# **Board Acts On Unlicensed Vehicles**

An ordinance prohibiting storage of unlicensed vehicles was passed last Thurs. by the Woodridge Village Board. The owners of property on which any such vehicles are kept will be given thirty days notice to remove the unlicensed vehicles under penalty of a fine to range from \$50to \$300.

Chief Kagann emphasized that all cars, trailers, trucks, etc. must have 1964 license plates and a village sticker for the current year, regardless of the running condition or purpose of the vehicle.

Attorney James McClure was instructed by the board to prepare the ordinance for publication as soon as possible.

### To Elect 3 In Sat. H.S. Election

Three high school board members will be elected, from a slate of five candidates, by voters in the district 99 school board election, Sat., April 11.

Petitions have been filed by the following: Allen R. Campbell, Westmont (unincorporated area), appointed in September to a vacancy; Mauritz E. Gahlon, running for his second threeyear term; Warren Geary; John Hanson; and Edward J. Tuma, an independent.

The polls will be at Woodridge school and will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

## No Village Zoning?

"According to legal opinion, there is a strong possibility that a great deal, or all, of the village zoning ordinances to date, have not been officially recorded, published, or filed; therefore, the village technically has no zoning whatsoever!"

This statement by Trustee Ed Redmond explained the reason for convening a special meeting of the village Board of Trustees at 10:30 p.m., Tues., March 31. Also present at the meeting were Trustees Hansen, Callahan, Kinser and village mayor, William Roberts.

Redmond continued his explanation with the statement, "There is no record of the official vote on zoning matters in Board meeting minutes; there is no record of an official zoning map being published as required by law; and, " Redman continued, "copies of the village zoning ordinance and map which supposedly were filed at the DuPage County Courthouse in Wheaton, cannot be located."

# Two Woodridge Utilities Announce Merger

### New Emergency Van



The big news in the Woodridge Fire Department these days is the new emergency van shown above which the firemen purchased with money from their own treasury. The department earns money by sponsoring community dances and by donating to the treasury the \$3 each fireman receives per call. The van is now being stocked with first aid equipment, inhalator, stretchers, blankets, a blue light, siren and other

In case of emergency such as an asthma or heart attack, the importance of calling the fire department first and then the doctor was stressed. A few minutes can mean the difference between life and death.

The firemen are well trained in emergency work and you can be assured that your privacy will not be infringed upon in any way. Only three men are allowed inside a home and they leave immediately upon the arrival of the doctor.

## **Primary Election Next Tuesday**

Slate making Republicans and Democrats will turn out Tues., April 14, 1964 to cast their votes in the primary elections for the party candidates of their choice. Office bidding hopefuls will exist through their "longest day" which will determine party slates for November's election.

The polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Residents of the Lisle 18 precinct (Woodridge) will vote at Woodridge School at Larchwood and Crabtree, Woodridge. The Lisle 18 precinct is bounded by 75th st. north, Woodward ave. West.

To be eligible to vote, you must be over 21, a citizen of the U.S., a resident of Illinois for one year, of DuPage county for 90 days and of the Woodridge precinct for 30 days. You must be a registered voter from your place of residence. Precinct committeemen will be elected

at this time for a term of two years. Thomas Church (R) and Joe Rende (D) are running for these posts in Woodridge.

Voters will chose their party candidates for President of the United States, Governor and Lieutenant Governor of Illinois, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Attorney General, Clerk of Appellate Court (2nd Judicial Dist.), Representative in Congress (14th Congressional Dist.), Delegate and Alternate Delegates to the National Nominating Convention (14th Congressional Dist.), Delegates to State Representative Nominating Convention (36th District), Clerk of Circuit Court, Recorder of Deeds, State's Attorney, Coroner and County Auditor.

Election Judges for the election will be: Margaret Miller (R), Shirley Manges, (R), Barbara Cooling (D), Rosemary Mabrey (D) and Mildred Gulbrandsen (R).

# **District 68 Elect School Candidates** This Saturday

Four positions on the school board of grade school district 68 are to be filled by election Saturday, April 11. The polls will be open from 12 noon to 7 p.m. Voters living north of 75th st. are in precinct #1 and are to vote at Goodrich school. Voters living south of 75th st. are in precinct #2 and are to vote at Woodridge school. To be eligible to vote in this election it is necessary to be a U.S. citizen, 21 years or older and have lived in the state for one year, the county for 90 days, and the school district for 30 days and be a registered voter.

Four candidates filed petitions to run in this election. They are Robert Murphy, incumbent appointee, Emil Roman, incumbent appointee, Charles Smeeth, elected last April to fill an unexpired term and Robert Manges.

Both Manges and Murphy are residents of Woodridge. Smeeth lives on Donwood drv., Naperville and Roman is a resident of Woodridge Estates.

All four have been active in past Citizens Advisory Councils of district 68.

# Mother's Club **Bake Sale April 16**

Mothers Club is planning a bake sale on April 16 in the Woodridge School gym from 3:30 to 7 p.m. The school children will be bringing home a form letter on April 8, asking for bakery donations so be watching for it! This year we need your help! The more mothers who contribute, the more the school will profit. Anything you enjoy baking will be welcome - - pies, cakes, candy, brownies, bread, rolls, sweet rolls, coffee cakes, cookies and cupcakes. (Board of Health rules prohibit anything with cream or custard filling).

The merger of the two west suburban utility companies serving Woodridge and expansion of their facilities was announced today by officials of the 2 firms.

Effective immediately, Lisle Utility Company has been merged into Woodridge Sewer and Water Company, which will be the name of the surviving company, according to Wayne Bryant, operating superintendent.

The combined company will increase its sewage facilities by 150 percent, an expansion which includes construction of an addition to the existing modern sewage treatment plant and laying 2 miles of new interceptor line along Route 53.

When the expansion is completed, it will serve the expanded communities of Woodridge, totalling some 2,500 to 3,000 families and including Woodridge Homes and the new Winston Hills housing devel-

Bryant stated that the combined companies already are able to provide water to that number of families. He said they can pump 2,000 gallons of water per minute from the 3 wells which are 360 to 390 feet deep. This, plus 2 tanks providing water storage capacity of 650,000 gallons, assures the availability of adequate water at proper pressure for the entire community, and will assure a standard rate

Dear Editor:

Next to fund raising, the most important function of a school board is formulating written policies which effectively give a school program direction.

The present policies of High School District 99, on file in the Downers Grove public library, are obviously the result of many hours of work and deliberation on the part of the present and previous boards.

While a general review of all policy is needed periodically and may now be appropriate, I believe the policies which deal with school-community relations are especially in need of reconsideration at this time.

It might be well to rewrite such policies completely, keeping in mind that the schools are not privately endowed and that the Board of Education is charged by Illinois Statute with the responsibility for raising the revenue necessary to maintain the schools. In order to restore the financial health of the high school system, earn the continuing support of the taxpayers over the years, and in order to provide a high quality program which reflects the views of the community, I believe it is essential that the board exercise leadership in this area.

In this and previous letters, I have given my views on some important problems now facing the high school district. If elected to the District 99 School Board, I will make every effort to cooperate with the rest of the school board and with the superintendent in working toward solutions to these and other problems, and in providing the best educational program possible with the funds made available by the taxpayers.

for everyone.

Woodridge, which was cited in 1963 by the State of Illinois for the excellence of its facilities, is a relatively new company, with the entire plant less than 5 years old.

At present, however, the State Sanitary Water Board has designated that no final occupancy permits be issued to either Winston Muss Corp. for Winston Hills or Surety Builders for the Highlands. After the Commerce Commission approves the interceptor, permits will be issued, but a total of no more than 1000 homes shall be hooked on. This number can be increased as the Sanitary Board reviews the water company rating when expansion is completed.

According to Albert Kaufman, plans for expansion are in progress with actual construction to begin tentatively this summer. Kaufman also stated at a meeting of the Village Board that there will be no rate increase.

The Woodridge Village Board has not issued any building permits to the two builders for work in the areas not yet connected. The board affirmed that building permits will be withheld until final approval of the interceptor by the State Sanitary Water Board has been obtained.



a free chest X-ray which is made possible by Christmas Seals. Cooperation of the board of education has also made possible this visit of the mobile unit. Last year, over 55,000 free chest X-rays were provided throughout DuPage County. Twenty-five new cases of active TB were discovered through the X-rays, and hundreds of other citizens were referred to their family doctors because of X-ray shadows that suggested such conditions as abnormal heart enlargements, tumors and emphysema.

Mrs. Kenneth Krask, 1 Willow Court, is serving as X-ray chairman for the Woman's Club. "We have learned from tuberculosis authorities that children are best protected from contagious TB, by making sure that all adults have healthy lungs," Mrs. Krask said. "Therefore, we urge all adult residents to take advantage of the mobile unit while it is here on Apr. 10."

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
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# Hot Dog Day Set For April 15

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
