The regular village meeting got under way last Tuesday after an initial one hour and a half delay over the presentation of village meeting agendas

The current crop of sports games appealing to the average sports fan who likes his winter sports to be the table-top variety. In the normal mail-order catalog selection, no sport is overlooked, nor is any price range overlooked. In most cases, the games present a chance for the players to engage in a thrilling and rewarding evening of mock athletic competition.
Heading the list, and the newest var iety on the market, are the road races. These sets are beginning to rival the old electric train in popularity. Here, in prices ranging from $\$ 9$ to $\$ 40$, are intricate layouts of racing roads, complete with narrow bridges, bumps in the road, crossovers and other pitfalls. The cars the speed of which are controlled by individual rheostats, are rubber-tired detailed reproductions of real cars, in some cases complete to operating headlights. The hazards and thrills of actual roadracing have been faithfully captured by the manufacturers in these sets. A car must be carefully controlled around corners and down straightaways to prevent its spinning out and overturning. These ames represent a rewarding investment to all ages.
In the field of professional team competition, games in all aports are available. The basketball game is a simple one, making use of a ping-pong ball, nets and backboards. A shot is taken by means of a spring controlled lever. This game is good for the younger fan, need ing little strategy in its operation.
One of the old stand-bys, a game which reappears on the market every year, is oto-electric football. In this game, pposing players choose an offensive play and a set defense, unknown to each other. The play card and defense card are laid on top of one another, and gradually exposed to light from underneath. As the play unfolds, the runner is seen to run and pass, and can be tackled by the defense, or get away for long gains. It is easy to understand the popularity of the game.

A new breed of game, not too long on the market, is the vibrating type. This is available in football, baseball, horse racing, road racing, and other varieties.

This is definitely a game for those who want an invigorating manual and mental challange

But the most intriguing table-top game of all is that offered to golfing buffs for $\$ 13$. This offers a three dimensional golf course, in which the player utilizes a small soldier-like golfer to bat the ball in the proper fashion. Advertised with the set are 4 golf bags, 300 balls, 16 clubs and of all things, real sand for the sand traps!

It is the law that when entering a yield right of way intersection, that the driver shall reduce the speed of his vehicle to not more than 20 mph and shall yield the right of way to other vehicles which enter the intersection from either the right or left. If the driver is involved in a collision at the intersection after driving past the yield right of way sign, such collision shall be deemed prima facie evidence of the driver's failure to
yield right of way.

The ZGS will accelerate protons, sub-nuclear particles, to 12.5 billion electron volts before sending them crashing into target atoms. These collisions and the subatomic particles hey produce are expected to contrib ute new knowledge of the ultimate constituents of the universe in which we live.
The ZGS is the first major "atom masher" in the Middle West and is one of the three largest machines of its type in the world. It was designed accelerate a more intense beam of particles than any other high energy proton accelerator
At the dedication ceremony principal speakers were Dr. Glenn Seaborg, Chairman of the U.S. Atomic Energy ommission; Dr. George W. Beadle president of the University of Chicago which operates Argonne for the Commission; and Dr. Lee C. Teng, Dir ector of Argonne's Particle Accelerator Division. Dr Albert V Crewe Argonne Laboratory Director was the master of ceremonies.

At a dedication dinner Wednesday vening in the Elmhurst Country Club Dr Gilberto Bernadini of the University of Rome was the honored guest speaker. Dr. Bernadini is a pionee high energy physicist who until recently was Director of Research for the largest proton synchrotron in Europe, near Geneve, Switzerland. Earlier in his career, he was associated with Columbia University and the University of Illinois.

Dr. Crewe also spoke at the dinner Dr. Roger H. Hildebrand, Associate Director of the Laboratory for High Energy Physics, was master of ceremonies
