We see the crib against a different background this year. It stands out in stark contrast to the 37 people who saw a young lady stabbed three times during a 35-minute interval; to the fisherman who wouldn't let his rod be used to help a drowning man; to the passers-by who did nothing to assist a woman having a baby on the sidewalk; to the motorists who whizzed by a man with a slashed artery until he finally had to roll in the middle of the interstate highway. There are other cases. It was in the first tragedy that two of the onlookers said, "I didn't want to get involved."

Is this inhumanity typical of our country, of ourselves? Only we can supply the answer. True that it is sometimes inadvisable for a person to get involved; true also that there are many bright spots of sacrificial involvement.

When God became man, He knew that He was getting involved. He knew beforehand that His human body would ache and be bruised and be nailed to a cross. He knew that His spirit would be tortured by man's unbelievable hardheartedness and ingratitude. He knew that the cost of involvement with human beings was sacrifice even unto death.

Christmas, the "Feast of Involvement," should make us pause for self-scrutiny. Are we willing to speak up when no one else seems to want to defend the truth? When a friend is in distress, do we make sure that we stay clear? Would we accept jury duty, or an office in our union or some other organization, or do we shy away so we won't become involved? Do we keep out of our lives the poor, those discriminated against, the mentally ill, because helping them would mean a sacrifice? Do we whisk by an acquaintance in serious need of consolation or encouragement because we are in a hurry? Is our charity the kind described by the Irish poet, "Organized charity, scrimped and iced, In the name of a cautious, statistical Christ"?

We have to decide which character we'll play in Christ's parable. Two saw the man lying in the ditch and passed by. The third, from Samaria, got involved.

Christ got awfully involved that first Christmas, so involved that He identified Himself with the poor, the needy, the unfortunate, the sick, the distressed. The crib is no place to say I'm not my brother's keeper.

"Your Chief Says"

"Keep your windshield clear and see what you're missing!" With this admonition Chief Joel A. Kagann of the Woodridge Police Department urged village drivers to take that extra few minutes to make certain that a clean windshield and properly performing wipers were among the assists smart drivers add to their winter emergency equipment.

"Good wipers combined with a properly operating defroster clearing the inside make the difference between seeing safely and driving right along or a hazardous stop in traffic to clear the glass," he added.

Sometimes we don't see the things in front of our eyes. Chief Kagann commented. Too many drivers feel that if the wiper arms move across the glass that's enough to guarantee performance. However, research from national safety organizations point up the fact that wiper blades become lifeless after exposure to sun and weather conditions.

"You aren't safe if you can't see," Chief Kagann cautioned. "Windshield wipers must be in top condition. Check their condition frequently and also the wiper arm. Rubber blades aged by summer sun or winter weather often streak the windshield, and even if new blades have been installed, low arm pressure may cause skips and vision blurs, particularly on large contour glass. Firm pressure from the wiper arm on the blade is needed to insure clear vision, especially during snow or sleet condition. An ounce of arm pressure for each inch of blade is recommended.

As an added safety precaution, Chief Kagann urged drivers to always carry a pair of reinforced tire chains in the trunk to back up ability to go. "It's good insurance," he concluded.

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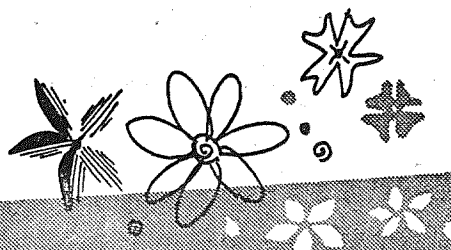
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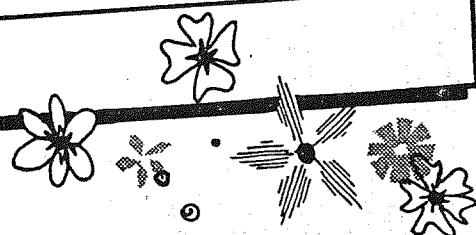




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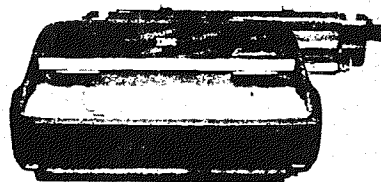

In February the Woodridge Mothers Club will celebrate its third anniversary. This will be the first of three articles, each giving a resume of the three progressive years the club has had.

First, what is Mothers Club and what is their purpose? The purpose of the Mothers Club as two-fold (1) to raise money for necessary school equipment and (2) to provide monthly meetings which will feature a talk or report on a subject of special interest to Woodridge Mothers, followed by a social hour with coffee and refreshments. This club is open to all Woodridge Mothers, whether or not they have children in school. The co-operation of EVERY mother is needed if we are to succeed in our plans to help our school.

The Mothers Club was newly-formed on February 27, 1961, at which time the first meeting was held in the Woodridge School. The club's founder was Mrs. Barbara Bonk. The following slate of temporary officers were elected; Mrs. Barbara Bonk, President; Mrs. Joanne Burns, Vice-President; Mrs. Dorothy Provo, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Marie DiFrancisco, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Frances Clark, Treasurer.

At the May 16, 1961 regular meeting a new slate of officers for the 1961-62 school year were elected. Mrs. Barbara Bonk, President; Mrs. Marge Groth, Vice-President; Mrs. Ruth Vondrasek, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Genevieve Gray, Recording Secretary; and Mrs. Helga Scudder, Treasurer.

During the first year the club donated a movie projector and screen, A sofa, 2 pillows and 1 blanket to help furnish the teachers room. A sink and cabinets for the kitchen and a mimeograph machine for the use of the Mothers Club.

The money used to purchase the above mentioned items were raised through special projects. These projects were bake sales, hot dog lunches at the school for the children, a booth at the 4th of July picnic and the sale of the Mothers Club cookbook.



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Woodridge - Goodrich Kindergarten Census

With the launching of the Soviet "Sputnik" in 1956, the United States has been undergoing a sweeping educational revolution. Many of the academic studies of our children are accelerated and technical. The success with which our children master these studies is wholly dependent on the so-called educational ladder. Each step upward is dependent on the preceding step. The first step, and a most important one, is that of Kindergarten or pre-first grade. Why is this first step so important? Because it is here that the child begins to prepare and adjust himself to the school situation. The earlier that a child begins the preparation, adjustment, and education, the more solid the base of educational foundation for his future studies. This is substantiated by the studies of many educators who have found a positive correlation between early adjustment and educational achievement. Most realize the importance of the phrase, "the earlier, the better."

One may wonder what this has to do with residents of the Woodridge-Goodrich area. Simply, that there has been no realization of that important phrase. Woodridge and Goodrich do not have a Kindergarten. A total of 1019 pre-school children in the Woodridge-Goodrich area (1964 statistics) are being deprived of an important step in their education. Beginning the education of children with the first grade is unsatisfactory for the reasons cited before, and for another important reason; The first grade teacher spends more than six weeks in preparing children and adjusting them to a school situation. This is a waste and would be eliminated if the Woodridge-Goodrich area had a kindergarten.

Not long ago this community was put on the map. It is continuing to grow at a very rapid and steady pace. As the number of children increase their life and education become a vital part of the community experience. Education and the care of our children are a special interest and challenge. We cannot and should not try to shape a child according to our own intentions. Teachers and community must help him become what God's original idea meant him to be. Our children must become part of the world around them. Through art and educational manipulative toys they can develop creativity, imagination, and self-expression. At an early age our children develop a sense of humor, responsibility, respect, consideration for others, and cooperation in a group situation. Our children can develop an outgoing personality or they can become introverted. They can share their happiness with everyone or become self-centered. They can learn with their very eager minds about nature, health and nutrition, numbers and simple arithmetic, the alphabet and simple reading and printing, conversational foreign languages, art, singing, telling time, phonetics, safety, and much more or they can eat,

sleep, stay at home and play with "tinker toys" all day. Let's face reality. This community needs a kindergarten-primary and nursery school now.

With our convictions in mind, we have embarked on a program that we hope will be "successful and fruitful---the attempt to establish the Woodridge Kindergarten-Primary and Nursery School. This proposed school will have as its primary purpose, the emphasis on progressive learning. We hope to accomplish this purpose by the knowledge and utilization of the modern teaching methods and devices of our staff of college graduates. All members of the staff will have the Bachelor's degree in Kindergarten-Primary Education and the Illinois teaching certification, along with valuable teaching experience. Teachers will be professionally counseled. The classes will be divided by age, three, four, and five years old. Also the parent will have the option of sending their children to either the half-day (9-12), half-day (12-3), or full-day (9-3) on a tuition payment basis. We hope to keep the cost at a minimum and this will depend on the number of parents interested in the program.

The purpose of this article was to present our plan and consider the number of parents interested in such a plan. Please fill out and mail the census blank promptly. If enough parents are interested, we shall soon have in operation the Woodridge Kindergarten-Primary and Nursery School.
