

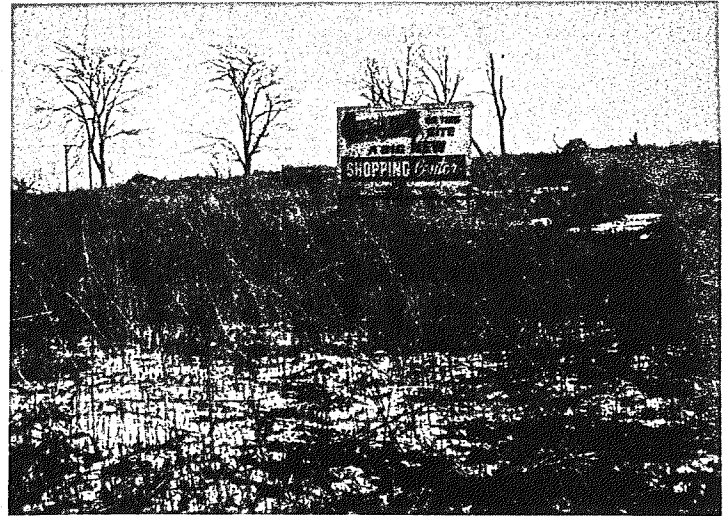

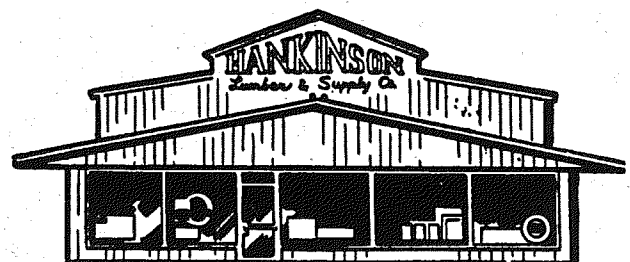

Darkness doubles traffic troubles, according to Chief Joel A. Kagann, who urged extra care and doubled caution during twilight and night hours.

"It is a time when we rely on the lights of our car to call attention to our presence on the highway and to light our way," he commented.

When something happens to any of the lights on your car, light out for the nearest garage or service station for immediate repair. Malfunction of any of the six important lights on your car can lead to a serious accident."

Chief Kagann advises every night driver to check his car before driving it after dark. The check should include the headlights, tail-lights and turn signals, front and back. Kagann said that unwary motorists might perhaps fail to realize the loss of a headlight and attribute the resulting visual loss to the normal night-time deficiency of light.

"But," he added, "oncoming drivers, especially on the highway, cannot judge the car's width or even tell what lane it is in, if it has only one headlight. It has happened to everyone. A car approaches quickly and until the last second seems to be in your lane since you are unable to tell, due to the ab-

sence of a headlight. The same is true of tail-lights.

"And above all," Chief Kagann adds, "use your lights at twilight. Accidents have often occurred when an oncoming driver thought from the size and apparent distance of the lights that he had plenty of time to pass. The resulting sickening crash proved him wrong. He realized too late that the car in the other lane had its parking lights on, not the regular headlights. Illinois law prohibits the use of parking lights for use as running lights at night.

"Lights of an approaching car can create a blinding glare on a dirty windshield", reminded Chief Kagann. "For safer driving, dim lights for other cars and keep your windshield clean."

The Police Activity Report for the month of October shows a total of 116 station complaints answered, including 5 fire calls, 14 stray dogs and 5 lost children.

There were 4 auto accidents, with a total of 10 injured persons and 4 animal bites.

Eight parking tickets and 28 warning tickets were issued. Two traffic arrests were made.

The three squad cars travelled a total of 4,783 miles while the men worked 629 1/2 hours. The men's time is broken down as follows: Part time police, 182 hours; Reserve, 447 1/2 hours; Patrol, 453 1/2; Special duty, 176 hours.

24 cases were disposed of in Circuit Court, with a total of \$401 in fines and costs levied. \$22.00 was collected in the Traffic Violations Bureau and 6 bicycle licenses were sold.

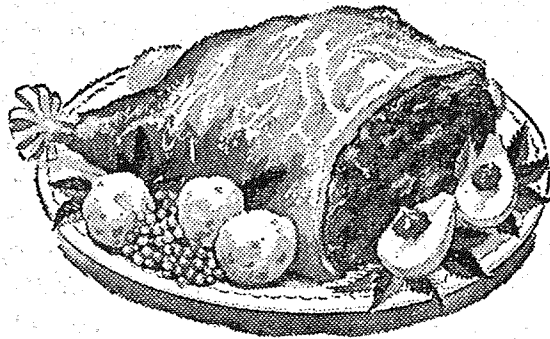

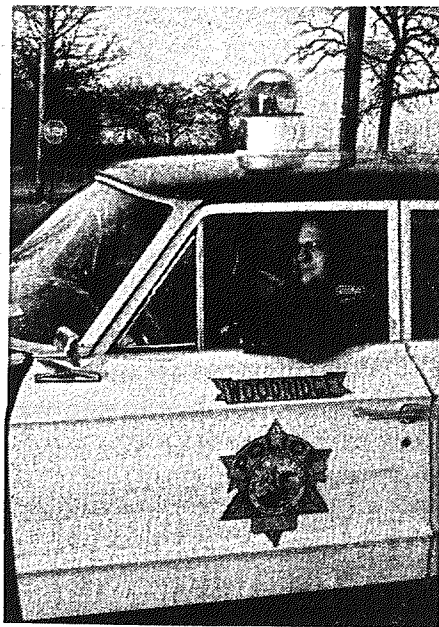
Part of the purpose of the Woodridge Woman's Club includes support of the General Federation of Women's Clubs projects, one of the most awe-inspiring of which is cooperation with the Freedoms Foundation Congressional Medal of Honor Grove at the American Freedom Center at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

The heroic deeds of liberty loving men who have manned the ramparts of freedom from Bunker Hill in 1775 to Viet Nam in 1964 are an inspiration to all Americans and it is to provide a memorial to those men who have conspicuously distinguished themselves by gallantry beyond the call of duty that the Freedoms Foundation is establishing the Congressional Medal of Honor Grove at the American Freedom Center.

52 acres, encompassing the streams and hills hallowed by the early patriots of the Revolutionary War have been set aside as a lasting memorial to the recipients of the nation's highest military award, the Congressional Medal of Honor. It is in this grove that a tree will be marked with the name of each of the some three thousand men who have received the award and a record of their heroic deeds will be housed in an appropriate building on the grounds. This grove will become a national shrine of patriotic significance to Americans and will record the history of every other military decoration as well.

Formal gardens dedicated to the heroes and miles of winding paths will add to the beauty and serenity of the area.

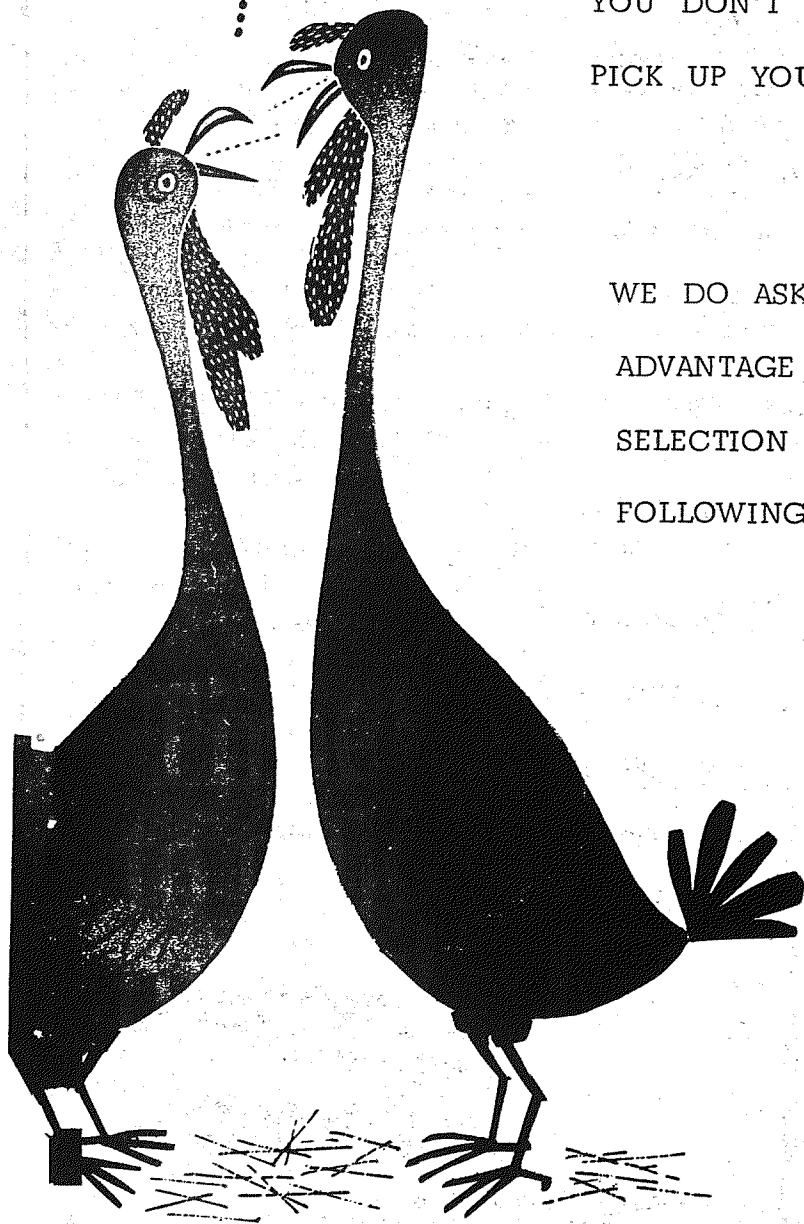

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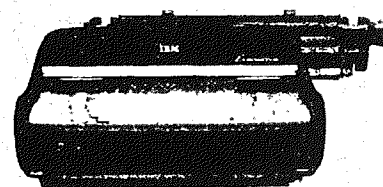
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Mothers Club
