

Dear Keetz:

I note in the Nov. 13 issue. removal of my name from the credits of the Woodridge News, as well it should have been, I guess, since I explained to you that under the new restrictions being imposed upon the "Point of View" column, I felt the writer could and would no longer be free to express her opinion on Woodridge events or related topics -- which was the basic premise of the column, together with the idea that the writers would ostensibly be reflecting the views of their respective political parties (i.e., the Citizens Action Party and the Woodridge Independent Party). However, as a result of our last phone conversation, I was under the impression that you would submit my last article (the third of three, which you refused to publish) to your attorney for an opinion, even though,

of course, there was absolutely nothing libelous about the content, but which was not printed because my interpretation of a certain event did not agree with yours. I fully expected to hear from you and have not as of this date.

Though you claim you have not edited the "Point of View" columns submitted to you, as a matter of fact, you exercised the ultimate in editorial privilege - that of not printing in entirety. I freely admit that the first of my unprinted columns was exceptionally controversial in nature and it was by mutual consent that it was not published; the second, you said. represented the second appearance in my column of a given "controversial" topic and you felt the newspaper would be treading on unsafe ground by publishing "a series of articles" of such a nature. Despite the fact that I had already spent 3 evenings writing that column, to say nothing of the hours spent in research, I did at the 11th hour write and submit to you a substitute column of a completely innocuous nature. 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
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Dedicate Baptist Church



That I am a person of strong opinions as concerns the Village of Woodridge and that I have not been apprehensive about expressing those opinions must, Iassume, have been known to you before you approached me to write the "Point of View" column. Yet now you say you feel you "made a mistake in allowing the writer(s) editorial privilege". Since the authors of the columns were expressing "their" opinions and you did, indeed, divoice yourself from those opinions with the printed statement reading, "The views expressed in the "Point of View" columns are those of the writers and not the Editor or Publisher," I maintaim that never were we given "editorial privilege".

Certain reports have come to you, you told me, that I have "an ax to grind"; that I "blindly" reflect the views of my party; that I wrote about past history in which no one was interested; all or any of which may or may not be true though I vehemently deny the filirst two charges -- (that the latter was important to the understanding of current Woodmidge events was, of course, my point of view.) My opinions: allso may have been completely erroneous, impractical, irrelevantiand any other undesirable adjective imaginable -- since no human being is infallible, there is nothing to say that I "had to be right" (though one can hope he is) -- nevertheless, I was expressing my opinion, no one else's, and that is what I was asked to do.

My goals, as they were a-

vowed in the third of my unprinted columns, are an informed public and good government, yet you said I could not use the column "to get any one out of office". I subsequently explained to you that I felt an "informed public" will almost necessarily take care of ousting any undesirable public officials.

I truly enjoyed writing the "Point of View" column—I felt it was an excellent service as well as a real opportunity for responsible expression—but when one is forced to remain innocuous and incontroversial when events in Woodridge are really basically important and controversial, then I believe there is no room for compromise and no point in writing a column that does not reflect these basics in its purpose.

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
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
