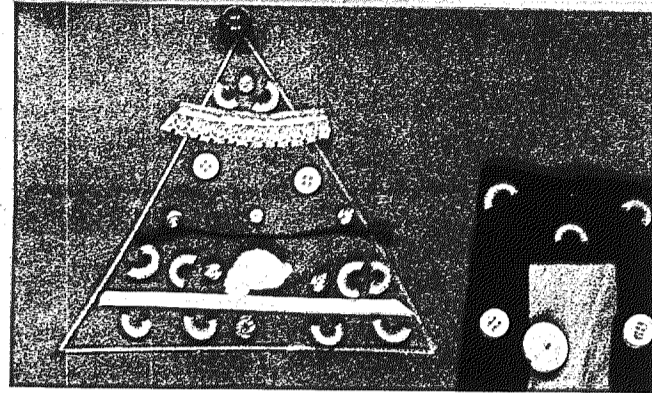

This is one of many V. F. W. programs endorsed, not only by the National V. F. W. Headquarters, but by several active groups in this community.

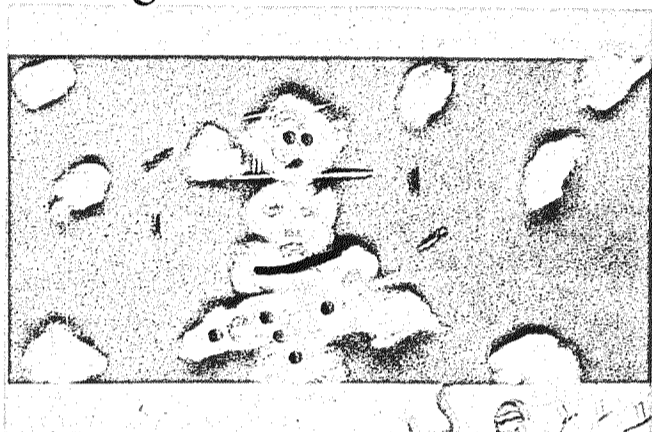
Cub Scout Christmas Party Saturday

W W C Proposes Blood Mobile

Mrs. Hester Thuerk, president of the Woodridge Woman's Club, has announced the club's plan to co-ordinate a Blood Mobile from the Mount Sinai Medical Research Foundation in Chicago.

May 28, 1964, is the date set for the Blood Mobile to be in Woodridge. The possibility of having the Blood Mobile here depends on the cooperation of the other organizations in the community, since there must be a guarantee that a specific quantity of blood will be donated. Several organizations in Woodridge have already indicated their interest, said Mrs. Thuerk.

She explained that the deposit of one pint of blood at the Mount Sinai Blood Mobile would provide coverage for the donor and his or her family for all the blood and blood plasma needed for a period of one year, at the hospital of choice, anywhere in the United States, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and Alaska.

To Have Magistrate

Effective the 1st of January, Woodridge will have a magistrate of the DuPage county court sitting in the Woodridge court on the 1st and 3rd Sat. of each month.

The Circuit Court has adopted a uniform traffic ticket for county use and also a uniform non-traffic complaint and citation that is patterned after the summons and ticket now used by Woodridge.



In answer to several requests, here is a bound-to-please basic recipe for butter cookies which can be varied any number of ways. These cookies have a delicious real-butter flavor and are perfect for Christmas decorating.

BASIC BUTTER COOKIES

Ungreased cookie sheet - Preheated 400° oven

- 1 c. (2 sticks) butter
- 1 1/2 c. sifted confectioners' sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 c. sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1/4 tsp salt

Cream butter. Add sugar gradually, cream until fluffy. Add unbeaten egg and vanilla. Beat well. Sift together dry ingredients. Blend into creamed mixture. Divide dough. Prepare cookies in variations you prefer:

Variation #1: **Snowballs** - To half cookie dough add 3/4 cup ground walnuts. Chill. Roll dough into balls size of large marbles. Bake 8 to 10 minutes. Roll at once in confectioners' sugar. Cool. Roll again in sugar. Makes about 2 1/2 dozen.

Variation #2: **Butter Thinsies** (refrigerator cookie) - Form dough in rolls 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper. Chill until firm. Slice 1/8 inch thick. Sprinkle with finely chopped nuts or coconut. Bake 6 minutes. Half recipe makes about 3 dozen.

Variation #3: **Chocolate Mint Creams** - To half dough add 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled. Form dough in roll 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper. Chill. Slice 1/8 inch thick. Bake 8 minutes. Cool. Put two together with Mint Cream Filling: Cream 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, 1 tablespoon cream, mint flavoring. Makes about 1 1/2 dozen.

Persons wishing to register to vote in the forthcoming national election and the February referendum for the high school district may come to the village hall or to the clerk's home during the hours stated.

The clerk's office will not be open for business Christmas week. Regular office hours will be resumed Jan. 2, 1964.

Edward Hospital and You

I read, with considerable interest, of the actions taken by Woodridge residents following the assassination of President Kennedy on Nov. 22. I refer to the collection of funds for the family of policeman J. D. Tippett and the memorial services held out of respect for the President. The Woodridge community is to be highly commended for their prompt and sincere expressions of sympathy.

As the tragedy unfolded on that fateful afternoon, I could not help but visualize the drama which was taking place in Parkland Memorial hospital, Dallas, Texas. Like Edward, Parkland Memorial is new and well equipped.

Early reports said the President had been shot in the head. Then it was announced that he was unconscious when taken from the car into the emergency room. Up to this time all I could do was to pray. Then it was reported that Governor Connally had been moved from the emergency room to a major operating room. Also, that President Kennedy remained in the E. R. as the equipment there was adequate. To me this meant but one thing. That the injury to the President was not serious or, more probably, it was fatal and nothing further could be done. The latter proved all too true.

I could well imagine the sense of utter futility and frustration with which the doctors and hospital personnel were faced at being helpless to save the life of our President.

It was ninety-eight years ago that another great President lived for a matter of hours after being shot in the back of the head. Abraham Lincoln lay unconscious through the night as the best doctors available stood by helplessly as life slowly drained from his body. As these thoughts crossed my mind, I could not help but reflect on the many columns and news stories I have written about Edward hospital. Many of these described new equipment which we had purchased which would help us to save lives. Some told of major advances in medicine, in techniques, and in operative procedures which would save a life heretofore lost. Yet, with all these advancements in medical science, the doctors at Parkland Memorial hospital in Dallas, Texas, were as helpless as those in the rooming house across the street from the Ford Theatre in Washington some ninety-eight years ago. The best in medical equipment, knowledge and know-how were not enough. Nor would it have been necessary were all mankind dedicated to the ten basic rules of life handed down by Moses nearly 2,000 years ago, the fifth of which reads, "THOU SHALT NOT KILL!"

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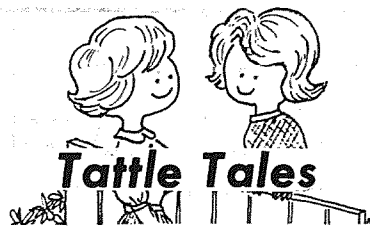
