Kaufman Charges Trustees Answer

At the October 1st Board Meeting Albert Kaufman accused the C.A.P. Trustees of being hostile, uncooperative and antagonistic toward Surety Development Corporation. He cited instances where he felt action on rezoning was deferred until he met certain demands made by the Board. In a recent interview Messrs. Redmond, Callahan and Hansen, the only members of the Citizens Action Party now serving on the Board attempted to give their explanation of the events which led up to these charges.

Kaufman stated that in order to get business zoning on the North side of 75th the Board wanted him to pave Janes Road on the South side of 75th.

According to the three Trustees there were no records on file to support any B-3 (business) zoning, which Kaufman claimed to have North of 75th. "This problem arose at the annual time for publishing the Village Zoning Map. Two conflicting maps were available and the published map containing President Roberts' signature and certification by Chairman of the Zoning Committee, Joseph K. McGrath, showed no B-3 zoning North of 75th. The Plan Committee, directed by the Board, held a public hearing. The results of this showed no official B-3 zoning North of 75th and advised seeking a legal opinion as to whether a definite answer could be found. business zoning to that which he still maintained he had on the North side of 75th, and also requested R-3 (apartments). The Board was agreeable to this, however, since residents from Units #4 and #5 would use Janes Road to get to the shopping center this increased traffic would necessitate paving and it was felt it was directly related to this zoning. Kaufman disagreed and made no mention of the fact that paving of that portion was included in the lease agreements on the south-west corner. When the Board learned of this agreement they were willing to grant the requested zoning..."

Mr. Kaufman stated that he spent 19 months trying to get the plat for Unit #5 approved. He mentioned that the State says a plat must be either passed or rejected within 60 days.

The C.A.P. Trustees on this matter state, "This plat was submitted to the Plan Commission on May 14th, this was received minus the filing fee so in actuality the Plan Commission did not have to proceed with work on the plat until June 18th, when the filing fee was submitted. Early in August land had to be annexed to the Village and this land formed a section of Unit #5, after that the plat had to be revised to conform to the Village Subdivision Control Ordinance. On August 20, 1964 the Plan Commission received the final plat for Unit #5, and on the 28th a special board meeting was held and on Oct. l the plat for Unit #5 was signed and sealed." From the time of receiving the final plat until it's passage was within the 60 day limit.

Another milestone was reached in the history of the Village Baptist Church last Sunday when they worshiped in their new building for the first time.

In October, 1959 six Wood-ridge families decided Wood-ridge could, and would, have a church right away. The families were the Wallace Akers', the Ralph Demmen's, the Al Lee's the Gerald Phillips' the Douglas Weikel's, and the Warvin Wiggins'. The name of the church would be "The Village Baptist Church of Wood-ridge."

On November 15th, 1959 the "dream" came true and the first service was held in what was known as the First Grade School House, located at the corner of Woodview and Westridge. All Sunday morning services were held there, (the mid-week and other services were held in members' homes) until the school board turned the building back to the builder at the end of June, 1960.

By that time all papers had been signed and they moved into the first church-owned property in Woodridge, at 7654 Wood-

view Drive. This was a house and required some remodeling to make it into a "church". While this was being done services were held in the living Soon the basement sanctuary was completed and in use. But all this time the congregation was growing and there was need for expansion. The pre-school Sunday School moved to the basement of the Ralph Demmin's at 3022 Crabtree. While this was workable, it was not the best situation. A new church building was no longer a desire, it had become a necessity.

Under the direction of Pastor Donald Roop this new building has become a reality and the Village Baptist Church now meets in a real church, at 2050 75th Street.

Once again Woodridge has made the headlines in a neighboring newspaper and the 'image' inferred by this certainly doesn't help. This latest hassel concerns road acceptance and bonds on these roads. In examining all the points leading up to this scrimmage, I must admit, IT COULD HAVE BEEN AVOIDED.

At the Oct. 1st Board Meeting Mr. Kaufman showed the Board plats covering Units #3 and #4, which were accepted by the Village in 1959 and 1961. The Village Attorney Tames Mc Clure said, "acceptance of the final plat does not mean acceptance of streets." I do not believe this is the point that Kaufman wished to make. The point was that these plats were accepted prior to the passage of the Village Subdivision Control Ordinance. Upon passage of our ordinance the Board should have asked for a signed statement from Kaufman saying that he would follow our code on all streets not at that moment completed; by not doing this Kaufman could, by rights, follow the County Code, under which he had started those streets. If this explanation proves confusing, let's say in comparison that tomorrow the Village passes a law stating no blue houses will be allowed in the Village. You may have already started to repaint your house---blue. You do not have to go out and buy new paint as you had started before the law was in effect.

So the County Code, at that time, was legally followed. This code calls for a two year

performance bond on roads. The Mayor has asked why the Board brought this matter up three years after completion of roads in Unit #3, and one year after completion in Unit #4. After reviewing this it seems the Board was not aware that completion meant also the acceptance of the streets.

Trustee Renaud brought up the roads because the Board wanted to determine whose responsibility the repair was. When this was first brought up, the Board was questioning an acceptance letter written by the Mayor attesting to the fact that John Trask, Commissioner of Public Works, has inspected the streets and that they "were accepted without reservation." What the Trustees couldn't understand was why the acceptance letter was written just




three months after the Unit #4 streets were completed and why the letter was not written by the Village Clerk.

At this point we have an angry Mayor, as he feels "his and the Public Works Commissioner's integrity" is being doubted. Then we have angry Trustees, as they feel something is out of whack. The "first clue they had had on any acceptance letter was that letter sent by Kaufman" to support his statement that he "had no more responsibility" for those streets. And, as if this were not enough, we also have an angry developer who feels he is being put upon by the Board.

All three factors, if considered individually, give solid reasons to be angry. BUT, if they had all gotten together and in a friendly fashion discussed their doubts and problems, this matter could have been resolved in an expedient manner. No one did this and thus the blame for the outburst at a public meeting must fall equally on all of them.

The streets in Unit #3 had an almost parallel problem. An acceptance letter was not, say the Trustees, "on file in the Clerk's office." Trask, when questioned, said there probably a moral obligation to accept these roads, yet at a later date Trask presented to one of the Trustees an "original copy" of the missing acceptance letter. Mayor Roberts said these letters were on file; the Trustees couldn't find them. Now what I'd like to question is the filing system or perhaps, somehow, they were misfiled? At the same time let us all remember that no matter which code had been followed on the streets in Unit #3, the performance CONTINUED ON PAGE 10



Prince of Peace Approves Building

At a special congregational meeting Sunday, October 4th, the members of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Woodridge, approved the floor plan and design of the Ultimate Building Plot Plan Study drawn by the architectural firm of Keys and Hestrup, Oak Brook. By taking this action the congregation took a long stride toward the building of its first unit to be constructed on a site in the 2600 block of 75th Street, Woodridge. Prior to this meeting the Building Study had been approbed by the Board of American Missions of the Lutheran Church in America and the Com-

Though the study dealt with the entire building as it will some day appear in its final form, Prince of Peace will only build the first unit; the parish hall which will house the Sanctuary temporarily, and a portion of the Sunday Church School Wing. Interior walls for three class rooms will not be built in another portion of the building in order to provide more space for a temporary fellowship hall.

ler, Mr. Donald Russell, Mr. Roger Thoren, and Mr. Fred Vallarta.

Prince of Peace presently worships in the Woodridge School on Larchwood Lane and Crabtree Avenue. Sunday worship is at 9:30 a.m. and the Sunday Church School meets at 10:45 a.m. The Lutheran Parsonage is located at 2735 75th Street.

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

WOODRIDGE POLICE REPORT SEPTEMBER

The Woodridge Police Department activity report for the month of September shows 3 auto accidents and a total of 94 station complaints answered, including 7 fire calls, 6 stray dogs, 3 lost children, 4 malicious mischief and 40 miscellaneous calls. Woodridge Police made 16 arrests, and issued 22 traffic tickets, 8 nontraffic, 7 parking and 20 warning tickets. The three squad cars traveled a total of 5,531 miles, while the officers worked a total of 472 1/2 hours. 37 cases were disposed of in Circuit Court with a total of \$464.75 in fines and costs levied, \$29 was collected in the Traffic Violations Bureau and 20 bicycle licenses were sold.

Garden Editor's Notebook

YOUR HOUSE PLANTS

Did you have your houseplants outside for the Summer? That is a good idea for most plants, but now is the time to bring them indoors again. But before you bring them into the house there are certain things you should do to safeguard against later disappointments.

All the plants should be sprayed to make sure you don't bring a variety of garden pests into the house with the plants.

You should inspect the rootsystem, which is easily done. Spread out your one hand over the top of the soil, turn the pot upside down and tap the edge of the pot against a piece of The ball should then wood. come out. Remove any earthworms which may have entered during the Summer and observe if the plant needs a larger pot or some fresh dirt. Bear in mind, that ordinarily the Spring is the better time for repotting. If the plant is expected to bloom during the Winter, repotting to a larger pot now may greatly reduce the amount of flowers it will get. Check the drainage. It is a good idea to scrub and rinse well all old pots before they are re-used to get rid of all the salt which has accumulated on the sides.

Some of the plants are now ready to go into the living-room, but some are better served by giving them a rest period, in a cool place, without watering, for a month or two before they are brought back in the warm room and watered again. The Christmas Cactus is one of the plants which need this rest period for a good blooming later.

And about watering: Don't use chemically softened water for your plants. It will kill them. Soft water is fine if it is rainwater or groundwater, but not if it comes from the watersoftener. Use the hard water as it comes out of the well.

To get good healthy plants fertilize them regularly, about every two weeks, with a liquid fertilizer. We find it convenient to dilute the fertilizer in a quart bottle to 8 times as strong as recommended by the

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manufacturer and then when it is time to fertilize we just use 4 oz. of this solution to one watering-can of water. Our can just holds 1 qt. of water, and the bottle cap on the solution holds 2 oz., so we use 2 capsfull of the solution per watering-can. Of course with a different size watering can and a different size bottle cap your proportions must be refigured. It is important, that the recommended strength is obtain-Too much fertilizer will hurt the plants as much, or more than, no fertilizer at all.

Space does not permit us to go into each plant's specific requirement, but you can obtain a very informative pamphlet from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Govt. Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C. Ask for Home & Garden Bulletin No. 82, "Selecting and Growing House Plants", and enclose a check for 15¢.
