The polls will be open from 12 noon to 7 p.m. Residents north of 75th st. will vote at Goodrich school and residents south of 75th st. will vote at Woodridge school.

Registration is a necessary qualification for this election. Voters will be asked to sign an affidavit to the effect that they are registered, are a U. S. citizen, 21 years of age, a resident of the state of Illinois for 1 year, of the county for 90 days, and of the district, 30 days.

The rapid population growth anticipated in the district has made the additional building program a necessity in order to provide classroom facilities by the time the children moving into new homes enroll, board officials explained.

The board estimates that by the spring of '65, 2/3 again as many children will be receiving their elementary education in the district 68 schools. To prepare for them, it has been determined that the district will need from 10-14 more classrooms. Also needed will be additional toilet facilities, libraries, health and speech rooms at both schools. At Goodrich school, larger office facilities and the completion of the all-purpose room to a full size gym with a small stage, will be required.

The net cost of the bond issue, considering the broadened tax base and bond retirement, will be about 5¢ per \$100 assessed valuation, the board said.

## You Can't Beat It

A magazine article gave Science Club members the idea for their machine that "can't be beat". Frank Mabrey, Dave Krueger, Willard Bredfield, Jr., Jim Ryan and George

Nees, under the supervision of Russell Schavey, then took inventory of their stock of electronic parts and began experimenting to see if they could build the machine, which is similar to an elementary computer, with the parts they had on hand.

Approximately 20 hours of reworking plans and redrawing circuits resulted in success!

The "game" machine includes a series of 21 lights across and 2 push buttons - one for the player and one for the machine. The operator pushes the player button to light 1, 2 or 3 lamps and then pushes the machine button. The programming circuit in turn lights 1, 2 or 3 lamps and the game continues until all of the lamps have lit. The person (or machine) having to light the last lamp is the loser of the game.

Plans are now underway to rework the machine so that it will automatically take its turn and to build in a timing mechanism so that if the human player is too slow, the machine will turn itself off and automatically win the game.

## Village Asked To Consider Sewer Purchase

At the village board meeting Dec. 7 the Winston-Muss Corporation presented a program for the village to purchase and approve a complete sewerage plan for the Winston Hills area at an executive meeting of the six board members which Mayor Roberts was not able to attend. Trustee James Kinser suggested consulting utility attorneys to evaluate and define the plan. The Muss Corp. had agreed to pay any fee involved. At the Mayor's suggestion the board agreed to meet privately on Sat. Dec. 7 to consider the plan before submitting it to any attorneys.

## 2 Annexation Petitions Presented To Board

The regular village meeting got underway last Tuesday after an initial one hour and a half delay over the presentation of village meeting agendas.

The meeting was brought to order at 9:45 p.m.

Two petitions for annexation were presented to the Village Clerk, on behalf of Surety Builders. The lands involved are located: 1) One-third mile north of 75th st. and West of Janes ave.; 2) about 3/4 miles south of 75th st. to the east of Janes ave. where the old barns are located. Both these areas are now uninhabited but are part of subdivision plans for Units #5 and #6. The county will not approve the plans for these two units until the two areas are included in the village. It was not discovered that the land in question was not technically in the village until after the two plats were approved by the Village Board.

The Village Clerk stated that she thought there was a \$100 filing fee for annexation petitions. Albert Kaufman of Surety stated privately that the fee was "a complete surprise" to him, but if there is such an ordinance, the fee will be paid immediately so the board can act on the petitions.

## Other Board Action

### Audit Report Available

Trustee Leon Werch of the finance committee reviewed vouchers payable for the month of November, and also presented the report of the audit of the village fiscal year ending in April, 1963. An extra copy of this audit is with the village clerk for public perusal.

### Village Hall Drawings

A preliminary drawing of the proposed village hall prepared by Mr. Soucek, architect for the building, was presented by the special studies committee. In this particular sketch, the village hall would be a ranch type structure of yellow brick and white stone. No action was taken.

### Street Name Change

Action involving the name of Jonquil Lane No., Jonquil Ct., and Jonquil Lane was deferred to the second meeting in Feb. It is the board's wish that the entire street be called Jonquil Lane. The lapse in time will allow a public hearing on the matter for those concerned, before definite action is taken.

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## Editorial



School problems are many and probably more complex for the average person to understand than any other type of election or referendum in which he is called upon to cast a vote.


We think the referendum is necessary to insure that we have an adequate number of school rooms for our rapidly expanding school population. . . . but go to the meeting and make your own decision.

## W.W.C. Supports Federation Projects

The Woodridge Woman's Club was organized in May of this year and became a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in September. The club, with its membership of fourteen, is the smallest in the state. It hopes to relinquish this dubious honor soon.

Since its organization in May, the club has held a garage sale and a card party. Several other functions are being planned and a candy sale will start soon. The proceeds of these sales and functions go into the club's philanthropy fund and are then distributed where needed. Children's books have been given to the library, which will be opened in January.

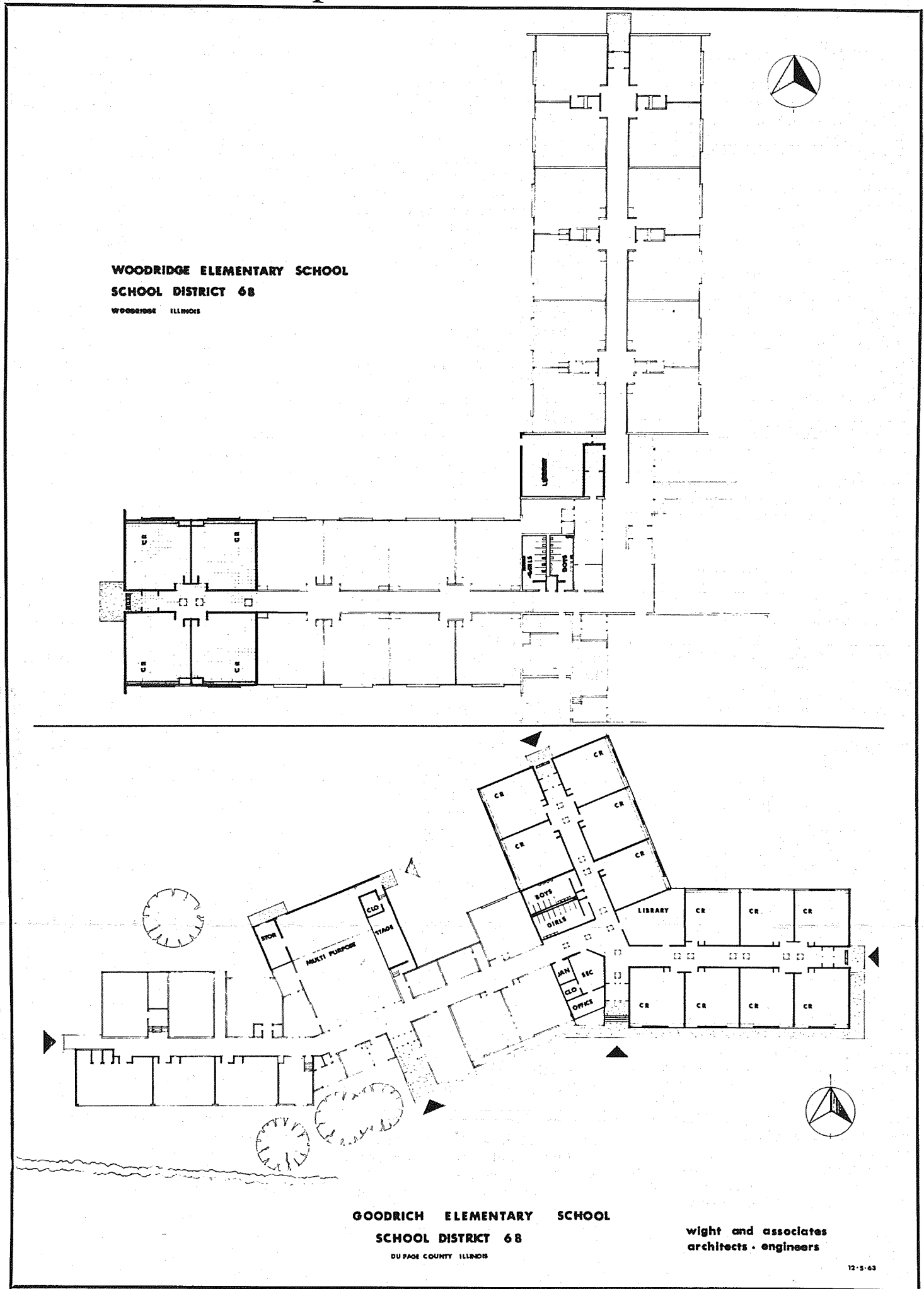
The club hopes to sponsor a Girl Scout troop and an investigation has been started into establishing a charm school for teenage girls in the village. Many other plans are being made to help the village. The club hopes to assist in landscaping in the village park areas when they are developed. The club has found an interested party to organize a Community Chest. Although it cannot be sponsored by the club, members of the club have offered to help organize the Chest as individuals.

Through its affiliation with the Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs, the Woodridge Club helps support a cottage at the Park Ridge School for Girls. At each meeting the members contribute the pennies in their change purses to the Penny Art Fund which provides scholarships to the Art School at Monticello, Ill. With a state membership of nearly 80,000 women it adds up to a sizable amount. The club also contributes to a scholarship for a teacher for Gifted Children.

Individual members will continue to help other organizations in any way possible, such as cake and cookie baking, chaperoning at teen functions and supplying transportation.

The Woodridge Woman's Club, only seven months old, hopes to expand its membership with other women willing to give their time and efforts to making Woodridge a better place to live.

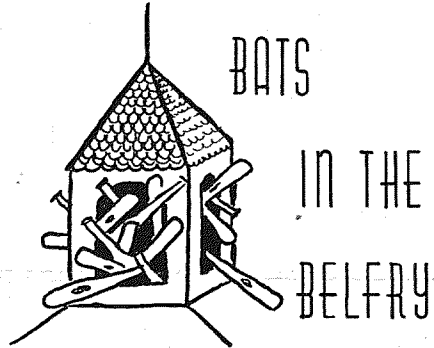

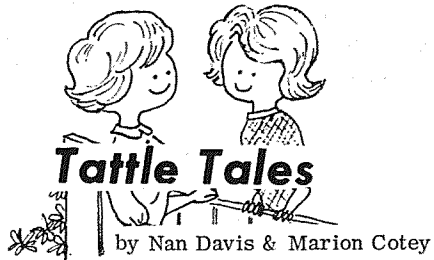
The current crop of sports games available for Christmas gift-giving is appealing to the average sports fan who likes his winter sports to be the table-top variety. In the normal mail-order catalog selection, no sport is overlooked, nor is any price range overlooked. In most cases, the games present a chance for the players to engage in a thrilling and rewarding evening of mock athletic competition.

Heading the list, and the newest variety on the market, are the road races. These sets are beginning to rival the old electric train in popularity. Here, in prices ranging from \$9 to \$40, are intricate layouts of racing roads, complete with narrow bridges, bumps in the road, crossovers and other pitfalls. The cars, the speed of which are controlled by individual rheostats, are rubber-tired detailed reproductions of real cars, in some cases complete to operating headlights. The hazards and thrills of actual road-racing have been faithfully captured by the manufacturers in these sets. A car must be carefully controlled around corners and down straightaways to prevent its spinning out and overturning. These games represent a rewarding investment to all ages.

In the field of professional team competition, games in all sports are available. The basketball game is a simple one, making use of a ping-pong ball, nets and backboards. A shot is taken by means of a spring controlled lever. This game is good for the younger fan, needing little strategy in its operation.

One of the old stand-bys, a game which reappears on the market every year, is foto-electric football. In this game, opposing players choose an offensive play and a set defense, unknown to each other. The play card and defense card are laid on top of one another, and gradually exposed to light from underneath. As the play unfolds, the runner is seen to run and pass, and can be tackled by the defense, or get away for long gains. It is easy to understand the popularity of the game.

A new breed of game, not too long on the market, is the vibrating type. This is available in football, baseball, horse racing, road racing, and other varieties.

In this version, much is left to chance and little to skill. When playing the football game, each player painstakingly lines up 11 players for his team. One player on the offense is given the ball. A switch is then thrown which sets the entire gridiron to vibrating maddeningly. The players, set on thin plastic legs, and pitched forward, move in crazily unpredictable patterns. If a defensive player, by chance, touches the ball carrier, he is tackled. The play, when unfolding, is interesting to watch, but the element of chance involved makes it unattractive to those more desiring of a challenge.

Selling for upwards of \$15 are faithful reproductions of ice hockey rinks. These games are fascinating to play. Each player has at his command 6 players, including a goalie, whom he must utilize to skate up and down the ice, turn, shoot, and block shots. With only 2 hands, one must be in complete control of his faculties to not become shaken and rattled in competition and know which lever controls which player. If a novice is matched against an accomplished player in this game, he is methodically and effortlessly cut to pieces. This is definitely a game for those who want an invigorating manual and mental challenge.

But the most intriguing table-top game of all is that offered to golfing buffs for \$13. This offers a three dimensional golf course, in which the player utilizes a small soldier-like golfer to bat the ball in the proper fashion. Advertised with the set are 4 golf bags, 300 balls, 16 clubs, and of all things, real sand for the sand traps!

# Argonne's ZGS

## Synchrotron Dedicated At Argonne

ARGONNE, ILL. ---One of the world's largest and most complex machines for probing the innermost secrets of matter was dedicated Wed., Dec. 4, at Argonne National Laboratory, which is located about 5 miles south-east of Woodridge.

### Erlenborn Lauded By Federation

The machine is the Zero Gradient Synchrotron (ZGS), a huge particle machine. John N. Erlenborn, who for eight years has served DuPage County as a State Representative in the Illinois General Assembly, recently earned praise from the Illinois Taxpayers' Federation for his activities on the Economy Bloc.

Erlenborn is a candidate for the Republican nomination for U.S. Representative from the 14th Congressional District, DuPage and Will Counties. (Editors note: The incumbent Congressman Elmer J. Hoffman is not a candidate for reelection).

accelerator that cost \$50,000,000 and required four years to build. It was designed and constructed by Argonne under the auspices of the United States Atomic Energy Commission.

The ZGS will accelerate protons, sub-nuclear particles, to 12.5 billion electron volts before sending them crashing into target atoms. These collisions and the subatomic particles they produce are expected to contribute new knowledge of the ultimate constituents of the universe in which we live.

The ZGS is the first major "atom smasher" in the Middle West and is one of the three largest machines of its type in the world. It was designed to accelerate a more intense beam of particles than any other high energy proton accelerator.

At the dedication ceremony principal speakers were Dr. Glenn Seaborg, Chairman of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission; Dr. George W. Beadle, President of the University of Chicago, which operates Argonne for the Commission; and Dr. Lee C. Teng, Director of Argonne's Particle Accelerator Division. Dr. Albert V. Crewe, Argonne Laboratory Director was the master of ceremonies.

At a dedication dinner Wednesday evening in the Elmhurst Country Club, Dr. Gilberto Bernardini of the University of Rome was the honored guest speaker. Dr. Bernardini is a pioneer high energy physicist who until recently was Director of Research for the largest proton synchrotron in Europe, near Geneva, Switzerland. Earlier in his career, he was associated with Columbia University and the University of Illinois.

Dr. Crewe also spoke at the dinner. Dr. Roger H. Hildebrand, Associate Director of the Laboratory for High Energy Physics, was master of ceremonies.
