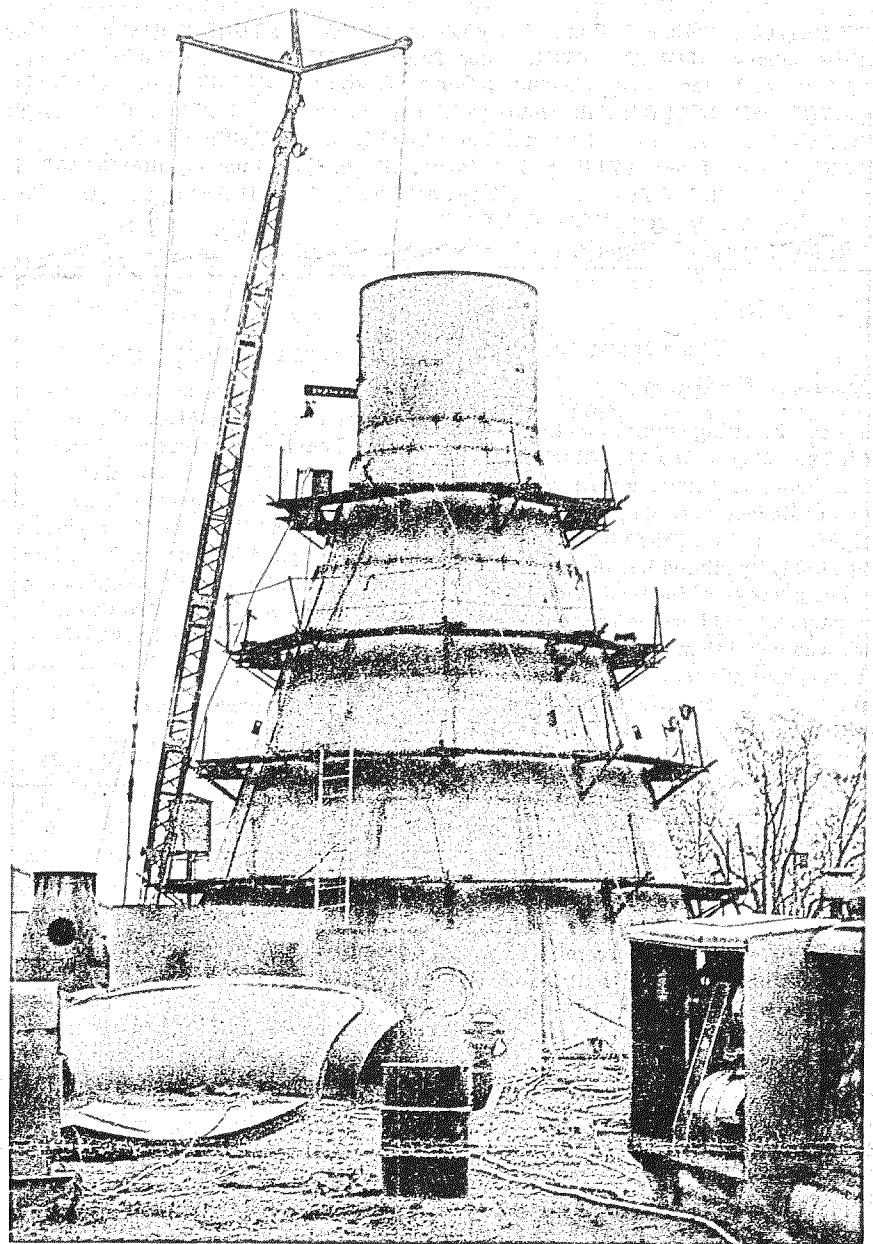
Downers Grove school district #99 has approved a second try at the school tax education rate referendum for Feb. 15 when voters will be asked to approve a 21 cent rate increase.

This will raise the rate from 76 cents to 97 cents with the money to go for teachers salaries, operation of the new high school and the like.

Effort has been made to keep salaries at a competitive level under a growth and incentive cost, board members told 17 visitors at the board meeting Monday night.

Too, it is not possible to operate two buildings for the costs of one and with completion of the new high school next year, additional funds will be needed unless the school is to remain closed and high school students go on half-day sessions.

The District 68 school board has announced that on Sat. Dec. 14 a special election will be held to vote on the following proposition:

Shall the board of education of school district number 68, Du Page County, Illinois, issue bonds of said school district to the amount of \$165,000.00 for the purpose of building and equipping additions to each of the present school buildings now owned and used by said school district for school purposes and commonly known as the "Woodridge school" and the "Goodrich school", respectively, said bonds to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum?

school district has been divided into two (2) election precincts, the boundaries of which and the polling place for each are as follows:

Election Precinct Number 1 - All that portion of school district number 68, Du Page county, Illinois, lying north of the center line of 75th st.

Polling Place: Goodrich school, Illinois rt. 53 and Hobson rd., Lisle township, Du Page county, Illinois.

Election Precinct Number 2 - All that portion of school district number 68, Du Page county, Illinois, lying south of the center line of 75th st.

Polling Place: Woodridge school, Crabtree ave. and Larchwood In., Woodridge, Illinois.

Voters must vote at the polling place designated for the election precinct within which they reside.

The polls at said election will be opened at twelve o'clock noon and will be closed at seven o'clock p. m. on said day.

Mayor William Roberts had said at the Nov. 13 meeting that he wanted a "package deal". This package deal would have included consideration of all the legal fees of the attorneys involved in the civil suit, Kennell vs. the village trustees and the village.

At the Nov. 21 meeting McClure stated that payments to the attorneys seemed to be all that was blocking the way to progress in the village in other legal matters, that is, establishment of the office of village attorney, McClure's appointment to that position and his payment.

McClure said that since the judge also felt this to be true, that he had instructed McClure that the village should not make any payment to Sullivan, attorney for Ralph Kennell, plaintiff. McClure, speaking for Kuhn and Matthews, attorneys for the trustees' defense, revealed that they would be willing to waive their payment if Sullivan would waive his. They are offering to do this, he said, because they felt it would be in the best interests of the village and progress. McClure said that Sullivan had suggested that he (Sullivan) be given two days to consider the decree as it now stands and that the board hold a special meeting early in this week to complete the other business before the board, pending his approval of the decree.

It was stated during the meeting that the judge would issue a final decree after the business of settling payment and appointment of the village attorney.

The meeting was adjourned to last Tuesday to again attempt to resolve the stalemate. Also to be settled at the adjourned meeting is appointment of plan commission members. The plan commission has been under-staffed for some time.

Deputy Clerk Ordinance

The deputy clerks are Mrs. Ramona Kinser and Mrs. Maureen Grummel.

Comstock Dismisses Suit

Former village attorney Douglas Comstock has offered to dismiss the law suit against the village for payment to him for services rendered. James McClure, attorney, said at the Nov. 21 village board meeting that Comstock had contacted him with this offer. McClure had filed a defense. The board authorized McClure to act on behalf of the village releasing the suit with no resultant cost to the village.

Scott Benckendorf Wins Poster Contest

Scott Benckendorf, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lew Benckendorf, 3028 Crabtree, has received an award and a blue ribbon in the annual Farm Bureau's "Better Food Poster Contest."

Winners were announced by Harriet Glasshagel, chairman of the DuPage county farm bureau women's committee. Students from Woodridge school competed with entrants from 20 other area schools. Vransy Advises On Safety Rules

Concerned with the safety of youngsters who walk and ride their bikes to school, Woodridge school principal, Lad Vransy, issued the following instructions taken from the booklet An Elementary and Junior High School Safety Education Guide for Teachers and Administrators originating from the office of the superintendent of public instruction of the State of Illinois.

While walking to and from school:

1. Cross only at intersections or crosswalks.
2. Stop and look both ways and for turning cars before crossing.
3. Cross quickly, but do not run.
4. Obey all traffic signals and signs.
5. WHEN THERE IS NO SIDEWALK, WALK ON THE LEFT SHOULDER OF THE ROAD FACING TRAFFIC. (A school rule states that children shall walk either single file or two abreast.)
6. Carry a light or wear light colors on dark days.
7. Do not hitch hike or hitch rides.
8. Do not accept rides from strangers.
9. Plan to use a safe route not only for going to school, but also for going to

While riding your bicycle:

1. Ride with the flow of traffic.
2. Ride single file when riding with others.
3. Get off of your bicycle when traffic is heavy at an intersection and push it across following the cross walk.
4. Do not give rides to anyone on your bicycle.
5. Give the correct hand signal before you stop or turn. These are the same signals used by automobile drivers.
6. Never hitch a ride.
7. Be sure your lights and reflectors are in order and that you wear light colored clothing if you must be out on dark days or at night.
8. Know and obey all other traffic laws.
9. Secure and maintain your Woodridge bicycle license.



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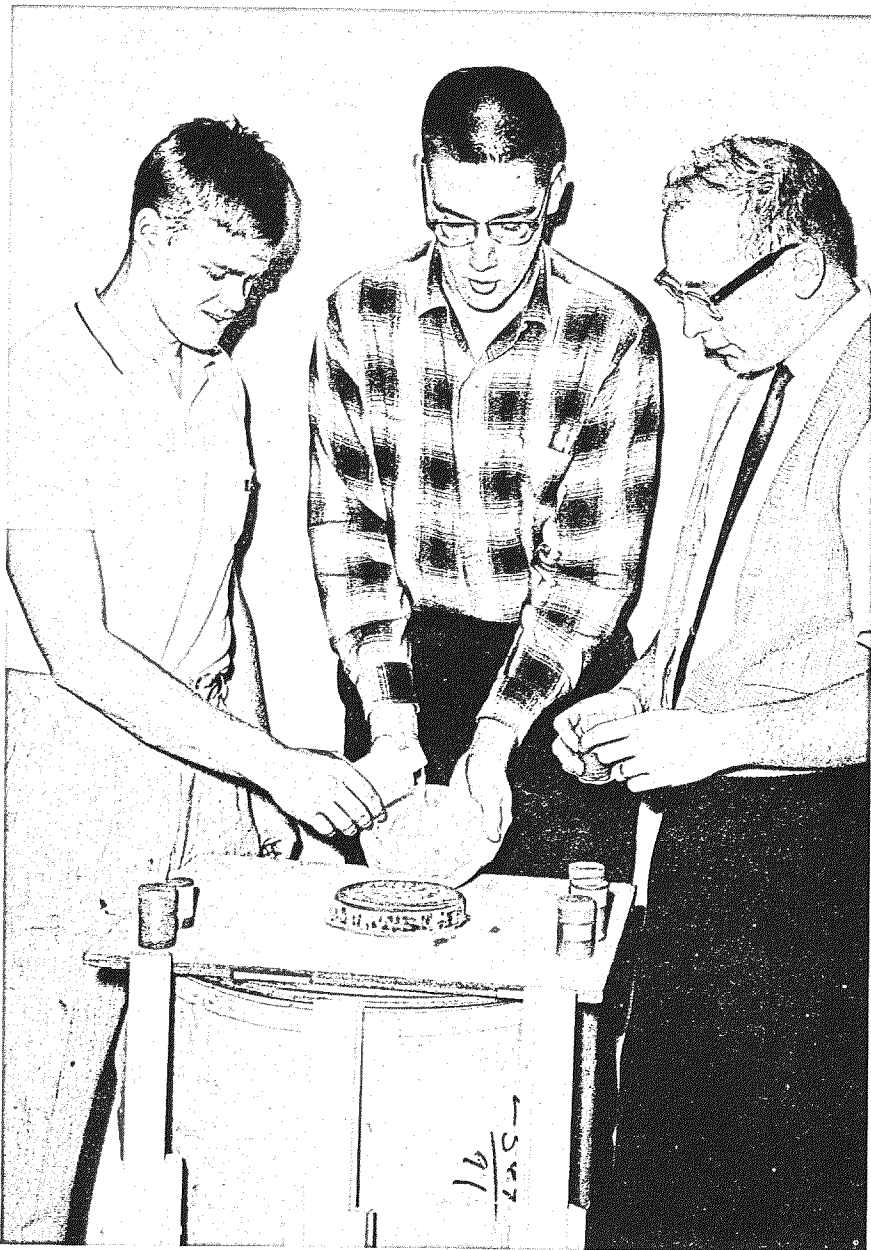
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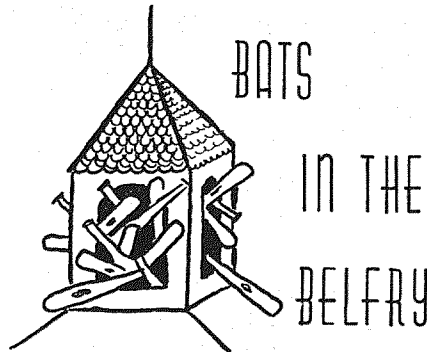

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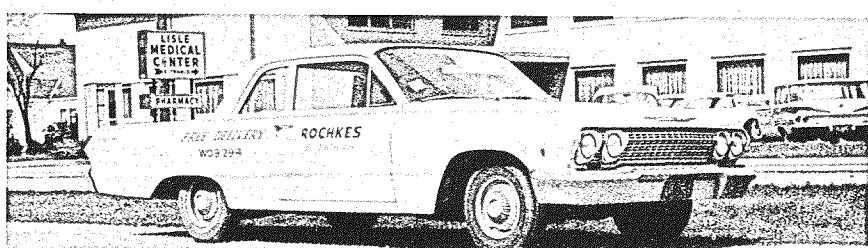
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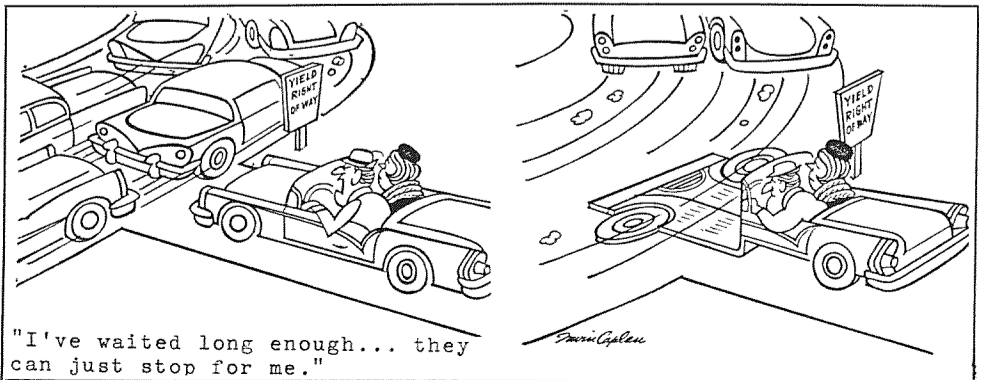

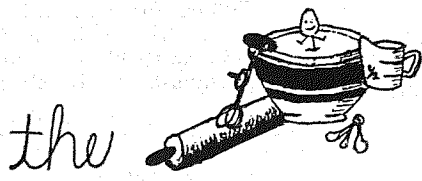
Grand Opening
