Muss Annexation Agreement Contested

Summons to appear in DuPage County Circuit Court were served Feb. 12 to the village of Woodridge, Winston Park Estates, Ltd. and to the president and six trustees on a complaint for declaratory judgment by plaintiffs Charles Corcoran, Ronald Rich, James Wokas and George Hartifeld, all residents of Woodridge.

The plaintiffs contend that the annexation agreement between the village and Winston Park Estates is "null and void from its inception by reason of the fact that it was made in reliance upon the constitutionality of Sec. 1, Div. 15.1 of Article II of the Illinois Municipal Code which plaintiffs contend is unconstitutional as it is."

When contacted by the WNR, Kenneth Brundage, 7849 Deerfield, Woodridge, council of the plaintiffs of the Law firm, Brundage & Garr, said that the complaints had been filed to question the constitutionality of the enabling statute that purports to allow a village to accept money or land from a builder in return for granting certain privileges regarding zoning, building and housing.

He stated that there were 2 main reasons for filing the complaint in regard to the annexation agreement which was the basis of the recent annexation of Winston Hills to the village. He stated that the plaintiffs felt that the agreement gave the builder concessions by stabalizing zoning ordinances, building permit fees, building restrictions, etc., for 5 years, binding trustees who will come into office later. In effect, he said, this places the builder on the village board and gives him veto power over these specific areas, therefore lessening the effectiveness of the present board.

In regard to the suit, Mayor Roberts commented: "Someone may have good

H.S. Referendum Fails Second Time

Approved In Woodridge 159 To 121

The district 99 Downers Grove high school board of education's second request for a 21¢ increase in the educational fund tax rate went down in defeat last Saturday for the second time. Although voters at Woodridge school polling place supported the referendum by 159 "yes" votes to 121 "no" votes, the total 7,405 district citizens who showed up at the polls defeated the requested tax rate in—

Board Disscusses Civic Center

Tentative plans for a Woodridge civic center were presented to the public by the board of trustees at their adjourned meeting Feb. 12. Trustees Marvin Wiggins, Ed Redmond, Jim Kinser and Walter Hansen opened the floor to an audience of about ten interested citizens for questions and comments regarding the plans. Mayor Roberts and Trustee Werch were absent.

Chairman pro-tem Wiggins explained by means of a chart the probable costs of purchasing land and constructing the center. He stressed the fact that "plans are still nebulous and the figures presented are not to be construed as definite." The board intends to put the question of a bond issue to pay for the center to the voters at a referendum tentatively scheduled for April 4.

Wiggins reported that the location favored by the board is Lot 21, about 2-1/2 acres on the west side of Woodridge dr. between 75th st. and Forest Glen pkwy., which would be purchased from the Surety Development Corp. for \$16,000, including improvements. An option on this property has been promised to the village, but does not yet contain a full set of

crease by a margin of 398 votes. "Yes" voters cast 3,495 votes, but were overcome by the 3,893 "no" voters. There were 17 spoiled ballots.

The district will now face the problems inherent in lack of funds necessary for providing what board officials consider an adequate, well-balanced high school educational program. Possible roads to cutting corners previously outlined by the board will need to be put into action. Money from the tax increase was needed to provide teachers salaries, to maintain a

high curriculum standard, to continue extracurricular activities and to meet other current bills.

Deficit financing, which is ultimately more expensive to the taxpayer, will undoubtedly be a necessity. Another possible result of the referendum's defeat is that funds will not allow the opening of the new high school and will thus require half-day sessions at the present building.

The defeat will bring another attempt to get voter approval for the needed funds, board officials said.

Editorial

At one time the filing of a law suit against the village would have rated a banner headline across the top of our front page. But times change, and the events of the past year have somewhat dulled our reactions to such actions. In the latest suit, filed last week, the plaintiffs are questioning the constitutionality of the law which enabled Woodridge to make an annexation agreement with Winston-Muss last September.

This is the agreement that was overwhelmingly approved at the polls by the people of

At this time Woodridge can ill-afford the cost of being used as a testing ground for laws passed by the Illinois legislature. Anyone familiar with the present state of the village finances will verify this.

The attorney for the plaintiffs, in a statement to the WNR, expressed concern that the annexation agreement made with Winston-Muss lessened the effectiveness of the present village board. If the plaintiffs are so concerned about the effectiveness of the board, why are they attempting to negate the most effective action the present board has taken since the election?

We fail to see what Woodridge can gain by this suit; but we can see what it can lose. Woodridge can lose a 12-1/2 acre park, \$25,000 which is designated for a village hall or library, tax money which would have to be used for legal fees and about 500 acres of land now in the corporate village limits.

We urge the plaintiffs, who are all Woodridge residents, to drop the suit and save the village much time, expense and further loss of reputation.

signatures.

Architect Lambert Soucek presented his preliminary sketches for a two-story, \$140,000 building which would include an auditorium, offices for village officials, police department offices, a recreation area and a 5-bay garage for fire department equipment. Members of the board have discussed with trustees of the Lisle fire protection district the possibility of renting the fire equipment space to the district for \$80 per month per bay, thus recovering for the village some of the cost of building this space.

In addition to the costs of land and building, the board estimates about \$100,000 additional expense for housing of the public works equipment, relocation of the ball field, construction of roadways, landscaping, furnishings, architect's fees and legal fees, bringing the total proposal to approximately \$250,000.

Under a 17 year bond retirement program, and using the \$25,000 Winston-Muss contribution to reduce payments during the first few years, the board estimates a tax increase for the average homeowner of approximately 29¢ per month in 1965, 47¢ in 1966, leveling off at 56¢ in 1970 and thereafter decreasing with the growth in assessed evaluation of the village.

Courtesy Contagious

Courteous driving can have only one effect - - safe driving, Joel A. Kagann, Chief of Police in Woodridge, said today. "A courteous driver is conscious of traffic rules and practices them in his daily driving to make him a safe driver", Kagann observed. Courtesy on this highway, if practiced by drivers, can be contagious and will involve all drivers eventually. When a person is behind the wheel of his auto, he must become accustomed to conveying each expression of courtesy with his auto that he would at a social gathering, he said. "When approaching an intersection, grant the right-of-way to the person on your right. If someone appears to be taking advantage of you, let him proceed first.
