This month the Woodridge Public Library had their yearly volunteer luncheon, where we express our appreciation for all of the wonderful work our volunteers do for us, whether it be helping pull books to fill holds, helping stock the book sale shelves, or providing vital assistance to our homebound delivery service. Pam Whitt, our volunteer coordinator, did a wonderful job organizing this event.

I met with John Eallonardo and Jack Hayes from Frederick Quinn to discuss what needs to be done regarding current building needs, final items on our construction project, and looking forward to the next phase of the construction project. For our most immediate needs, they will be assisting us with putting a bid together for our exterior building steel and curtain wall repainting. Because our exterior steel beams have an intumescent product on them to prevent melting in a fire, they must be regularly repainted with a specialized paint product as a matter of standard maintenance. I anticipate this project being completed by mid-September. Frederick Quinn will also be assisting us with an assessment of our HVAC system and will develop a bid document after completing that assessment.
