

2nd Vaccine Dose To Be Given May 17

The second dose of Trivalent oral polio vaccine on Sabin Oral Sundays will be administered May 17 at St. Scholastica School between the hours of 1:00 and 5 p.m., with the cooperation of the Woodridge Inter-fraternal Council.

All those persons who participated on the first date are urged to receive their second dose to provide the best possible immunity from all types of polio.

In the event that you did not receive the first "drink" of vaccine, it is possible to take the vaccine on May 17 and then go to your family physician 8 weeks later for the 2nd dose.

Pre-registration forms will again be distributed for your convenience in going quickly through the vaccine center, although it is possible to complete a registration form on that date.

More About Your Tax

Because Woodridge boundaries were formed after many different taxing bodies had formed their boundary lines, the Woodridge area already has six different tax rates with the potential for many more.

For example, some lots in Woodridge units 1, 2, and 3 are in Edward hospital district; other lots in those same units

The tax rate for those who live in Woodridge unit I and 2 who are not in the village have the tax rate of 3.887 for 1963 payable in 1964.

The following rates are for villagers with variances as to school districts, fire

#1, code 807 school districts 68 (Goodrich-Woodridge) and 99 (Downers Grove High), Lisle Fire Protection District and Non C-Bonds - rate is 4.035.

#2, code 845, school districts 68 and 99 and Lisle Fire Protection district rate is 4.029.

#3, code 849, school districts 68 and

#4, code 850, school districts 68 and 107 (Lisle High), Lisle Fire Protection district and Edward hospital - rate is 4.182.


#5, code 851, school districts 68 and 99, Lisle Fire Protection and Edward hospital - rate is 4.153.

The rate for the village corporate tax is .266 for 1963. This is the maximum presently allowable. The rate for 1961 was .087; the rate for 1962 was .191.

In the April 30 issue of the WNR the 1963 rate for the village was given as \$27.30 on \$10,000 assessed valuation

All six tax groups in the Woodridge area include taxes for the following: the county, county retirement, civil defense, county highway, county health department, maps and plats, T.B. Sanitarium, federal matching tax, forest preserve, Lisle township, county bridge tax, road and bridge tax, township poor relief, special hard road tax. The totals for these are included in the preceding figures.


Also, Mary Jane Clark and Tom Roberts are to attend the Honors English Class at the High School.

Are you tired of your children coming home with muddy shoes, pants, jackets etc.? Half of you may solve your problems by telling your children not to play in "Crabtree

As you may know, many of our lots in Woodridge have easements. Our lot happens to have a 20 foot easement at the rear of the lot, which unfortunately happens to be "Crabtree Creek". "We", as many of our nieghbors have tried our best to improve (if possible) this area. But how can we keep your children from playing, tramping and throwing debris in the "Creek". We get tired of children giving us smart and sassy answers when we tell them this is part of our property and no playground. We are held responsible if your child is hurt here. I've pulled several children from this creek, as have others along Crabtree Avenue. I've talked to Chief Kagann, Mr. Vrany, school principal and discussed this problem several times at village board meetings with "No Avail." Plan Enrollment For Summer School

The Downers Grove Elementary District's Summer School will be in session from Monday, June 15, through Friday, July 17, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. daily at the Whittier Elementary School, located at Hill and Grand Streets.

All instruction will be highly individualized in small classes. A balanced program, including most subjects, will be used but different emphasis can be given for individual children. The major purpose of the summer school is to provide experiences of an enriching and broadening nature rather than of a remedial nature.

While the summer school activity may be helpful to some children with weaknesses in some skill areas, parents and teachers are cautioned not to have unreasonable hopes or expectancies for dramatic improvement on the part of these children. A thorough study of past summer school results does not justify such hopes.

The tuition is \$27.50. If you are interested in your child's attending summer school, please fill our the form below and return it by Tuesday, May 12, to the principal of your elementary school with a check for \$13.75 payable to the Board of Education, District 58. The remaining \$13.75 is due on June 15th, the first day of summer school.





Elections will be held for next year's officers.

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

The Garden Art Hacker

This time of year is a very active time for the root systems of your ornamentals such as evergreens, shade trees and shrubs. A good fertilizer such as 5-10-5 for trees shrubs and roses and 10-6-4 for evergreens and lawns should be considered.

Most feeder roots are located at the extremity of the branches. This is called the "Drip". This applies whether we are speaking of evergreens or what. This is where you should feed if possible.

In the case of shade trees, use 1-1/2to 2 lbs. of 5-10-5 fertilizer per inch of trunk diameter. Holes should be drilled one ft. deep in a circle around the tree at the drip, and fertilizer poured down these holes. Then the plug of soil should be replaced. A better system is to use the. Ross root feeder which uses your hose water pressure to dissolve the fertilizer cartridge and force the fertilizer to the roots. You never have a case of root burn with this method and it is a dandy way to just water plants. 2 or 3 families could own a feeder together and they will be rewarded with finer living things as a result. Like I say, "Its the greatest thing since sliced bread! The cartridges are cheap and very effective.

In the case of evergreens, the feeding at drip is easy. The grass is usually not there and thus you have no grass burn. The dry fertilizer can be placed in a ring

around the plant at the "drip" again and slight cultivation should be practiced.

Cultivation promotes growth. In fact, in the nursery, we have to be careful not to cultivate weeds too late in the year. It is very easy to cultivate too deeply thereby stimulating late growth which most surely will cause winter damage. I have never seen a well cultivated house planting that didn't look like a million dollars. Ornamental cultivation should consist of working the soil well to a depth of about 1 or 2 inches. Preferably the soil should be worked up just after fertilization. The best tool for this is a small three pronged tool with about a four and a half foot handle upon it. These prongs do not cut and damage roots and are very easy to operate as they offer little resistance to the ground. They sell for approximately \$3.25

Give your lilacs about a quarter cup of lawn lime now. They are one of the very few plants that need a little additional lime for good blooming. Do not lime that lagging magnolia. In fact, the magnolias would appreciate about the same amount of sulphur or iron sulphate.

Check with the Morton Arboretum for blooming times for Red Bud and Crabapples and don't miss a visit to see them there.

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
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
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
