## Money Allocated For Road Repairs

In response to a request from Commissioner of Public Works, Jack Trask, the village board voted May 7 to spend up to \$200 for asphalt to repair village streets in units 1 and 2. The decision was reached after Trustee David Callahan, chairman of the public protection committee, reported that his committee considered it a waste of money to continue filling the chuck holes with gravel and recommended the more permanent asphalt repair work.

Because the streets in units 3 and 4 have not yet been accepted by the village, responsibility for their maintenance still lies with the developer.

Earlier in the meeting Callahan presented a letter from Winston-Muss offering the village rental of a barn on Hobson rd. for storage of public works vehicles. The barn was offered for \$1 per month rent on a month-to-month basis with a 2-week cancellation clause.

Callahan recommended that the board accept this offer because, he claimed, the lease covering the Crabtree ave. barn is illegal and leaves the trustees individually liable in the event of fire or accident. Mayor Roberts objected to the

W-M offer because of the 2-week cancellation clause, to which Callahan replied that he would rather see the village equipment stored in a field than remain in the present barn. The matter was then deferred subject to further negotiations.

## Lutherans Hire Architect

At a special congregational meeting of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Woodridge, on May 4 the architectural firm of Keys and Hestrup, Oak Brook, Illinois, was selected to work with the Church in designing and supervising construction of the first unit of the Church building. The new home for the Prince of Peace congregation will be located on the north side of 75th street, 1/2 mile east of route 53. At present worship services and Sunday Church School are being conducted at the Woodridge School, Larchwood lane and Crabtree avenue, two blocks south of the Church site. The Church parsonage is at 2735 75th street, Woodridge.

Prince of Peace was organized in January, 1962. It is a member congregation of the Lutheran Church in America which came into being in January, 1963, with the merger of four Church bodies: the American Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Augustana Evangelical Lutheran Church the Suomi Lutheran Church, and the United Lutheran Church in America. It is through the support and efforts of the people of the Lisle-Woodridge community and the Board of American Missions of the Lutheran Church in America that Prince of Peace serves this area and now enters into the first phase of erecting a Church building.

Mr. Delmer Lundstrom will be the delegate from Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Woodridge, to the Second Annual Convention of the Illinois Synod of the Lutheran Church in America at the Orington Hotel, Evanston, Illinois, May 18-21. One of the important issues of this convention, according to Dr. Robert J. Marshall, President of the Illinois Synod, will be the method of selecting lay-delegates and pastors from the Synod to the national biennial conventions of the Lutheran Church in America.

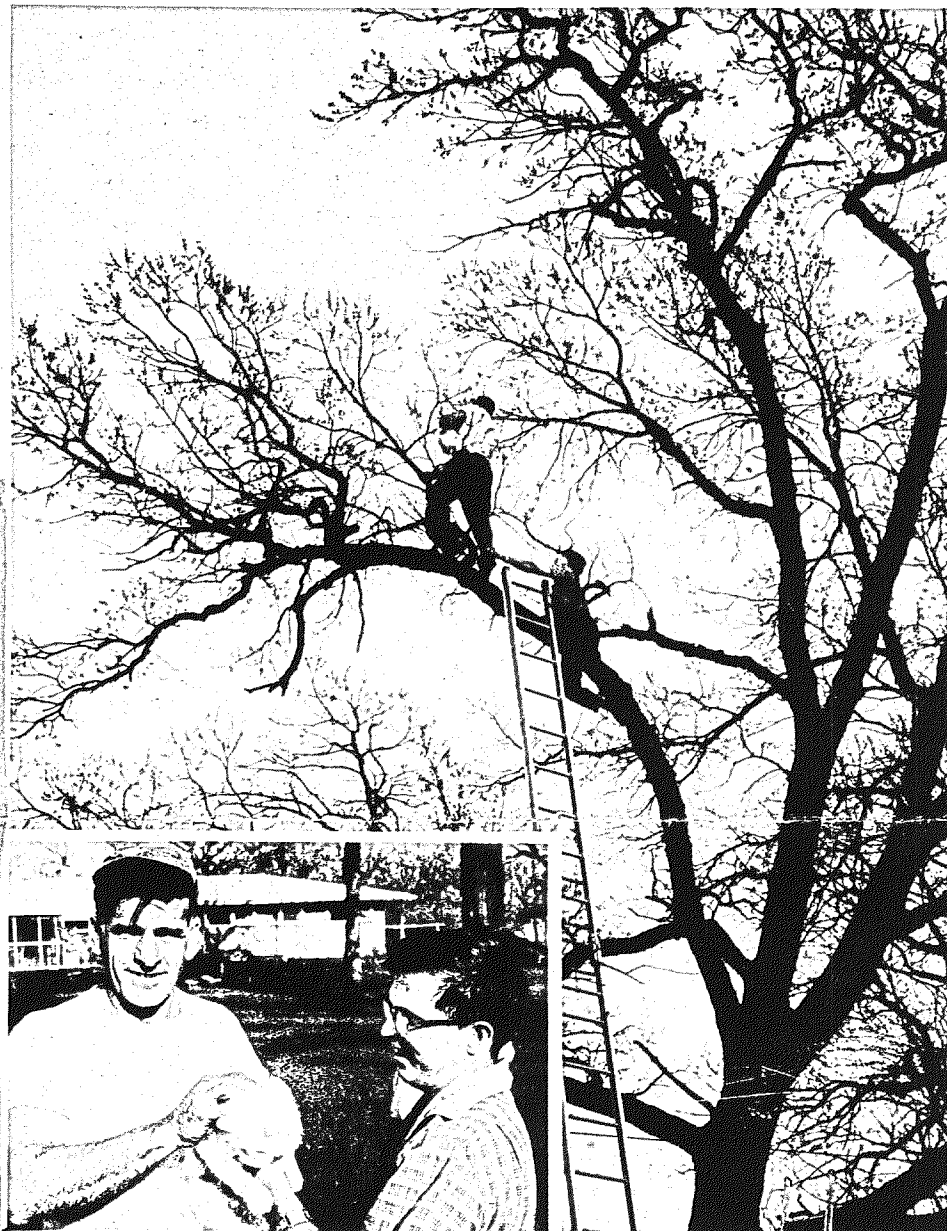

### Chromatograms Clinch Second

Second place in his division was awarded to George Balogh of the Woodridge Science Club for an exhibit at the Illinois Institute of Technology. His exhibit was in micro-thin layer chromatography, which is the science of colors.

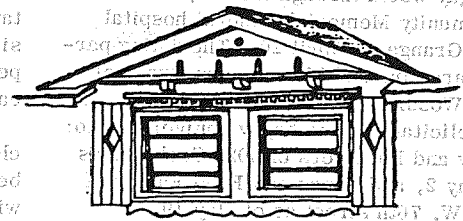

## Police Exhibit Saturday

On Saturday May 16, from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. at the Oak Brook Shopping Center, the West Suburban And DuPage County Chiefs of Police will be having a Police Exhibit which is open to the public. The exhibit will be held on the Mall in the Center.

This show will be the combined efforts of over 40 police agencies throughout Cook and DuPage Counties and is in connection with National Police Week May 10 to 16.

Some of the exhibits that will be displayed are: Canine corps, confiscated burglar tools and gambling equipment, scuba diving equipment, portable lie detectors, illegal firearms and about 25 police cars and motorcycles fully equipped with emergency equipment. For the adults we will have the Secretary of State's mobile license trailer, where the public can renew their driver's license. The U. S. Coast Guard will have information available on water safety as well as other federal agencies such as the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Border Patrol Treasury Department and others. The Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Unit will have a confiscated still.

The Woodridge Police Department will be represented at the show with a working Police Base Station Radio.

Chief Jeol Kagann extends an invitation to all of the residents in Woodridge to attend this show.

## "Your Chief Says"

The danger to children riding an unlighted bicycle at night cannot be over-emphasized.

"If your child must ride a bike at night, make sure it is properly lighted and equipped with reflectorized tape. Remind your child of this Cardinal Rule of safety -- drive a lighted bike.

A new Illinois law requires that all bicycles ridden on a street or highway during the period from sunset to sunrise must be equipped with a lighted headlight and taillight.

According to the law, the headlight must be visible for a distance of 500 feet and the color must be white, yellow or amber. The bike's taillight must be red and must also be visible for a distance of 500 feet.

"It is up to parents to inform their children of the new law and make sure they conform to it for their own protection," Kagann said. Bicycles should also be equipped with reflectorized tape placed on the handle bars, front fork and rear fenders to make it easier for car and other vehicle drivers to see the bike at night. Kagann said the forthcoming "Bicycle Road-e-o" inspection should include emphasis on the fact that bicycles being ridden at night and their riders must be seen to be safe.

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**The Garden Spot**



This might well be called "This was the week that was". Those three unseasonably warm days in March burst the buds on all our deciduous plants and nothing could keep them from running away with themselves.

I never saw so many different kinds of blooming fruit trees and crabapples bloom in such a short time. Normally, there are about two weeks between the blooming times for the long list of crabapples and this year there were about four days.

Remember to use some orchard spray on those fruit trees just after the blossoms start to fall.

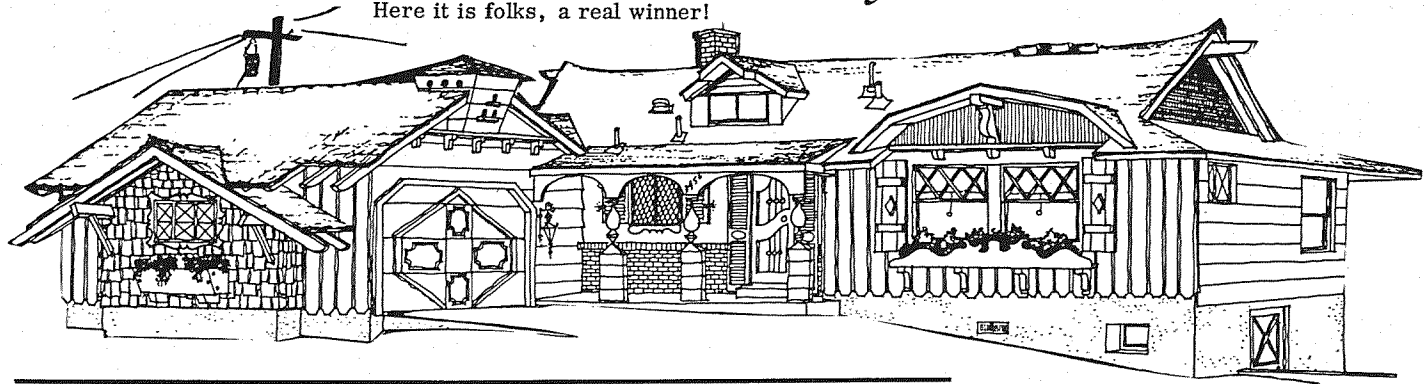
Speaking of fruit trees, I shall answer a question that we get about a hundred times a year. No, you do not need two of any particular kind of fruit tree to get fruit. I realize it is more romantic that way but they are self pollinating. Now, I will admit that you get better pollination with more than one fruit tree of a kind but who needs thirteen bushels of what?

The time to prune evergreens is when the pruners are sharp. The only time you cannot or should not prune is when the foliage is frozen. Pruning at this time sometimes causes the ends of the branches to shatter and split. Remember, when those pftizers begin to look so good with long tails on them, they are getting to the stage where they are going to get rank and will slowly become a living wood pile. When the individual branches are 18 to 24 inches long, they should be cut back four to eight inches so that the plant will make more branches. This "tightening up" of your evergreens is what keeps them from getting cone-shaped and going to pot. You can cut any evergreen back as long as there is green foliage on the stem when you are done. In other words, leave some green on the stem or it cannot carry on transpiration to make food, etc.

If you have a lawn that "fades out" in hot weather, just for fun, put one bag of dried cattle manure on a 100 square feet of lawn and then fertilize normally. You

will be amazed what this low value fertilizer (1-2-1) will do for your lawn. This humus-type of fertilizer does wonders to the lawn, and cuts down on the times the lawn needs fertilization.

Pretty soon, when those pine candles are about two inches, you should pinch them back to make a denser plant. No, like the one lady did with her mum plants, you don't "pinch" them with pliers. Just take the last one-fourth inch off the candles and this will make for more branches next year. Its a good time to watch those mum plants and when there is something to pinch, pinch. Just take your thumb and index finger and pick out that little kernel of plant bud. Every time you do this, you increase the number of flowers by three! You can continue this until the fourth of July.

I think a nice sensible thing for us fellers to have done for Mothers Day would have been to get the lawn mower sharpened.

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

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**Is Your Car Safe?**

After a crash, it is difficult to determine precisely whether the accident was caused by maintenance neglect. However, some studies indicate that nearly 1/4 of all accidents may be caused by defective equipment.

Up to 55% of the vehicles in some states are rejected because of unsafe conditions discovered during voluntary vehicle safety checks.

"Are you, the driver, certain that your car is safe to drive?" Kagann asked. "To be sure that a defect in your auto won't cause an accident, check your car to make sure that it is safe." Not only the older cars, but also new cars need periodic inspections for safety. Maladjustments appear in a new car that must be corrected for safe driving, he said.

If drivers do not have the facilities of a vehicle safety check lane, they should have these items checked at their garage or service station, including brakes, lights and turn signals, steering and wheel alignment, tires and wheels, exhaust system, windshield and other glass, windshield wipers and horn.

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
