Library Director's Report March 2024

The Library building is now fully lit: we have replaced eight ballasts and 279 bulbs with LED bulbs/conversion kits. Because the LED bulbs have an expected 267% improvement in their life expectancy we expect to see a \$5000 savings in bulb costs and labor in the years to come (more than offsetting the costs associated with the LED conversion), along with a projected 47% decrease in power consumption by the new bulbs/ballasts.

Spring COLORAMA (March 23) marked the opening of *The Coloring Nook*, a bright space just-off-the-lobby serving as an always-open multi-functional spot for patrons. Witnessed throughout March in the Coloring Nook: children/families coloring, snacking, picking up seasonally themed coloring pages/information to-go, engaging waiting area for children/caregivers while other family completed library activities, pop-up seniors' card game, and participatory community art display.

Also on March 23, Board members, family, and friends of former Library Director Pam Dubé gathered to honor Pam, dedicating a plaque in her honor and inspecting the new spaces/resources inspired by Pam and funded in her name. Combined with the successful COLORAMA program (over 600 visitors), a fitting celebration of Pam and her vision for WPL.
