# Contract Extended 

The Village Board, at its regular meeting Thursday, January 21 st extended the scavanger contract of the John Rot Disposal Service for 90 days.

The contract had run out December 1964 and the Board at that time granted a 30 day extension, tentatively set-up a public hearing and was forced to cancel thathearing. Some residents had requested that papers be picked up by the Dis posal Service rather than burned. A raise in rates had subsequently been discussed.
Trustee Robert Bell cast the only nay vote to this April 30, 1965 extention. He had wanted another 30 day extension and a public hearing set-up as quickly as possible. The Board agreed that there were many facets to be considered and did not approve of extending every 30 days.

## Approval To Build Resting With State

Village Attorney Robert Cox, reported to the village board a meeting he had with the builders concerning the recent bullding versus occupany permits.
Cox stated that both of the village builders 'had made agreements between each other," as to the number of occupany permits each would be allowed, so as not to exceed 1,000 hoop-ups on the present sewerage treatment plant, Cox said, "Based on occupancy permits (they) were selling and constructing."

Cox petitioned the Board, for the builders, to return to the phrase 'occupancy permits.' "The builders have shown their good will" said Cox by proposing to put up a $\$ 10,000$ bond with the Village, saying that they will not exceed 1,000 hook-ups or occupancles.
If this arrangement is satsfactory to the State Sanitary Water Board, the Woodrldge Village Board has indicated that they would allow this.

Under the able chairmanship of Bill Robertson; the Woodridge JAYCEES are sponsoring an essay contest in conjunction with Independence Hall of Chicago, Dr. S. L. DeLove, presi: dent. The theme of this contest is "What my country means to me."

School children in grades seven and elght at both Woodridge and Goodrich schools are writing essays about our important historical heritage. Our local Woodridge winner's essay will compete in state-wide JAY-

CEE competition in Springfield. The Illinois state winners-will recelve a free trip to such hisrorical places as Independence Hall, Philadelphia, Pa.; Valley Forge, Pa.; and Washington, D. C.

The Independence Hall program began eleven years ago in Chicago when Dr. DeLove, not an American by birth, felt school age youngsters were not getting enough American history.
Dr. DeLove founded Independence Hall in 1954, for he was
deeply disturbed 'by the come placency and apathy of the average American toward his responsibility as a sovereign citizen. Thus, he began what was virtually a one-man crusade to focus attention upon our blessings as American citizens, inheritors of the Americanheritage.

St. Procopius

St, Procopius College, Lisle, Illinois, will begin its spring session of evening credit courses on February 2.
The evening session is anintegral part of the college's academic program. The courses offered during this session are equivalent in method, content and credit to courses offered during the regular academic year and may be appliedtoward the appropriate degrees conferred by the college.
