## Muss Annexation

Agreement Contested-
Summons to appear in DuPage County Circuit Court were served Feb. 12 to the village of Woodridge, Winston Park Es tates, Ltd. and to the president and six trustees on a complaint for declaratory judgment by plaintiffs Charles Corcoran, Ronald Rich, James Wokas and George Hartifeld, all residents of Woodridge. The plaintiffs contend that the annexation agreement between the village and Winston Park Estates is "null and void from its inception by reason of the fact that it was made in reliance upon the constitutionality of Sec. 1, Div. 15.1 of Article II of the Illinois Municipal Code which plaintiffs contend is unconstitutional as it is.

When contacted by the WNR, Kenneth Brundage, 7849 Deerfield, Woodridge, council of the plaintiffs of the Law firm, Brundage \& Garr, said that the complauts had been filed to question the constitutionality of the enabling statute that purports to allow a village to accept money or land from a builder in retur for granting certain privileges regarding zoning, building and housing.
He stated that there were 2 main reasons for filing the complaint in regard to the annexation agreement which was he basis of the recent annexation of Win ston Hills to the village. He stated that the plaintiffs felt that the agreement gave the builder concessions by stabalizing zoning ordinances, building permit fees, building restrictions, etc., for 5 years, binding trustees who will come into office later. In effect, he said, this places the builder on the village board and gives him veto power over these specific areas, therefore lessening the effectiveness of the present board.
In regard to the suit, Mayor Roberts commented: "Someone may have good

## Editorial

At one time the filing of a law suit against the village would have rated a banner headline across the top of our front page. But times change, and the events of the past year have somewhat dulled our reactions to such actions. In the latest suit, filed last week, the plaintiffs are questioning the constitutionality of the law which enabled Woodridge to make an annexation agreement with Winston-Muss last September

This is the agreement that was overwhelmingly approved at the polls by the people of Woodridge.

At this time Woodridge can ill-afford the cost of being used as a testing ground for laws passed by the Illinois legislature. Anyone familiar with the present state of the village finances will verify this.

The attorney for the plaintiffs, in a statement to the WNR, expressed concern that the annexation agreement made with Winston-Muss lessened the effectiveness of the pres ent village board. If the plaintiffs are so concerned about the effectiveness of the board, why are they attempting to negate the most effective action the present board has taken since the election?

We fail to see what Woodridge can gain by this suit; but we can see what it can lose. Woodridge can lose a $12-1 / 2$ acre park, $\$ 25,000$ which is designated for a village hall or library, tax money which would have to be used for legal fees and about 500 acres of land now in the corporate village limits.

We urge the plaintiffs, who are all Woodridge residents, to drop the suit and save the village much time, expense and further loss of reputation

signatures.
Architect Lambert Soucek presented his preliminary sketches for a two-story $\$ 140,000$ building which would include an auditorium, offices for village officials, police department offices, a recreation area and a 5 -bay garage for fire department equipment. Members of the board have discussed with trustees of the Lisle fire protection district the possibility of renting the fire equipment space to the district for $\$ 80$ per month per bay, thus recovering for the village some of the cost of building this space
In addition to the costs of land and building, the board estimates about $\$ 100,000$ additional expense for housing of the public works equipment, relocation of the ball field, construction of roadways, landscaping, furnishings, architect's fees and legal fees, bringing the total proposal to approximately $\$ 250,000$. Under a 17 year bond retirement program, and using the $\$ 25,000$ WinstonMuss contribution to reduce payments during the first few years, the board es timates a tax increase for the average homeowner of approximately 29 C per month in 1965, 47¢ in 1966, leveling off at $56 \dot{c}$ in 1970 and thereafter decreasing with the growth in assessed evaluation of the village.
