

Voters Must Be Registered

Voters in the Feb. 15th Educational rate referendum in Downers Grove Community High School District 99 are reminded of the registration requirement.

The board of education points out that this is a new law passed at last year's session of the State Legislature. It requires that a voter in a school election must be registered for a general election from a residence located in the school district.

Others who should register include: anyone who has reached his 21st birthday, a person who has changed his name (such as a woman who has married) and a person who has moved to another address.

The Woodridge Village Hall, 2909 Forest Glen, is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. and Sats., from 9 a. m. to noon. Mrs. Faye Hoffman, clerk, will handle registrations.

Mr. Richard Miller, 7530 Walnut ave., has been named head varsity football coach at Leyden West beginning in Sept.

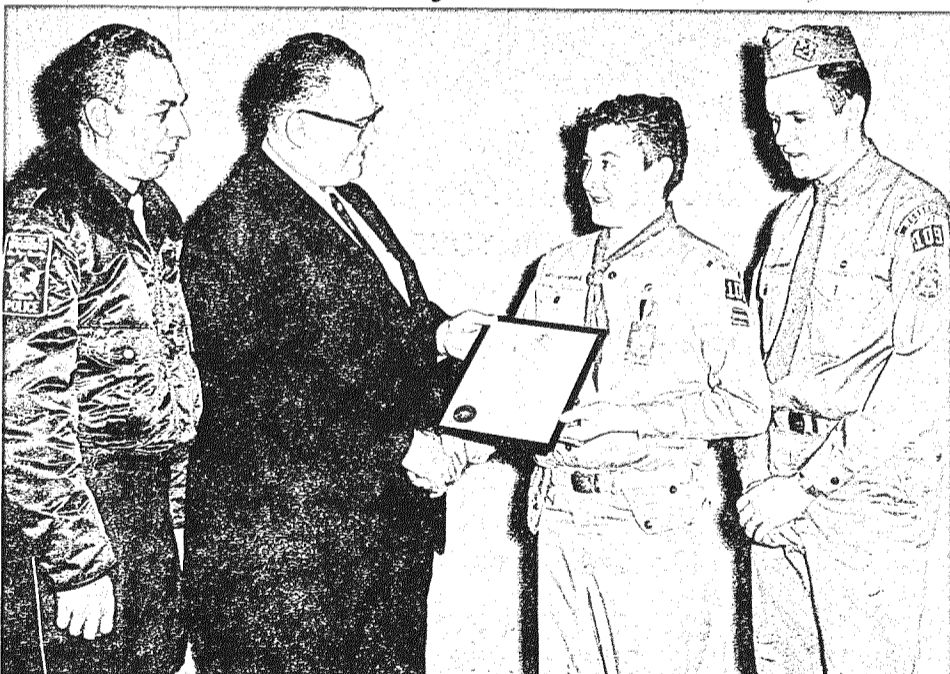

Petitions Now Available For April School Candidates

Resignations and job transfers have taken an unusual toll on the elementary school board of education of district #68.

Four vacancies will be filled in the forthcoming April 11 school board election. Remaining board members will be President John Dahlberg, Secretary Olga Redfield and Lewis Benckendorf. Dahlberg, who was reelected last April has 2 more years to complete his 3 year term. The terms of Mrs. Redfield and Benckendorf will not expire till April '65.

Nominating petitions for persons wishing to file as candidates for the district #68 board of education are now available and may be obtained from Mrs. Nejdil at Woodridge school. They require the signatures of at least 50 registered voters or 10% of the registered voters residing in the district and are to be filed with

Olga Redfield at the office of the board of education, Woodridge school no sooner than February 26 and no later than March 21, the filing period.

The four open board positions include: two full 3 year terms. The three year terms of Ned Hill and Marvin Wiggins will expire then. Charles Smeeth was elected last April to fill Wiggin's 1 year unexpired term. The other 3 year term that will expire is presently filled by

The origin of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, its service, objectives and activities on the national level as covered earlier are of interest to many readers. The more important aspect of the organization to the average WNR reader, however, is what has the V. F. W. accomplished and what do they hope to accomplish in the Village and what requirements must be met to become a member.

When asked these questions, Joseph Vymetal, post commander, indicated that through the years, Post 4739 has helped many individual veterans and their families in Woodridge, and will continue to do so. On the village level he listed several accomplishments such as: 1) helped organize the Boy Scouts in Woodridge along with other responsible citizens; 2) provided school patrol boys with rain gear; 3) provided the village with street signs for the safety of the children, including signs for the protection of deaf

children; 4) sponsored the first burning of the witch for the children at Halloween and 5) provided the first American flag for the flag pole at the Village Hall. Vymetal went on to say that several things are being planned for the future of Woodridge, including: 1) plans to improve street signs in the village; 2) contribution of their efforts to organize the Woodridge Inter-fraternal council and 3) plans for village youth activities.

Your Chief Says

The law in Illinois relating to EXPIRED Driver's licenses was changed at the last session of the legislature. The new law provides for a minimum fine of twenty dollars for driving with an expired license up to six months. After six months the minimum fine for driving with an expired driver's license is fifty dollars.

A great number of persons in our own community are driving with an expired license at this moment.

It is with this in mind that as a public service to the residents of Woodridge that I have contacted the Woodridge News Review and with their cooperation I have set up a special service for the purpose of notifying you when your license expires. This is being done as a public service by your Police Chief without the use of public funds.

The senior members of the Village Board spearheaded the formation of this Village with the help of Surety's lawyer. Much was done for the benefit of Surety. The Village settled for nothing more than leases that can be cancelled by Surety in thirty days.

Now, really (!) - can anyone expect five ordinary working men to correct the "mistakes" of four years standing - just because ten acres of land needed annexation.

Both Surety and Mayor Roberts did promise a series of changes which would benefit the Village - if only we would go along with the annexation. All told, if these promises are kept, the Village has much to gain.

With only 10 acres involved, four fifths of the CAP trustees were willing as a last ditch effort to take a chance on verbal promises.

I hope they win their gamble. But suppose they don't? At least they tried every conceivable legal approach to a peaceful solution. What more can anyone ask?

Two automobile accidents were reported to Woodridge Police in the vicinity of the new model homes. At the same time, a crack-down will start on residents who have failed to purchase or display the 1964 Village Vehicle License and a fine of \$10 will be levied. Currency exchange receipts are not valid receipts for proof of purchase of license plates, Kagann added and went on to say that as of this date, vehicle license sales are 300 behind this time last year.

February, George Washington and the cherry tree myth all mixed together have developed the American tradition of cooking special treats during this month, using the ever popular cherry. A delightful creation is:

CHERRY CAKE TRIUMPH (Cherries Elegante)

- 1 - pkg. angel food cake mix
- 1 - 1 pound (14 ounce) can pitted Bing Cherries
- 1 - 6 ounce package Cherry-flavor gelatin
- 1/2 cup sherry
- 1 pint vanilla ice cream
- Canned slivered toasted almonds
- 2 Tab. currant jelly
- 1 teas. lemon juice
- 1 cup heavy cream

Early in the day:

1. Make, bake, then cool angel-food cake, as label directs, using 10 inch tube pan.
2. Meanwhile, drain cherries, catching syrup in saucepan. Heat syrup, stir in cherry gelatin until dissolved. Remove from heat, stir in sherry, then ice cream until melted. Refrigerate until set.
3. When angel cake is cool, with long sharp knife level the top of it if necessary; then invert it on serving plate, and cut a 1 inch layer from top of cake; set aside. Now, with fork, hollow out center of cake.
3. Leaving a shell 1" wide around sides and 1-1/2" thick across bottom. Fill center hole in bottom of cake with cake pieces to level off bottom shell.
4. When gelatin mixture is set, beat it with electric mixer at medium speed until fluffy and smooth. Stir in 1/4 cup almonds and all but 1/2 cup of drained cherries.
- Spoon gelatin mixture into cake shell, replace reserved cake layer. Refrigerate.
5. In a small sauce pan combine currant jelly and lemon juice. Melt over low heat, stir in remaining cherries un-

til all are just coated. Cool.

6. Whip cream until stiff, use to frost cake, leaving top hole empty. Arrange about 3 tablespoons slivered almonds in whipped cream on sides. Fill hole with glazed cherries.

Refrigerate till serving time. Makes 12 servings.

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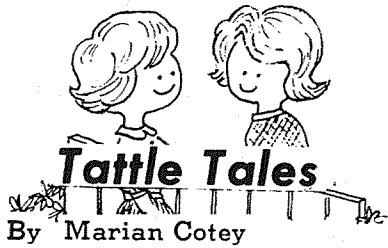
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Tattle Tales

In bed all last week suffering with a siege of pneumonia was Jack Collins of 2030 Everglade. We hear he has fully recovered at this writing.

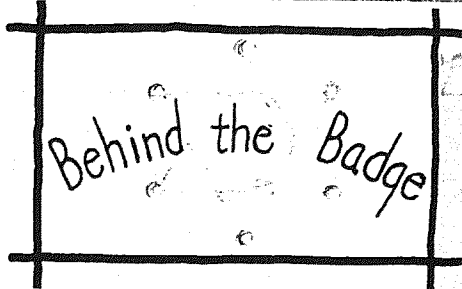
