Man Into Space

Peter Reich, Aviation Editor for Chicago's American, and twice named "Newsman of the Year" by the Air Force Association, will present an illustrated lecture on "Man into Space" at St. Procopius College, Lisle, on March 10, at 4:15 p.m.

Reich, an outstanding journalist, was one of the first newsmen to pierce the sound barrier in a jet interceptor and one of the first permitted to fly a zero-gravity mission in the astronaut's own training plane. He is an expert photographer whose lens has captured the drama and meaning of spaceflight the way few others have succeeded in doing. Best of all, he relates the space story in simple, non-technical terms that audiences easily understand.

In his lecture at St. Procopius College, Reich will use 100 sparkling color slides from the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. He takes you along on a step-bystep preview of a ride in the Moonship with the astronauts from blast-off, through a landing on the lunar surface, and back to earth.

The lecture will be presented in the audio-visual room of the new library, and will be open to the public.



The Jaycees wish to thank all of the students for sharing their thoughts with us on this subject and for the effort that they expended.





The Citizens' Action Party on Wednesday, February 24, released the following statement:

"The Citizens' Action Party is the only political organization in Woodridge with a proven record of performance and integrity in government. Our opposition does not like our business ability to negotiate; consequently, they miscall it a squabble. Nevertheless, under the present C.A.P. majority Board, the Winston - Muss annexation agreement, poorly negotiated and drawn by the previous Board, was effectively salvaged by securing for the people of Woodridge an additional \$25,000.00 for the school district, \$25,000.00 cash for a Village Hall or Library and an additional 12 1/2 acre wooded park valued at \$100,000.00. The

opposition cried 'it can't be done', 'pie in the sky', but they were wrong.

Today, the people of Woodridge are the owners of over 40 acres of public land obtained as a result of negotiations on the part of your C.A.P. officials.
