WORK BEGINS ON SCHOOL ADDITION

Approval was given by the School Board of School District #68 on Thursday, July 9, to a contract with Fred L Ockerlund, Jr. and Associates for construction of building additions to both the Goodrich and the Woodridge

This approval followed a study made after bids were opened on Tune 25th. The low bid by the Ockerlund firm of Wheaton, Ill. still exceeded the money available, and the Board was forced to eliminate some of the work. The present contract for the Woodridge addition will provide four new classroom's with a shell only for the proposed library and special health rooms. At Goodrich School the addition of three completed classrooms, office space, toilets, and the expansion of the All-Purpose room to regulation size, and the shells or two more classrooms has been approved.


The contract amount for Woodridge School will be \$63,053, and that of Goodrich will be \$115,671 for a combined total of \$178.724. The construction costs will be paid by \$90,000 proceeds of bonds recently sold, \$12000 remaining from previous building fund proceeds, and \$75,000 cash contributed by Winston-Muss Corporation. Children from this new subdivision of Winston Hills will be served by Goodrich School, Several thousand dollars interest on funds invested will also be available. Additional funds to complete the work and finish the shell-enclosed rooms will become available early in

1965. Additional bonds can then be sold when additional bonding power becomes available. Voters approved a bond issue for \$165,000 last December, but bonding power of \$90,000 was all that was available due to reduced school district valuation after the quadrennial reassessment was completed this spring.

Work on excavation, pouring of concrete footings, and placing of foundation forms has started.

It is hoped that at least two rooms will be completed and ready for occupancy at the Woodridge School at the beginning of the fall team.

We have made many friends in the Village and met many of you through our former establishment, "Keetz Book Nook". We are looking forward to our rew business association with you.

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
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W.W.C. HOLDS ACE





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The New Bell Labs Center

The new Bell Telephone Labs center in the Naperville-Wheaton area ground breaking is still some time away. Temporarily Headquarters have been set up at the LaGrange District Sales Office under Mr. Kenneth Small.

Mr. Small gives slide talks about the new center to organizations and small groups interested in the Bell Labs' plans.

One of the most experienced research and development organizations in the world, Bell Telephone Laboratories has chosen 192 acres of scenic countryside between Naperville and Wheaton for their building.

What will it mean to this area?

The Illinois State Chamber of Commerce estimates that the population will increase by 4,308 and 1,092 additional school children. A \$2.7 million rise in bank deposits, 1,164 more cars, 36 more retail establishments, almost \$4 million more in annual retail sales and the creation of 780 jobs outside the center.

Bell Labs will have about 1,200 people-engineers, scientists, technicians and supporting staff. Western Electric will have about 300 people there also.

No manufacturing will be done at the center. It will be the home for the Bell Labs' Electronic Switching Division now located at Holmdel, N.J. Personnel will specialize in development of electronic switching systems (ESS) based on solid-state devices like the transistor.

The cost of the building is estimated at between 7 and 9 millon dollars. Construction is tentatively scheduled to start early next year with completion in 1966.

How Scatterbrained Are You?

I HERE is still a good deal of pro and con about modern psychology, but it has one lively advantage over other sciences; psychologists are always coming up with new tests that can be fascinating when used for self-analysis.

One of the most ingenious we've run across in some time is the Proverbs Test, developed by Professor Donald R. Gorham of Baylor. University. In serious application it measures emotional attitudes and vocational aptitudes and is a key to personality traits.

Here are the rules: Read each of the ten proverbs below and check off the interpretation that seems to you the most logical. Keep in mind that this is not a test in which you are necessarily right or wrong. It is more a matter of what the proverbs mean to you.

- 1. A tree is known by the fruit it bears.
 - (a) Only a fool would look for apples in a pear
 - (b) Proving that as the twig is bent, the tree will lean.
 - (c) A man is known by his deeds.(d) Evil can never be disguised.
- 2. Don't cross bridges till you get to them.
 - (w) In other words, don't burn your bridges ahead
 - Heaven helps a man who has faith in the future.


- (y) Do today's job right; don't keep fussing about tomorrow's



What Your Answers Tell About You

The most logical interpretations of the foregoing proverbs are the "c" and "z" choices. If you scored seven out of ten, you are normal in your perception, in your ability to interpret subleties of speech and thought. If you scored eight out of ten, you are sharper in comprehension than most. Nine out of ten indicates that you are exceptionally well-rounded as far as grasp of ideas is concerned. Ten out of ten? You're a philosopher!

Answers "a" and "y" are apt to appeal to the practical-minded person. If you checked one "a" or "y" answer, it is a hint that you have a practical streak in your nature. Two such answers indicate a rather distinctly practical nature, and three would suggest that practicality is your outstanding characteristic. Anything more than three would be a signal to take stock of yourself, for it would seem that you carry practical-mindedness to an extreme that could mar your enjoyment of life.

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Answers "b" and "w" are scatterbrain choices. They appeal to the person who, delightful as he or she may be, cannot or will not concentrate, or check his thinking for accuracy. If you picked one "b" or "w" it cannot mean much, but if you picked two it hints at least that you have a frivolous streak. Three or more "b" or "w" answers would be a real indication of scatterbrainedness.

"Answers "d" and "x" are the choices of a deeply moral person. This is the man or woman whose thinking and conversation are dominated by concepts of good and evil. He is very likely to judge other people on the terms of his own rigid moral principles. On the Proverbs Test, he can easily be attracted to an inaccurate answer merely because it seems like such a noble sentiment. If you picked one "d" or "x" answer you are probably to be congratulated for having a sound moral streak in your character. But if you picked two or more, you may be a little more righteous than necessary.
